Bay Cliff Health Camp To Be 'Home' For 170 Handicapped Children

One hundred and seventy physically handicapped children from every county in the Upper Peninsula are expected to attend the Bay Cliff Health Camp near Big Bay in Marquette County this summer.

The camp opens June 24 and closes Aug. 4.

County Quotas
Quotas for each of the counties are: Alger, 12 campers; Baraga, 8; Chippewa, 16; Delta, 8; Dickinson, 15; Gogebic, 8; Houghton-Keweenaw, 22; Iron, 12; Luce, 8; Mackinac, 8; Marquette, 29; Menominee, 8; Ontonagon, 8; and Schoolcraft, 8.

The regular therapy program for the non-profit, non-denominational camp includes physical therapy, occupational therapy, hearing, speech, vision, remedial reading and instruction.

Dental Program Initiated

This year, for the first time, the camp also will conduct a dental program, according to John A. Vargo, Marquette, Bay Cliff executive secretary. A dentist from the Mott Foundation will spend about two weeks at the camp to check thoroughly all of the campers' teeth. If the program proves to fill a definite need, a dental office will be established at the camp next year, Vargo said. The dental program is being underwritten by the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Michigan. Only cost to the camp will be for housing and meals for dental technicians.

Vargo said physical improvements made at the camp since the 1962 camping season include a fire protection and therapy pool, complete laundry equipment (permitting all of the camp's laundry to be handled at the camp) and indoor toilet facilities for all units that lacked them.

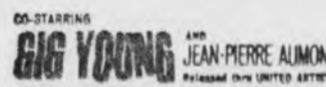

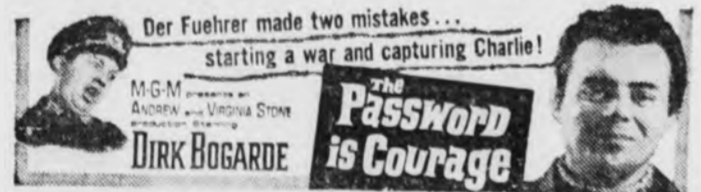

2-Hour Power Outage Caused By Blaze On Electric Utility Pole

City power was out over much of Marquette for nearly two hours last night, and area law officers combined forces to patrol the downtown area during the black-out caused by a fire in a power pole near the university.

Three Marquette firemen responded to the call and, after the current was shut off, used the booster hose of the No. 2 (1,000-gallon) pumper truck to put out the blaze. The pole involved stood on the Northern Michigan University side of the Fair and Presque Isle Ave. intersection.

Although city firemen required less than 15 minutes to douse the flames (they were called from the station at 8:26 p.m. and returned there at 8:41), the power failure resulting from the fire lasted from 8:10 to 10:02 p.m., when service was restored.

Cracked Insulator

City Manager Thomas Moore said the trouble was traced to a large insulator which had been cracked "by a stone, bullet, age" or some other cause. The insulator was on the pole which carried wires at an angle across the street.

According to Moore, wet and foggy weather allows electricity to travel and during such conditions recently in the city, electricity traveled from the insulator to the pole and down the dried-out pole to the ground. Ultimately, Moore said, the combination of circumstances set the pole afire, despite rain which was occurring at the time.

Pole Was Smoking

Moore said he could not estimate how long the insulator had been cracked but noted that several persons employed in the area said they had seen the pole smoking at intervals as early as three days ago.

It finally flared into flame about 8 last night and was reported to city police by attendants of a gas station in the vicinity.

Three crews from the Marquette Light and Power Department were rounded up and at the scene within a half hour, Moore said, but it required some time to repair the damage caused.

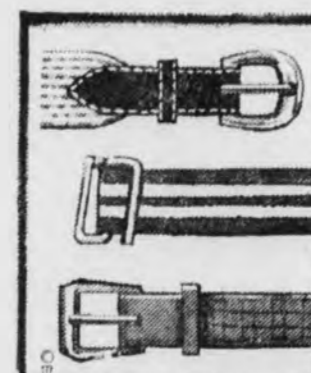

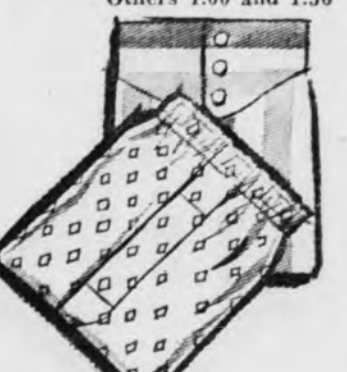

Clearing, Milder Weather To Dispel Rain, Low Readings

Marquette received an inch of rain from midnight to midnight yesterday and temperatures this morning came within two degrees of equalling the all-time low of 36 for the day, set in 1893. However, slightly improved conditions are forecast.

Temperatures yesterday hovered in 12-degree range, from a low of 39 to a high of 51, averaging 45. That was 14 degrees below normal for June 10 and dropped the daily average for the month to 3.2 degrees above normal.

Atmospheric Culprits

Meteorologist Fred Mueller, reporting from the local office of the U. S. Weather Bureau said the cold, wet and windy weather was caused by a meeting of a low pressure area moving east across the northern Midwest with warm moist Gulf air coming up from the south.

The two conditions, on impact, squeezed out the moisture and dumped it on a wide-area Lower Michigan, Wisconsin, Lake Superior and southern Canada.

According to Mueller, the low today was continuing to move in a straight easterly direction, and the cool air was going south, bringing a prediction of clearing

skies later tonight and the possibility of some sunshine tomorrow. However, tomorrow is expected to remain rather cool, with a slight warming trend not in view until about Thursday.

Year's Rain Climbing

Mueller said that, with yesterday's rain fall and an additional .08 of an inch up to 7 this morning, the city had received 2.63 inches this month, while average for this time of June is 1.16. The year's total has climbed to 10.55, which is still below the average for this date 12.27 inches.

Winds varying from southeast at about 15 miles per hour early yesterday to northwest at 10 to 14 MPH later in the day and fog also were in evidence here as June's inclement weather continued to reign.

Forecast Noted

The city's overnight low of 38 compared, as follows, with other area minimums: country airport and Calumet, Sault Ste. Marie, 46; and Escanaba, 41.

Partial clearing and cool is tonight's forecast. The low is expected to be 35 to 40 degrees, while generally fair but continued cool weather is predicted tomorrow, with the high in the mid-50's. The outlook for Thursday is for partially cloudy skies and somewhat milder readings.

NMU's Training Center Here Lauded In Reader's Digest

An article dealing largely with the Area Redevelopment Administration training center operated in Marquette by Northern Michigan University appears in the June issue of Reader's Digest.

Entitled "A Second Chance for George," the article was written by Lester Velle of New York City, a staff writer for Reader's Digest who visited Marquette last winter to gather material for the article.

Was Unemployed Miner

The "George" in the article is George Whitburn, a 47-year-old Ironwood man who lost his \$150-a-week job as a miner when the demand for Gogebic Range underground iron ore slumped. After six months of unemployment, Whitburn was accepted in the machine tool operations training class conducted in a converted garage on Marquette's S. Front St.

Velle points out that the ARA retraining program has encountered many difficulties in other com-

munities, but that it is functioning exceptionally well in Marquette.

"George Whitburn is fortunate, for he lives in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, where local leaders have taken command of retraining," Velle writes. "Northern Michigan University, at Marquette, a new breed of 'multiple purpose' school, seeks, through its Research and Community Development Department, to help employers and workers cope with change. So, when the manpower training funds became available, the university's dean of public services, Claud Bosworth, created a training center by renting the garage where George studies, plus Marquette's abandoned railroad station. He then assigned a faculty member to team up with the regional employment service man to find out what jobs in the area needed filling and to organize committees of businessmen and labor leaders to fashion the training.

"Guided by local leadership, manpower training in Upper Michigan is not only filling jobs; it is creating them. By training cooks and managers for restaurants and motels, the program is stimulating the Upper Peninsula's young tourist industry. By training lumber graders, the program helps small lumber companies to survive. Retraining classes supplying welders and machine tool operators are helping small industries to make their own parts."

Investigation into a complaint concerning alleged excessive truck traffic on three streets will be made by city officials.

The complaint was filed by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Pellinen, 1901 Neidhart Ave. at last night's regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission.

They said they were speaking on behalf of residents of Clark, Wetton and Neidhart Aves., asked "what can be done" about putting a stop to Gannon Lumber Co. trucks being driven through the residential area enroute to the Cliffs Dow Chemical Co. plant.

Said Raish Used Other Route

The Pellinens said around eight or 10 Gannon trucks are driven through that area hourly. The noise "is unbearable," they said, and the traffic "is ruining the streets and endangering the lives of children."

They added that a different route was used when the mill was operated by Freeman Raish. Concerning League Meeting

Requests for exceptions to the zoning ordinance are ruled on by a simple majority vote of the five-member appeal board.

Appeals Listed

- 1. Verne J. McCall, 3022 Lake Shore Blvd., for permission to construct a garage one foot from the lot line, which is closer than the ordinance permits.
- 2. Charles J. Johnson, 1303 Lincoln Ave., for permission to erect a garage which, when completed, will leave a total side lot width of 10 feet (instead of the required 12 feet).
- 3. Mrs. Don Kangas, 127 W. Arch St., for permission to allow the operator of the beauty shop at that address to reside at a different address.

The appeal board said the zoning ordinance requires that such professional establishments as the latter are permitted in residential areas only if the owner resides at the address where the establishment is located.

Pressure For Water Low, Group Says

Protests concerning the alleged low water pressure on Bluff St. were received at last night's regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission.

The objections were made by 31 residents of Bluff St., who petitioned the commission "to have the low water pressure matter investigated and remedied."

They said their area "does not seem to have benefited any since the installation of the huge water storage tank two blocks north of this area on Lincoln Ave." In fact, they added, "there has been less pressure since the tank was put in use."

'Due To Service Taps'

But City Water Superintendent Merrill W. Froney believes otherwise.

"The low water pressure in this area is due to the service taps," he said. "These taps, of the old type, should be replaced."

Froney asserted that several other taps onto the same water main, of the same size, which have been made recently have resulted in adequate water pressure to the residences involved.

Says Size Doesn't Matter

"The size of the water main doesn't matter," Froney stated.

"The trouble is in the service taps themselves."

An unidentified resident of Bluff St., told the commission that his water tap shows 42 pounds pres-

sure, which "drops in half" when a valve is opened.

Froney discounted the statement, saying the pressure should remain the same.

The commission asked City Manager Thomas Moore and Froney to investigate the matter further and explain the situation to the residents.

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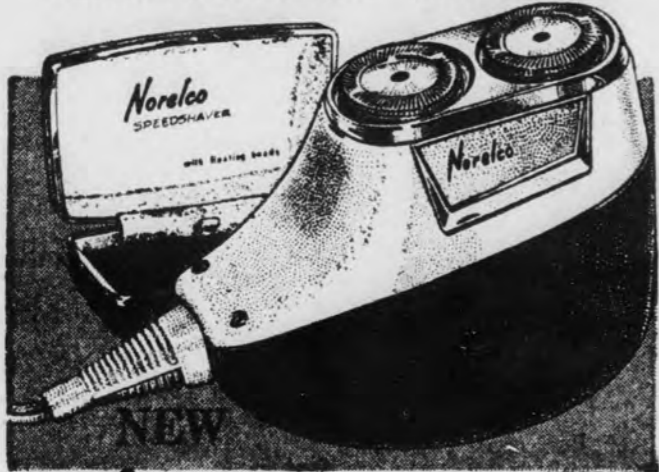

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Area's School Election Results:

Millage Levy Wins In Chocolate; 'Write-In' Elected In Township

A proposal to continue the millage levy was approved and William Bushford and Victor Mattson were elected to positions on the board of education in the Chocolate Township school election yesterday.

Three candidates had filed nominating petitions for the two three-year terms available on the school board.

Rushford received 82 votes, Mattson received 81, and a third candidate, Mrs. Marie Wittler, received 51.

The millage proposal was passed by a vote of 65 to 42. The levy is not an increase over the previous rate, but a continuation of the levy for the past three years.

The proposal, the same as the previous one, asked for a 13.5 mill levy on all property in the school district, as finally equalized, for general operating purposes.

Marquette Township An incumbent and a write-in candidate were elected to the Marquette Township Board of Education in yesterday's election.

Orin Doucette, a slips candidate, received the largest number of votes, 41. Also elected was Howard Berryman, who received 37 votes.

Berryman completed his second term on the school board this year. Roland Bourdage, another write-in candidate, received 33 votes and Charles Aho, whose name appeared on the ballot, received 23 votes.

Doucette fills a vacancy created by Joseph Bingham, who served on the board for the past three years and who did not seek election this year.

Other members of the Marquette Township school board are Hans Muelle, Mrs. Carol M. Bocklund and Edward Hella.

Skandia School District Two incumbents were re-elected to the board of education yesterday in Skandia School District, which includes Skandia and West Branch Townships.

Re-elected to serve three-year terms were Ben Lindberg who has previously served five terms, and Gustaf Carlsson, who has previously served one term.

Lindberg received 37 votes and Carlsson received 56. Also elected to fill a one-year vacancy was Mrs. Carol Spitz, who was appointed in January to serve until the election. She received 59 votes.

One other candidate on the ballot, Mrs. Donna Tregembo, received eight votes. There were two write-in votes.

Sixty-six persons voted in the Skandia election. Other members of the board are Mrs. John Heath and Gilbert Johnson. The board has tentatively scheduled a meeting Friday night to elect officers.

Powell Township Mrs. Janet Havel and Mrs. Eleanor Bowers were elected to fill two three-year positions on the Powell Township Board of Education yesterday.

on the school district board of education by Sands Township voters yesterday.

Mrs. Yelle, who received 32 votes, had previously served for three years. Hupp, who received 33 votes, had been appointed in January to fill a six-months vacancy.

Also approved in Sands Township was the seventh and eighth grade proposal by a vote of 34 in favor to 3 against. The proposal, which continues the present situation, was for seventh and eighth graders to attend the Gwinna Public Schools.

A millage proposal, which continues the present levy of 5 1/2 mills for operating expenses for another five years, was approved by a vote of 31 to 3.

The big drapes cloaking the commission chamber were opened, but even the weather refused to cooperate, as the rain, fog and clouds curbed most of the waning daylight from entering the darkened city hall.

Thomas Kildahl, McClennan St., asked the commission to refund him the money paid to date on a special assessment for a sewer line to serve Lot 86 in Kildahl's Subdivision No. 4.

Kildahl said the sewer line on Gray St. installed to serve that lot is two feet higher than the basement and floor, and the house now under construction there must be connected to the sewer line on Mildred Ave., now being installed by Oliver Feitner, who is the owner of the remaining lots in that block.

The commission ordered the matter taken under study and referred it to City Manager Leonard Moore, City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea and the department heads involved.

Bids On Scrap Copper Following Moore's recommendation, the commission accepted the high bid of Jack Purple of Marquette, at 25.5 cents per pound, on approximately 9,500 pounds of scrap bare copper wire which the city wanted to sell.

Other offers received were from Leo Glass, Marquette, 22.87 cents per pound; Howard Fissette, Marquette, 23.5 cents; and Ishpening Steel Corp., Ishpening, 25.025 cents.

New Jersey Restricts Freeway Billboards TRENTON, N. J. (AP) — Gov. Richard J. Hughes has signed a bill restricting billboards along interstate freeways in New Jersey.

The measure meets federal standards and will bring the state about \$4 million in extra federal highway aid over the next 10 years.

The billboard measure provides for state control over billboards within 600 feet of new interstate freeways. The federal government pays an extra one half per cent aid to states that adopt legislation meeting its standards.

Signing of the bill by Hughes beats a June 30 deadline for qualifying for the extra aid.

City Meet Ends 'In Dark'; Bid Accepted; Sewer Refund Asked

Members of the Marquette City Commission literally ended their regular meeting in the city hall last night "in the dark."

The session came to an abrupt halt around 8:30 after the main power line leading to the downtown area via Presque Isle Ave. went out (see other story).

All Business Handled Anyway However, every item on the agenda had been disposed of by that time and even several other matters brought up by City Manager Thomas Moore had been taken care of when the "blackout" occurred.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Pleaugh asked the city commission to approve a transfer of a 1963 Tavern license (for sale of beer and wine by the glass) and of an SDM license (for the sale of packaged beer and wine) located at 922 W. Washington St.

The Pleaugh's want to purchase the business (Bill's Tavern) from Marion J. Bessex.

The commission had previously denied the transfer to him, but had agreed to transfer the license to her.

However, she noted, in an appeal to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, that the MLCC does not authorize such transfer unless the husband also is a licensee. A hearing on the appeal will be held July 15 by the MLCC.

The commission set the matter for decision at its next regular meeting, with Commissioner Elmer A. Carlson noting that not all the commissioners were present (Commissioner James R. Smith was absent) and that the delay would give them additional time to study the matter.

The commission also was notified by City Clerk Everett H. Kent of a change (19A) made in the state plat law, concerning the status of land for which plats are sought.

The change requires the owner of the plat to certify that the property in question is not subject to flooding or to flooding waters.

Kent said the change was added to the state law because of the excessive amount of trouble experienced downstate by flooding of platted land.
