In summary, although a sizeable number of trout are killed by anglers before obtaining lega size, the number which die is normally not enough to adversely affect the returns. Twice as many fish are caught at the same or less cost to the fishermen when fingerling trout are planted as when egal-size trout are planted in Moccasin Lake. This, coupled with the fact that plantings of fingerling trout provides fishing throughout the entire season, rather than only during the first ouple of days of the season folowing planting, more than offsets the loss of undersize trout. The killing of some fingerling trout is aesthetically and economical undesirable but at present is the price one pays for the material advantages gained by stocking fingerling trout. # **Negroes** Tired **Of Waiting**

#### By JAMES MARLOW Associated Press News Analyst

WASHINGTON - The racial disorders in Birmingham are only the latest evidence of Negroes' rapidly growing willingness to act by themselves against discrimination.

Their actions now-in massive demonstrations, sit-ins and most recently in riots in the Alabama city-have been building up as they got tired walting for equal treatment.

Waiting For 175 Years

They've been waiting, except for a brief time in Reconstruction days, for 175 years. But it has been possible for them to

#### make these forceful demands only in the past nine years because, until then, even the Supreme Court said it was all right to segregate them.

It was nine years ago this week - on May 17, 1954 - that the Supreme Court outlawed segregation in public schools and opened the door to banning segregation in all public places

#### With 'All Deliberate Speed'

They won case after case when the court responded by banning segregation in graduate schools, on interstate buses, and so on, until the school decision came down in 1954.

But that decision didn't say how fast desegregation of public schools should proceed. On May 31, 1955, the court gave its answer: with "all deliberate speed." What did that mean?

Southern states interpreted it as meaning very slowly. It has been very slow. The Negroes are impatient, so impatient that some of them now condemn the NAACP for being too slow by relying too much on legal efforts to hasten the process. So some have resorted to direct action.
