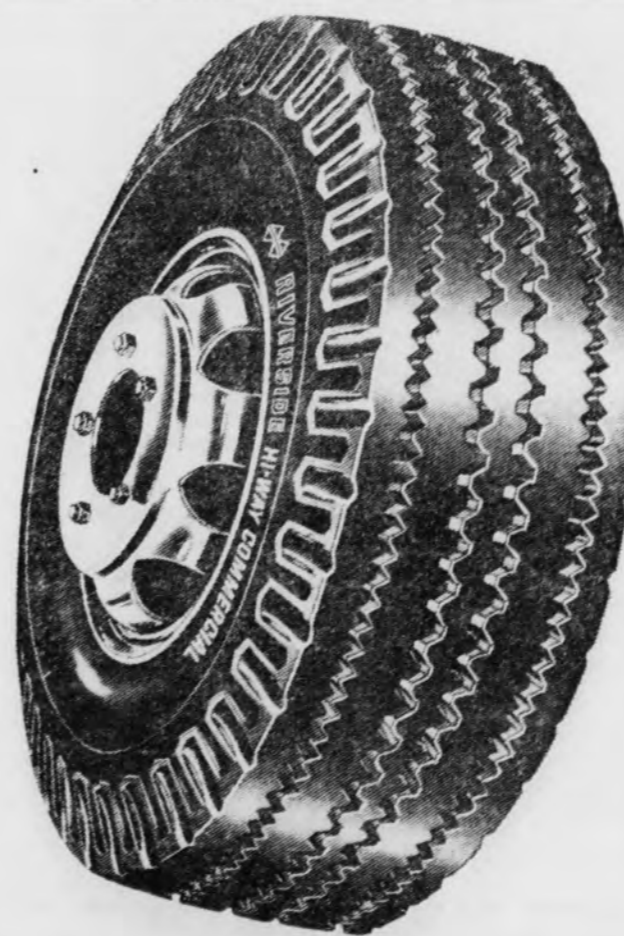

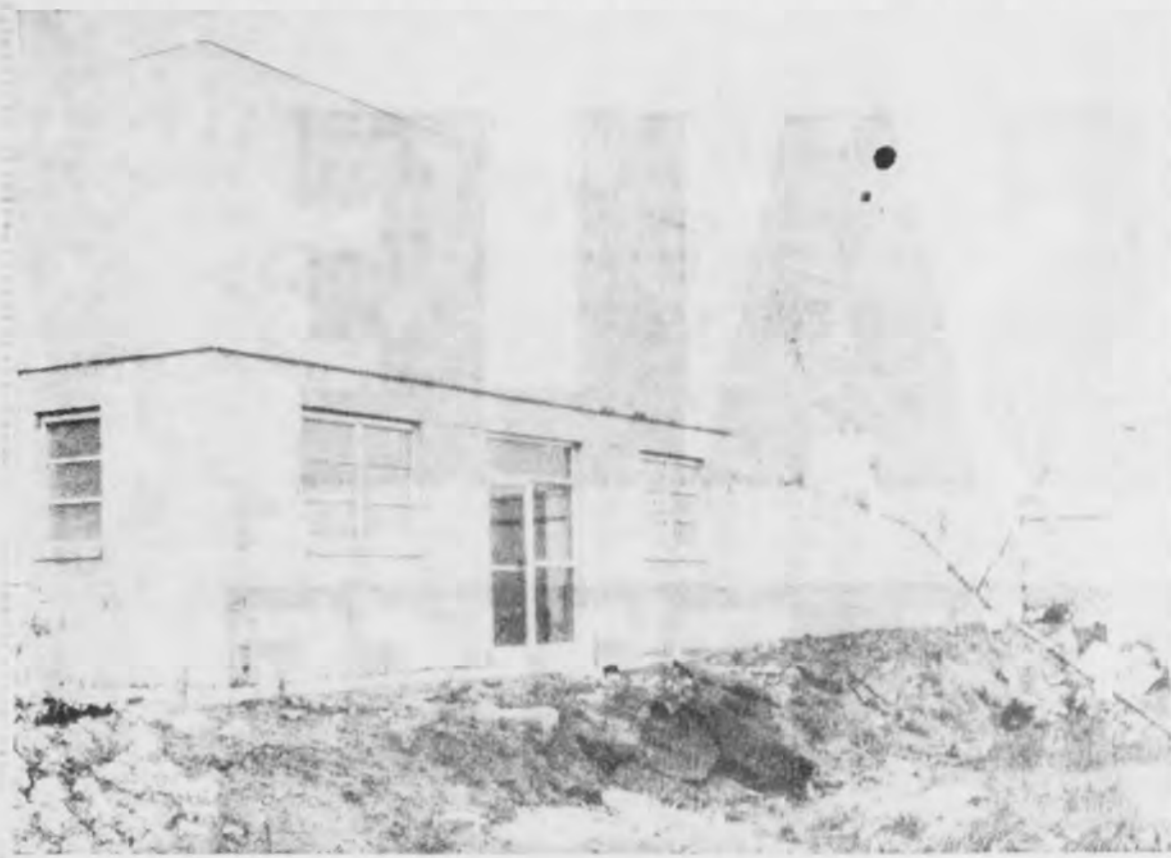

State Cities Have Average Crime Rate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Serious crime in the United States was 7 per cent greater in volume during the first three months of this year than the corresponding period of 1962, figures released by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Department of Justice showed today.

Michigan's six largest cities, as a rule, were in line with the national average for cities over 100,000 in population, which showed substantial increases in larcenies over \$50, auto thefts and burglaries.

Detroit was one of the few cities in the country to report a decrease in larceny, with 95 fewer cases reported in the first three months of the year. The Motor City also

reported decreases in murder, aggravated assault, and burglary. Slight increases were reported in forcible rape, robbery and auto theft cases.

Auto Thefts
Flint law enforcement officers, who reported increases in all categories except forcible rape, had to handle more than twice the amount of auto thefts. A total of 136 auto theft cases were reported during the first three months of his year, compared with only 62 in the like period of 1962.

Dearborn reported 30 more auto thefts in the same period while crimes in the other categories remained about the same.

Grand Rapids showed a decrease in rape and assault cases and slight increases in the other crime categories. The biggest increase came in robberies which saw a jump from 16 to 30.

For Upper Peninsula Power Company customers located in the following areas:

In July, 1961, the Michigan Public Service Commission issued an order authorizing uniform electric rates as proposed by the Upper Peninsula Power Company for its interconnect system to become effective September 1, 1961. The adoption of the proposed uniform rates, intended to eliminate certain variations in charges for similar service throughout the integrated territory, would result in rate increases in some areas and decreases in others, while some remain the same.

However, the above order was appealed to the courts and, while the matter was in litigation, the Company was required to collect the increased rates and the former rates which would have been reduced.

Just recently, however, on May 9, the Michigan Supreme Court affirmed a lower court decision and upheld the original Commission order. This ruling now permits the Company to proceed immediately with the proposed uniform rates.

More U.P. Graduates Go To Work In Chicago Than In All Cities In Southern Peninsula

More Upper Peninsula high school graduates go to Milwaukee to work than to any other city. This is more true of girl graduates than boys in ratio of nearly three to one.

More U.P. graduates go to Wisconsin to work than to any other state, including the Lower Peninsula of Michigan. More go to Chicago than to Detroit and all the other cities of the Lower Peninsula. More go to Chicago than to all the rest of Illinois outside Chicago.

Conducted By Dr. Berg
Minneapolis drew more graduates from the U.P. graduating class of 1961, which was studied 10 months after graduation, than did all the State of California. More went to Green Bay, 6 (5 girls), than to Washington, D.C., 3, or Virginia, 3.

The study, by Dr. William Berg of Northern Michigan University on a National Defense Education Act grant, covered 3,508 graduates and was reported to the recent state curriculum meeting in Escanaba by Ivan Ryan of the Gwin Public Schools.

Milwaukee drew 27 boys and 74 girls of the 1961 graduates for a total of 101 of 27.9 per cent of the total Wisconsin, outside of Milwaukee and Green Bay, drew 45 students, or 12.4 per cent, 24 boys and 21 girls.

Chicago got 42 or 11.6 per cent, half boys and half girls, and Illinois outside Chicago got 28 or 7.7 per cent.

Lower Michigan got 12 boys and 23 girls, or a total of 35 or 10.5 per cent.

Minneapolis got 18 or 7.9 per cent, California, 12 or 3.3 per cent. Of the graduating class, 562 or 16 per cent left the U.P. to find work, 218 boys and 344 girls.

Of this number, 379 remained outside the U.P. at the time of the study, or 67.4 per cent, 152 boys and 227 girls.

And 183 or 30.5 per cent had returned to the U.P., 66 boys and 117 girls.

Reasons given for returning to the U.P. by those who left to find work:

- Unable to find work, 38, or 33.6 per cent.
- Dissatisfied with job, 20, or 18 per cent.
- Parents request, 2.
- High cost of living, 2.
- Desire to return home, 8, or 7 per cent.
- Further education, 4.
- Personal reasons, 28 or 25 per cent.
- Didn't respond, 8.

Tech Slates Graduation For Saturday

HOUGHTON — Michigan Tech will close its 77th academic year Saturday, when 402 bachelor of science and master of science degrees are awarded to 400 candidates.

The commencement is scheduled at 2:30 p. m. in Dee Stadium. Brig. Gen. Oran O. Price, headquarters, U. S. Air Forces in Europe, Wiesbaden, Germany, will deliver the commencement address.

B. S. degrees in 18 fields of study will be conferred on 382 senior and post graduate students at the commencement. Two of these candidates will receive two degrees each. Eighteen graduate students will be awarded M.S. degrees in 10 fields.

On a departmental basis, the largest group of seniors is in civil engineering, with 64 degree candidates, followed by electrical engineering with 59. At the graduate level, M.S. degrees in business administration, electrical engineering and engineering mechanics will be awarded to three students each.

Honorary doctor of engineering degrees will be conferred on Gen. Price; Wilfrid C. Polkinghorne, professor of civil engineering emeritus; and Charles Howard Funkey, a Michigan Tech alumnus now living in Johannesburg, South Africa. Funkey's degree will be conferred in absentia.

Music for the commencement will be provided by the Michigan Tech Band, under the direction of B. Franz Schubert, professor of music. The Tech Band will be augmented by members of several area high school bands.

The invocation will be given by the Rev. Roland J. Dion, pastor, St. Joseph's Church, Lake Linden. The Rev. Lloyd Dalquist, pastor, First Presbyterian Church, Houghton, will give the benediction.

Court Backs U.P. School Head's Claim

LANSING (AP) — A new trial has been ordered by the State Supreme Court in the case of a child injured in a traffic accident involving a sweeper operated by the Wayne County Road Commission because pictures taken more than two years later were introduced as evidence.

The court held that the exhibits did not meet the admissibility test of reasonable representation. The pictures purported to show that the sweeper was not raising dust to create a hazard.

Negligence was claimed and damages sought on behalf of Darlene Kaminski, 10, injured in a collision with the sweeper and a car in 1959. The claim was not allowed by a lower court.

The high court upheld a lower court decision awarding compensation for two years loss of salary to William Sharon, former superintendent of schools for Spalding Township, Menominee County.

Sharon was voted a new five-year contract in 1953 with a raise to \$5,600 a year although his former contract still had one year to go. Two school board members who voted for the new contract were defeated in a try for re-election and the new board voted to terminate his services at the end of the old 1951-54 contract.

Sharon was out of work for two years before he took a position as superintendent of schools in another district.

Second U. P. Debate Workshop Slated At Northern Aug. 5-16

Northern Michigan University will hold its second annual Upper Peninsula debate workshop for high school students from Monday, Aug. 5, through Friday, Aug. 16.

The workshop will be under the supervision of John Monsma, NMU director of forensics, and John Veltema, coach of the Grand Rapids Christian High School debate squad, which won the 1962-63 city league championship.

The purpose of the two-week workshop is to provide practical experience with the 1963-64 high school debate question while assisting the students to develop proficiency in debating.

Instructions In Research

Also included in the workshop will be instruction in literary research methods and bibliography, analysis of basic issues, building of affirmative and negative cases, refutation and rebuttal, and delivery of the debate speech.

Retirement Facility For Teachers Set

LANSING — A substantial financial gift was given to the Michigan Education Association this week in memory of Harry J. Defoe, former Bay City principal and founder of the Defoe Shipbuilding Co.

The cash gift was presented to Theodore B. Southerland, MEHA chairman, in Bay City. Southerland called the gift from the Defoe family "appropriate" in that the idea for creation of the center to be opened in the fall of 1965 as MEHA Village came from Bay City teachers. It has won statewide recognition as the "Bay City dream."

For State Educators

The idea for MEHA, described as a new concept designed to provide complete retirement facilities for state educators, was proposed four years ago by Southerland, principal of Central High School in Bay City.

Southerland said nearly \$140,000 has been contributed by teachers throughout the state toward a \$1,250,000 fund to provide initial units of the center, which eventually is expected to develop into a \$10,000,000 complex.

The 212-acre site on the northern edge of Saline is now under option in an area which Southerland describes as "a gently rolling countryside with a spring-fed stream and wooded spots, within a 15-minute walk of the Saline shopping district and churches, and a 15-minute ride to the heart of Ann Arbor."

Eventually For 1,500

Southerland said that initially central facilities with about 100 units to serve around 150 people will be opened in the fall of 1965. Eventually the center will accommodate at least 1,500 retired teachers in a "private, home-like atmosphere."

Southerland explained the retirement housing plan is expected to cost each person approximately \$150 a month, or about 50 percent of the individual's retirement and social security payments. This monthly cost, he added, will cover life care, food, shelter, medical, and hospital expenses.

Requirements Noted

Requirements at the time of admission will include: admissions fee of \$350, health fee of \$500 and a security fee met by assigning \$1,000 of the individual's insurance program to MEHA or by making a cash payment of \$850.

Spouses of retired teachers will be admitted to the facilities.

Students will combine study with recreation through such activities as picnics, swimming, hikes, movies and tours in a full program directed by Patrick Naughton, NMU coach.

Climax: Developing Case

As a climax to the workshop, each participant will develop a debate case and, in conjunction with another debater, participate in several rounds of practice debates with other workshop members.

Romney Gets 'Crash Study' On Safety

LANSING (AP) — A dozen key recommendations aimed at helping to halt the rising traffic death toll in Michigan have been submitted to Gov. George Romney by the State Safety Commission.

The commission conducted what it termed a "crash study" of the problem. Safety experts, businessmen and citizens were asked to submit suggestions. A consensus of the answers was digested by the commission and submitted to the Governor.

Secy. of State James Hare, commission chairman, said improvement cannot be expected overnight even if some or all of the most important suggestions are adopted as soon as possible.

'Blood Bath'

The rising fatality rate, Hare warned, together with a long upward trend in personal injuries and accidents, would indicate that Michigan is in for a "blood bath" on the highways this year.

The commission agreed that four recommendations were tops in priority. These were:

- Better driver license examining with the job given to some 300 examiners who would work under Civil Service. This would take the assignment away from local police and sheriff's departments.

- Probationary licenses for all new drivers under 18. It also was recommended that all drivers be placed under the point system.

- Periodic motor vehicle inspection. It was suggested that local garages be licensed to do the job for a fee of about 2 with supervision by the state. It was estimated that administration of such a plan would cost about \$1 million a year.

- An increase of 300 additional state police officers over the present authorized strength of 1,155. It was recommended that these be added at the rate of 150 a year for an additional cost of \$2,250,000 a year when all 300 were added.

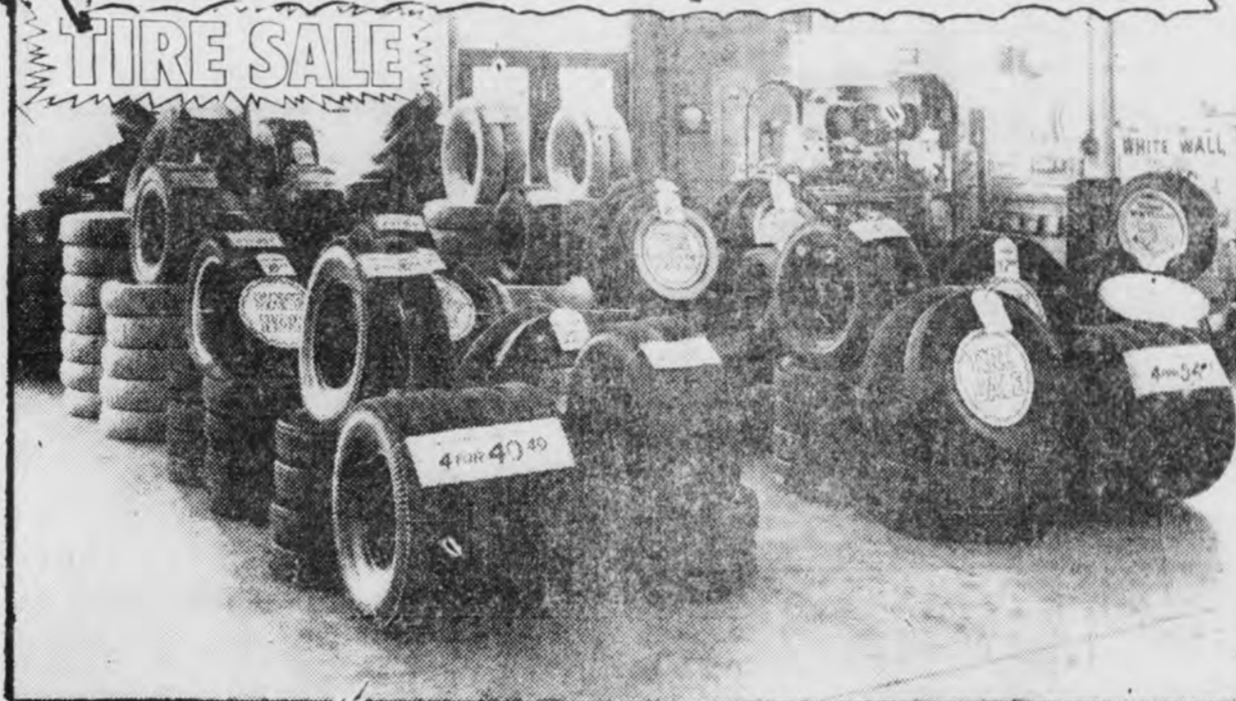

Rahoi Wants ADC-U To Be Reconsidered

LANSING (AP) — A demand that Aid to Dependent Children of Unemployed (ADC-U) be reconsidered anew by the Legislature has been issued by Sen. Philip Rahoi, D-Iron Mountain.

Rahoi said he will introduce a resolution "expressing legislative sentiment" that Gov. George Romney call for ADC-U legislation to be considered at "any special session."

He said citizens have asked him to have the bill passed earlier—and rejected as unacceptable by the Federal government—recalled so Michigan can be made eligible for ADC-U.

"Unfortunately, the Governor has signed the bill and it has been enacted. It cannot be recalled," said Rahoi. "There is only one way that the children of unemployed parents and local units of government can obtain the benefits of this program."

"The legislature must repeat the whole process of passing enabling legislation."

Detroit Mayor Jerome Cavanagh earlier sent Romney and key lawmakers telegrams asking that the bill be recalled, pointing out that Detroit's budget is predicted on the belief that \$2.2 million in ADC-U would be available.

Rahoi has refused to withdraw from his position that the ADC-U bill passed this year meets federal requirements, despite advice to the contrary by Secy. Anthony Celebrezze of the Health, Education and Welfare Department, and State Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley, Kelley.

Rahoi said Romney was "beating a dead horse in a personal states' rights battle" with the federal government.

"It's time to admit the Governor's bill will not bring ADC-U benefits to Michigan... and it's time for the Governor to make an unconditional commitment to full participation in the Federal-State program," he said.

Light and power — Line crews trimmed trees and replaced a fire alarm box on W. Michigan St., replaced a pole on W. Washington St. and rebuilt service to the public library. Water received at the hydro-electric plants was less than last week and less than during the same week last year. Elevation at the Hoist Pond was raised six-tenths of a foot and was 1.05 feet lower than at the same time last year and 6.3 feet from the top of the dam. The total system's kilowatt hour load was five per cent higher than one year ago.

Health — Thirteen physical exams and 75 immunizations were administered. Biologics dispensed to county physicians numbered 800 doses.

Clerk — Issued 38 dog licenses, made three address changes, cancelled one registration and conducted routine filing and book-keeping.

Court — Handled 23 traffic violations, two misdemeanors, two felonies and four civil cases. The violations bureau handled 68 meter and 15 restricted parking tickets.

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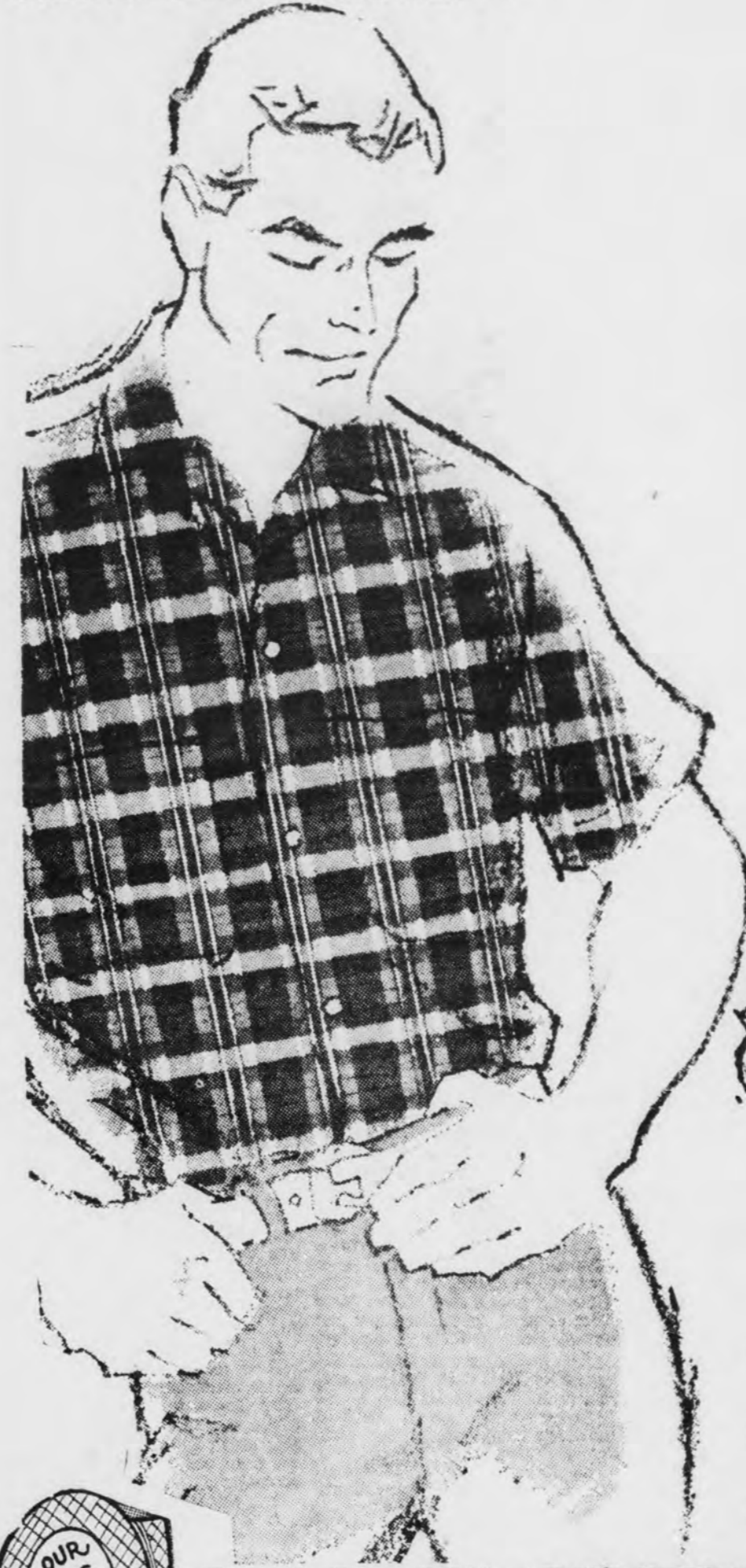

FLINT (AP) — Philanthropist Charles S. Mott aspires to do still more in Flint's behalf.

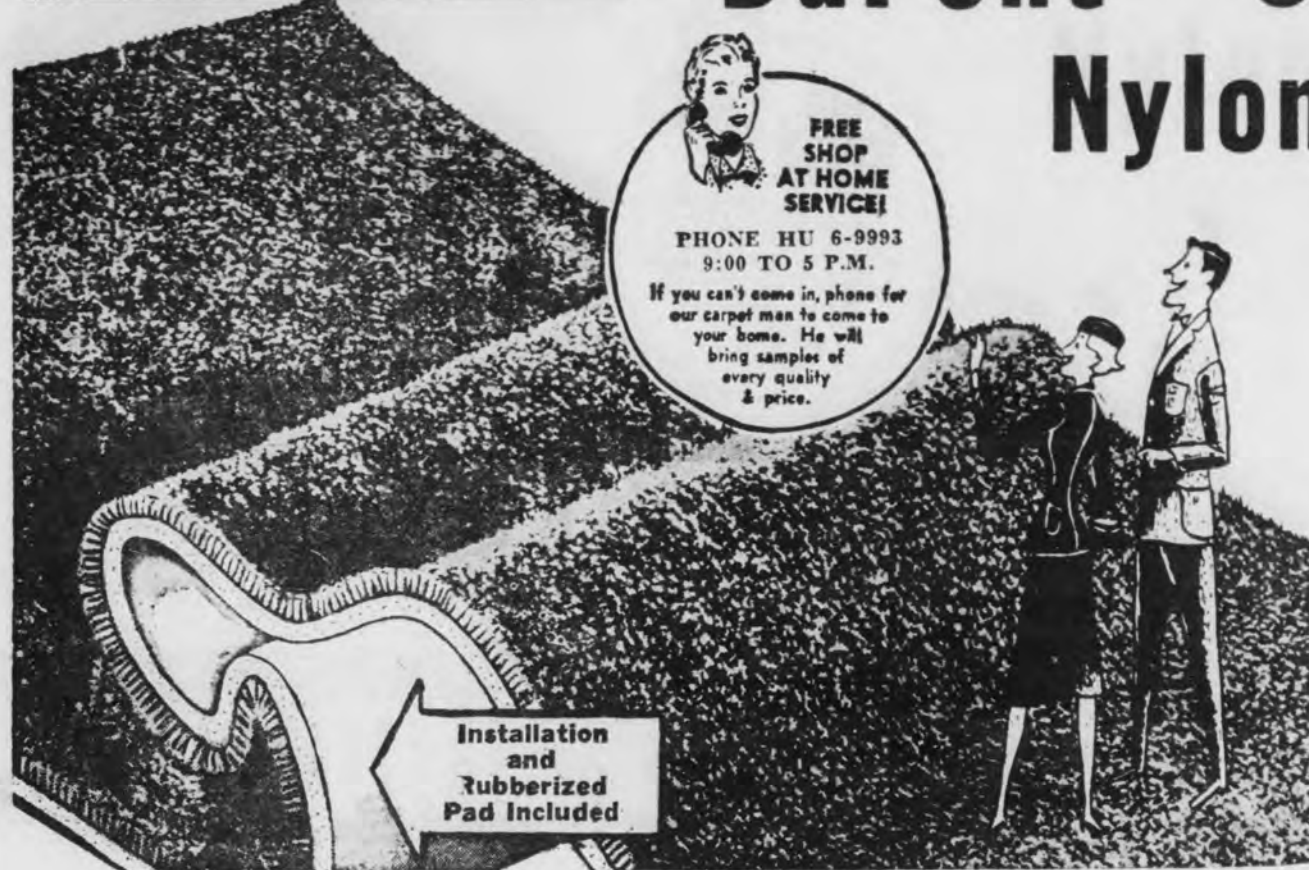

Board In Baraga County Allocates Millage Rates

L'ANSE — Final allocation of millage rates for the county, townships, schools and the county intermediate school district were set at Monday afternoon's meeting of the Baraga County Allocation Board.

The county will receive 7.55 mills for operating expenses — a cut of one-quarter mill from the 7.8 requested. This 7.55 mills and the .2 of one mill allocated to the county intermediate school district will be spread throughout the five townships. Rates for township and school operations vary between the five townships.

Both L'Anse and Baraga township governments will receive three-quarters of a mill, rather than the full mill both requested. The extra quarter of a mill will go to the school districts, bringing their allocated total to 6.5 mills.

L'Anse schools have an extra 6.5 mills and Baraga has an additional 7.5 mills, any part of which may be spread on the tax rolls in order to meet budgeted needs. The L'Anse school district presented a budget calling for a total of 10.5 mills, and the Baraga schools are asking a total of 11.6 mills.

At this rate, it will probably not be necessary to spread the full amount of the extra millage in order to provide the budget requirements of the two school districts, it was noted.

Township Picture
In Arvon Township, the schools were granted 5.75 mills and the township will receive 1.5 mills. The Arvon schools also have an additional nine mills voted in, which they may draw upon to bring their total allotment up to the 11 mills requested to cover their budget.

Covington Township will take a full mill and the schools will receive 6.25 mills. The Covington schools also have five extra voted mills and are calling for an additional 1.5 mills for one year in Monday's special school election. The Covington school budget called for a total of 14 mills.

In Spurr Township the schools will receive six mills from the allocation board and the township will get 1.25 mills. The extra millage for schools there expired this year, and Spurr schools are seeking an additional 10 mills for operating expenses. Their budget calls for a total of 17 mills.

Slight Drop?
Since it appears that the full amount of extra voted millage for schools will not have to be spread, in order to bring the Baraga and L'Anse school incomes up to budget requirements, observers anticipate a slight drop rather than the highly touted boost that had been expected by the public.

L'Anse Township taxpayers can expect a substantial reduction in their tax rate, since a big drop in millage will probably be possible.

Tax increases of between \$5 and \$11 per \$1,000 assessed valuation can be expected in Arvon, Covington and Spurr Townships, it was reported.

Final tax rates for each of the five townships will be set at the October meeting of the county board of supervisors, as required by law.

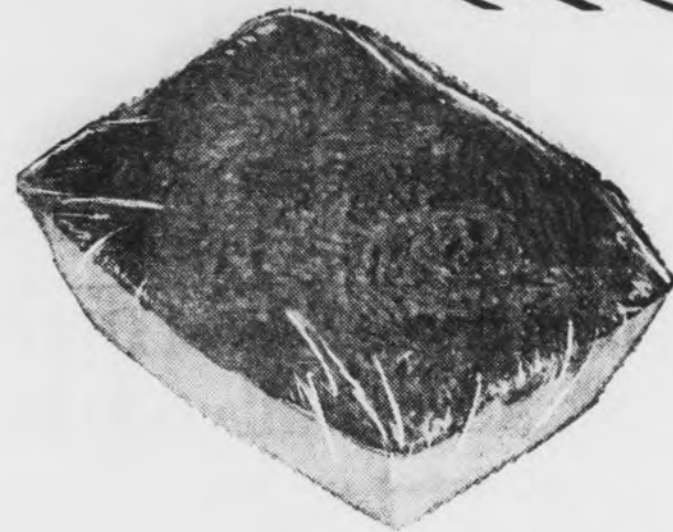

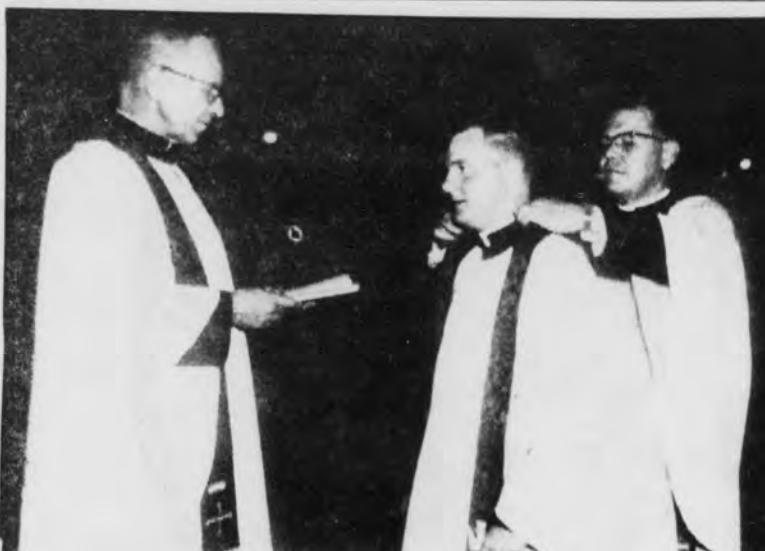

MSU Zoning Authority To Meet June 13 With Alger Planning Group

MUNISING — Dr. Louis A. Wolfanger, East Lansing, professor in land use at Michigan State University and an authority on zoning, will be in Alger County on Thursday, June 13. He will meet with the county planning commission at 7:30 p. m. in the Munising court house.

Dr. Wolfanger has been asked here to assist the Alger Planning Commission in getting started on the development of a county zoning ordinance, according to John P. Campana, extension director.

He will provide information on how townships and counties go about establishing zoning ordinances and the administration and interpretation of zoning ordinances.

At the present time a zoning ordinance is in effect in the City of Munising.

"Effective Tool" Campana pointed out that a zoning ordinance is "an effective tool" to regulate land use so that the community may grow in an orderly manner. It is a legal process in which the zoning board plans the use of the land. Zoning boards cannot change any existing land use.

"A good zoning ordinance tends to zone in, rather than zone out, land use and invites or encourages those uses for which a zoning district seems best adapted. Zoning may best be expressed by the saying, 'A place for everything and everything in its place,'" Campana said.

Copies of the extension folder P-272 on rural zoning may be obtained from the extension office. This booklet written by Dr. Wolfanger gives reason why a community should zone, as well as the basic laws and steps necessary for the enactment of a zoning ordinance.

Three Alger School Districts Seek Added Millage Monday

MUNISING — Three Alger County school districts will be asking for added millage for school operating purposes at the election to be held on Monday, June 10, according to Kemp H. Brown, county superintendent of schools. Involved are Limestone, Onota and AuTrain Townships.

Brown said Limestone and Onota voters are being asked to provide two extra mills locally in order to protect full state aid and full tuition payments from the state aid for their school districts. AuTrain voters are being asked to raise seven mills.

The reason for the difference, Brown said, is that the first two townships have already voted in some extra millage locally, while the locally voted millage of AuTrain will run out by July 1.

The State Aid Act requires that districts must raise 12 mills locally in order to collect full state aid in all categories. "This means that you must vote in at least six-and-eight-tenths mills over and above what was allocated to you by the allocation board at its final meeting on May 29," Brown stated.

Not Enough Money He also stated that no district in Alger County is able to run its schools on the amounts allocated to them from the 15 mill limitation. Therefore all schools, not just some of them, must raise extra millage locally if they are to receive full state aid. They must raise enough locally to make a total of 12 mills, he noted.

"If there is no appeal from the action of the allocation board, then six-and-eight-tenths extra voted mills are sufficient, but if there is an appeal and it goes through, you will need more than this amount," Brown said.
