In July, 1961, the Michigan Public Service Commission issued an order authorizing uniform electric rates as proposed by the Upper Peninsula Power Company for its interconnect system to become effective September 1, 1961. The adoption of the proposed uniform rates, intended to eliminate certain variations in charges for similar service throughout the integrated territory, would result in rate increases in some areas and decreases in others, while some remain the same.

However, the above order was appealed to the courts and, while the matter was in litigation, the Company was required to collect the increased rates and the former rates which would have been reduced.

Just recently, however, on May 9, the Michigan Supreme Court affirmed a lower court decision and upheld the original Commission order. This ruling now permits the Company to proceed immediately with the proposed uniform rates.

All revenues collected by the Company in excess of the rates prescribed by the Commission will be refunded in full with interest. Refunds will be made by credits applied to all

billings rendered on and after June 1, 1963. Where the amount of the credit due exceeds the amount of the first billing, including arrears, if any, the remaining credit balance due the customer will be refunded by check, if the amount is \$1.00 or more. If the amount is less than \$1.00, the balance will be credited to the customer's next bill. Persons no longer customers, but entitled to refunds of \$1.00 or more, will be mailed a check to their last known address. Those entitled to a refund of less than \$1.00 and no longer customers, may request such refund by contacting the Company's business office.

With the adoption of the new uniform rates, customers taking electric service within the Company's integrated system now will be charged the same price for like services under similar circumstances and conditions.

We appreciate the courteous indulgence of all our customers throughout these prolonged hearings and continue our pledge to render the best possible electric service at just and reasonable rates at all times.
