St. Luke's To Carry Out \$1,900,000 Expansion Program

Action Taken On Receipt Of Survey Report

The Board of Trustees of St. Luke's Hospital has unanimously voted to proceed with a \$1,900,000 expansion program.

The action was taken at a meeting Monday night with the executive committee of the medical staff.

17 Recommendations

Trustees elected to proceed with the development program after studying a report prepared for the hospital by Hamilton and Associates, hospital consultants of the University of Minnesota, who made a county-wide survey of community health needs.

The Hamilton report contained 17 recommendations, including a new building or wing and a very general remodeling of present floors and facilities.

Board members said they hoped to obtain financing from three sources:

- Hospital funds, including private gifts.
- Local public support.
- Federal matching funds.

Plans call for launching the program immediately and for completion of the entire project within three or four years.

The board said it had long been aware of a need for expansion of St. Luke's plant and facilities, but that it delayed taking any action until completion of the independent survey by Hamilton and Associates. The report, the board said, emphasizes the need for prompt action to provide the many necessary and urgent improvements.

The report indicates that to keep pace with today's advances in hospital and medical science, it is urgent that plans be considered both for immediate short range developments and for projected long range expansion of services and facilities.

Sent To State Department

Lincoln B. Frazier, chairman of the board, said the report has been sent to the Michigan Department of Health for review and evaluation with the hope that the total program may be synchronized with the programming of services jointly sponsored by federal and state funds.

Hamilton and Associates, a nationally known authority in the hospital field, spent the past three and a half months interviewing patients, doctors, citizens and city and county officials in compiling information for the report.

The report contains a very careful analysis of the present St. Luke's buildings, equipment and layout, Frazier said.

"The report suggests several approaches for expanding the hospital," he said.

tal's diagnostic and treatment facilities," he stated. "It particularly calls attention to Marquette's unique medical staff, which includes more medical and surgical specialists than the average community of its size."

Intensive Care Unit

"It also recognizes the importance of the school of nursing and recommends that its enrollment be increased to meet the growing need for more nurses."

Another feature of paramount importance is the development of a floor or wing to be devoted to intensive care. Here will be concentrated critical cases, such as those who have just undergone difficult or dangerous surgery. Special apparatus of the type needed to combat collapse or give highly specialized treatment to the dangerously ill would be located in this area and thus be immediately available at all times.

"Also important is the further development of rehabilitative techniques of restorative character."

One result of the changes recommended in the report would be a lessening of the congestion in the stucco-surface building known locally as "Old St. Luke's." In this area provision for care of the elderly and chronically ill would be developed as the occasion demands.

City Teacher Gets Grant For Seminar

Miss Marguerite Hammersmith, of 321 E. Michigan St., a Graveraet High School English teacher, has received a grant to study at a seminar this summer at Syracuse University, Syracuse, N. Y.

Summer study grants for 434 high school journalism teachers and publications advisers were announced by the Newspaper Fund.

Miss Hammersmith is an adviser of the Graveraet High School newspaper, the Graveraet Week-ly.

Teachers from 46 states, Washington, D. C., and the Philippine Islands will share the study fellowships, which represent an investment of \$155,000 by the Newspaper Fund.

Teachers will spend up to 12 weeks studying scholastic and professional journalism problems and techniques at 46 colleges and universities.

Since 1959 more than 1,700 teachers have received these graduate school fellowship grants. The Newspaper Fund fellowships pay all expenses for tuition, fees, books, room and board.

Home Nursing Service Now Being Offered On Countywide Basis

Because the Visiting Nurse Association of Marquette believes that health and well-being are very important components in creating a happy life, the association's services have been expanded to include the entire county.

Previously available only in Marquette, home nursing services now are being offered to all Marquette County residents, on the basis of a three-year pilot study, and the association's staff has been expanded to include the services of two fulltime visiting nurses. One to work in Marquette, the other throughout the county.

Mrs. Mary Vecker, a registered nurse who is a native of Philadelphia, has been on the job as home nursing coordinator for Marquette County since March. Her services were obtained in addition to those offered by Mrs. Bertha Anderson, visiting nurse in the city for some time. Mrs. Vecker received her bachelor of science degree in nursing at Pennsylvania University and obtained a year's public health nursing experience on the staff of the Philadelphia Health Department. She also was employed as an instructor in medical and surgical nursing at Jefferson Medical College Hospital and as an instructor of pediatrics at Frankford Hospital, both are in Philadelphia. Before coming to Marquette, where her husband enrolled as a student at Northern Michigan University, Mrs. Vecker was a staff

nurse with the Lake County (Illinois) Health Department, which, as an extension of service, was starting a home nursing program in the state of Michigan similar to the one begun this spring in Marquette.

Mrs. Vecker pointed out that the pilot study is being made with the support of the Michigan Department of Health and the cooperation of the Marquette-Alger Medical Society to determine the health needs of the area. At conclusion of the three-year pilot program, it is hoped that VNA can continue working as a contributing member of a health team, by offering home nursing services to all families in the county which may need them.

She noted that the program will require the help of county residents in terms of their advice on the kinds of nursing service desired in various home situations. "Many sick people could be cared for at home, if the visiting nurse were contacted to teach another family member such care," Mrs. Vecker said. She went on to explain the other benefits to be obtained by county residents making use of the services of a home nursing consultant. Examples of service. For example, she commented, a person could learn a procedure in the hospital and then apply it under supervision of the nurse in the home. A new mother with qualms about handling her first baby and physically exhausted from its care would receive assurance from the home nurse, as well as suggestions on care of herself and the new baby. A diabetic, nervous about giving

ing himself his first injection of insulin at home, might be pleased to have the visiting nurse there for the first solo attempt; and a person recovering from a stroke could learn a good deal, the visiting nurse said, in terms of how to care for himself during the rehabilitation period and how to properly carry out exercises prescribed by his doctor.

"All these needs and others can be met," Mrs. Vecker stated, if residents of Marquette County become aware of the services offered through the Visiting Nurse Association and take advantage of them.

The visiting nurses do not work alone; they function only with specific orders from the family doctor, she added. As a result, all requests for home nursing care should be discussed first by a patient with his own physician.

"Health needs are changing rapidly," Mrs. Vecker noted, "and there is an increased demand for the professional services of nurses in the home situation."

"There are 31 home care programs in the state of Michigan alone, because it has been demonstrated that many patients could go home earlier if a visiting nurse were available to teach other members of the family how to care for the patient in the home situation. We are all living to be much older, and we need to know how to best care for ourselves and our loved ones," she stated.

A flat service charge is usually made for each professional visit by the nurse, but the fee can be adjusted, according to a family's ability to pay, the home nursing coordinator explained. Persons requiring the services of the visiting nurse may contact the VNA at the Veterans Center, Blaker St., Marquette, Monday through Friday from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m., in person or by calling 226-8171, or by calling Marquette CANal 6-9809 at night.

Comments or suggestions regarding the countywide program will be welcomed, Mrs. Vecker said.

State Agency OK's Proposed Merger Of School Districts

MUNISING — The State Department of Instruction approved the annexation proposition of the Marquette-Alger intermediate school districts at a meeting in Lansing recently. Notification of the approval was received in a letter by Vance Hiney, Marquette County school superintendent, from Dr. Lynn Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction.

"In accordance with the resolution of your board of education adopted April 2, under provisions of Act No. 190 of the public acts of 1962, and subject to an affirmative vote of the qualified school electors involved, the State Board of Education, at its regular meeting held in Lansing on April 24, approved the proposed annexation of the Alger County Intermediate School District to the Marquette district both in the State of Michigan," Bartlett's letter declared.

Kemp Brown, Alger County superintendent of schools, said all preliminary steps toward annexation of the Alger district to the Marquette district now have been taken as required by law. The next and final step is a favorable vote by the people of this county June 10.

"Many people connected with the schools have made a long study of the proposition and feel that a favorable vote would be the right thing," Brown declared. "It is our job to inform the people of the advantages of annexation and also of the disadvantages if there are any. Many questions are asked. The two which seem to come up most are: 'What effect would this annexation have on our local districts?' and 'What advantage would come to our area?'"

"In answer to the first we can

say positively that there would be no effect on the local constituent districts. They would be governed exactly the same as they are now. They would carry on their transportation exactly as they do now. There would certainly not be any transfer of students to Marquette, caused by this annexation. State aid to local constituent districts would not be affected in any way. School money raised from local taxes for local districts would not be affected in the least. This would have nothing to do with annexation of local districts one way or another.

"The K-12 bill which has been defeated in the Legislature has absolutely nothing to do with the Intermediate School Bill that was passed in 1962. Children would continue to go to the same schools they are now attending. Those schools would be run exactly the same as they are now by the same people, except that there would be a change of county superintendents to help them. Mr. Hiney would take over instead of Mr. Brown as county or intermediate district superintendent.

"In answer to the second, some simple indisputable facts can be mentioned. Alger County has been and will continue to receive \$4,800 from the state aid formula, to be used for operational or salary expenses of the county office. If they do annex they will not get this money after July 1, 1965. Although additional services to children in the form of special education classes may not come overnight, we clear the way for their possibility in the future and probably the near future with a 'yes' vote, while a 'no' vote makes it almost impossible for Alger County to think of these improvements because of its size.

"Classes for the physically or mentally handicapped have been a part of the program for many years in the larger counties of the state. Alger County must consolidate to a point where it has at least a 5,000 membership. We cannot go it alone. We are not rich enough nor do we have the membership to warrant state help by ourselves.
