Rev. Gosner Delegate To Church Meet

The Rev. Dr. Ivan Gosner of Marquette has been elected a delegate to the jurisdictional conference of the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Church.

Rev. Gosner was the only Upper Peninsula ministerial delegate chosen for the conference, at the Methodist meeting yesterday in Adrian.

The church group also named seven ministerial delegates to the church's general conference. Eight others, besides Rev. Gosner, were picked for the jurisdictional conference.

Bishop Marshall R. Reed, who will administer the mental health and strain fund approved yesterday, was instructed to use it at his discretion for those needing professional help.

Conference delegates, representing 54 churches in eastern Michigan and the Upper Peninsula, also approved a recommendation that the Board of Ministerial Training be requested to give special attention to screening candidates for the ministry, and where advisable, provide psychological testing for the same.

Lacina, Hiker, Held In Flint For Arson

FLINT (AP) — Louis Lacina, known to local physical culture fans as "Loping Louie," is back in the news—but this time it's a crime story, not a publicity gag.

Lacina was arrested too. Redwitz was arrested the first time because, officers said, he was caught trying to burn down Lacina Brothers Garage in April, 1962.

Thursday acting Genesee County Prosecutor Robert Leonard said an investigation linked Lacina with the unsuccessful arson attempt, and a conspiracy warrant was asked for Lacina.

Last month, Lacina walked from Flint to Hancock about 500 miles, in 10 days to prove a man his age. 39, could do it. News dispatches reported almost daily on Lacina's progress.

In addition, the report said that local visitor centers were desirable and some already were operating or planned by rural area development committees.

Charm Overcomes Failure
Accommodations generally fall short of providing "services and satisfaction," the report indicated. It said that the region's charm for urban refugees appeared to have overcome this failure in the past but could not be counted on to do so in the future.

Minor damage occurred to the left front fender of Skoog's automobile, a 1962 four-door sedan, and to Radtke's car, a 1946 pickup.

Both vehicles were driven from the scene under their own power.

Mine, Partly Live, Dismantled In St. Ignace

ST. IGNACE (AP) — An anti-personnel mine of World War II type which was found embedded in the wall of a tavern here was described as partly live after it was dismantled by experts at Kincheloe Air Force Base.

Steve Tokarski, owner of the Harbor Lights Bar, discovered the three-inch mine when the tavern was remodeled recently. He put it in the tavern basement but de-

cidated later to check on it. State Police took it to Kincheloe AFB. Officers there said most of the explosive had been removed but the detonator was still live. They said it could have caused only slight damage unless held in the hand when discharged.

Winter Deer Losses Light In Central U.P. District

By JEAN WORTH Journal Special Correspondence The past winter was a comparatively mild one for yarding deer and, compared to the winter of 1961-62, over winter losses were light, reports Joseph Vogt, Escanaba, conservation department district game supervisor.

Snow depths were subnormal. Three of the six gauges reporting did not reach 13 feet of snow during the winter. Gavinn had a maximum of 1.2 feet on Feb. 25, Marquette a maximum of 1.2 feet on Feb. 11, Esnig 1.3 on Feb. 25. Snow was disappearing by the end of the first week in April in most places in the district, which entered Marquette and Delta Counties and the west half of Alger.

Reader's Corner Man-Utter Race

Dear Sir: Your man-otter combat story of several weeks ago brings to mind another man-otter "angle" related to me by French-English wilderness trapper Andy Tyson of Killarney, Ontario.

Extremely cold with record breaking temperatures began about the first week in January and persisted through February. The ice opening area had 51 days of zero or below temperatures. A normal winter has 20 such days.

Deer range improvements using the D-7 bulldozer with cutting blade were started. One of the heaviest use of swamp cuttings was in the Whitefish River valley, where as many as 350 deer a day were seen in the cuttings. Increased U.S. Forest Service cuttings in critical areas such as St. Jacques and the Whitefish River area helped greatly to feed wintering deer, says Vogt.

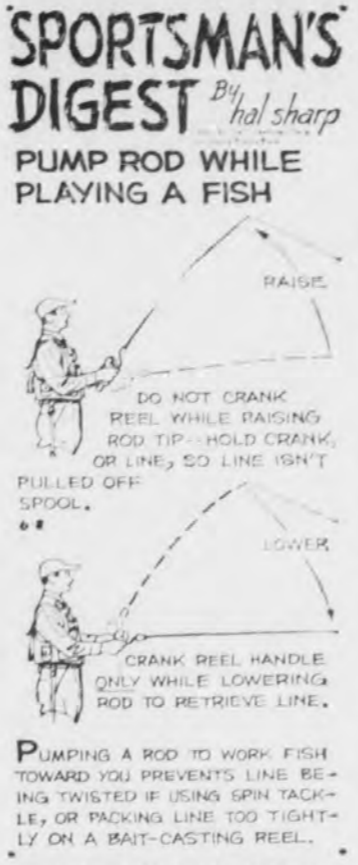
Plan To Lease Porkies Ski Area Stymied
