





# Court Rules Negroes Own **Disputed Land**

MANASSAS. Va. (AP)-An 86year-old Negro widow and her family have been declared the legal owners of land on which a developer built 23 gleaming new houses for white families. The property-1612 acres-was

awarded last week by a Prince William County Circuit Court jury to Marconia Ray and her nine children after an 11-day trial. The Rays had claimed Cecil D. Hylton, developer of Marumsco village near Woodbridge, Va., took 2712 acres that belonged to their family since 1920.

Lawrence Douglas, attorney for Hylton, said he intends to appeal. He told the jury of six men and one woman that when bulldozers appeared in the disputed area the Rays made no claim of trespassing.

However, Harvey Rosenberg, an attorney for the Rays, said Hylton knew there was a boundary problem when work started.
