



City Approves Longevity Pay, Sick Leave Hike

The commission has accepted as to form a resolution amending the city code to allow a maximum sick leave accumulation of 120 days, an increase of 15 over the former limit of 105 days.

Since the amendment is not a "penal type" provision, it is not necessary to hold a public hearing on the issue, explained City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea, and the amendment will be adopted at the commission's last regular meeting this month, which session also is the final one of the 1962-63 fiscal

Another resolution, which, in effect, provides for a bonus, payable Dec. 20, 1963 and each Dec. 20 thereafter, offers longevity pay, depending on the number of years of service.

The longevity pay resolution also includes a resolution to provide for sick leave accumulation benefits for employees who may retire before the amendment (referred to above) goes into effect

Paid One-Half Of Amount

The amendment, which changes Section 12.2 of Ordinance 210, also spells out how the sick leave is accumulated (no change from the previous method), but does inaugurate a payment for half of the employee's accumulated sick leave.

Under the amendment, the employee, in good standing, on retirement or separation from city service, following at least 10 years of service, is paid one-half of any sick leave time accumulated up to that In the event of his death, this

amount is paid to his estate or otherwise, as he may have desig-


