



# Canadian Ore Ship Loaded In City As Pickets Defy Order

Supervisory personnel of the Soo Line Railroad Co. loaded a Canadian ore carrier here last night while pickets of the Seafarers International Union, Great Lakes district, defied a restraining order and continued to picket against loading.

Ten supervisory personnel of the Soo Line loaded the ship, berthed at the lower harbor dock since Tuesday night. The carrier, the Red Wing, is operated by Upper Lakes Shipping Co., Ltd. of Toronto.

### 50 Walk Off Jobs

Members of the SIU (AFL-CIO) began to picket in lower harbor at 7:10 p.m. Tuesday when the Red Wing docked. About 30 Soo Line dock workers refused to cross the picket line and walked off the dock Tuesday night.

Picketing continued, despite the restraining order, until the Red Wing was loaded at 12:20 this morning with 22,000 tons of Eagle Mills pellets. The ship then steamed out of lower harbor bound for Hamilton, Ontario.

Upper Lakes Shipping Co. Ltd. also operates the Northern Venture, which was involved in a somewhat similar dispute with the SIU here in 1961.

### 'Depriving Seamen Of Jobs'

A sign carried by pickets while the Red Wing was docked in lower harbor stated that the Canadian firm is "depriving American seamen of jobs on the Great Lakes."

John E. McDonald, Marquette, attorney for the plaintiff, Upper Lakes Shipping Co., said a restraining order and an order to show cause why a temporary injunction against the union shouldn't be issued was signed by Circuit Judge Ernest Brown of Iron Mountain yesterday.

The restraining order was served on five SIU pickets, all of them from Duluth by the Marquette County Sheriff's Department yesterday.

Marquette County Circuit Judge Bernard H. Davidson of Negaunee disqualified himself from the case on grounds that he had been a member of a law firm that represented one of the parties involved in the Northern Venture affair here.

Upper Lakes Shipping Co. Ltd., has been plagued with labor troubles since 1961.

Last June its ships, including the Seaway Queen, the Northern Venture and the Gordon C. Leitch, were picketed by members of the International Longshoremen's Association at the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Co. dock in upper harbor.

Pickets Active Elsewhere  
SIU pickets have been active this season at ports in Ohio and at Milwaukee where Upper Lakes ships have docked for loading.

The dispute involves the unions' claim that Upper Lakes is an American-owned company and should employ American rather than Canadian seamen.

The Great Lakes district of the SIU claims that it is not interfering with the internal economy of the ship through picketing, but us-

ing the method to call to the attention of the public the fact that American money is being diverted to Canadian ships.

### In Canadian Union

Upper Lakes is controlled by Norris Grain Co. of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, which in turn is controlled by Norris Grain Co. of Chicago.

Crews on the Upper Lakes fleet were formerly represented by the Canadian division of the SIU, but are now members of the Canadian Maritime Union.

# Construction, Maintenance Jobs On County Roads Told

Construction and maintenance projects carried out on state trunklines and county roads in Marquette during the past month are reviewed in the monthly report of H. L. Schroeger, Marquette, superintendent-engineer of the county road commission.

The snowstorm last month necessitated the placing of 1.1 tons of calcium chloride and 20 tons of rock salt on slippery state trunkline surfaces, Schroeger said.

**Shoulder Repairs**

Road surface and shoulder repair jobs on trunklines accounted for the placing of 28.8 tons of blacktop, 21 tons of crushed gravel, 365 gallons of asphalt prime and 18.8 tons of cover stone.

In addition, 52 guard posts were replaced, 1 road sign repaired and 154 cubic yards of rubbish and debris were picked up and removed from state trunklines, he added.

**County Road Construction**

Schroeger said 1.84 miles of local roads were reconstructed in May in preparation for blacktop paving operations. These projects are being carried out in cooperation with the Township Boards and are located in Champion and Chocolay Townships.

The completed construction accounted for the placing of 2,937 cubic yards of earth fill, 880 cubic yards of gravel, 1,914 tons of crushed gravel, 56 guard rail posts, 72 lineal feet of metal culvert pipe and two tons of calcium chloride.

The gravel surface construction project on Road 537 was completed during the month with the placing of 6,800 cubic yards of gravel and 6,687 tons of crushed gravel.

The reconstruction of Road 480 from Negaunee City to U. S. 41, in preparation for blacktop paving was started during the month. 5,600 lineal feet of brush was cut and removed, 6,752 cubic yards of gravel, 1,388 tons of crushed gravel, 3.5 tons of calcium chloride and 188 lineal feet of metal pipe culvert were placed. This portion of the project accounted for the improvement of 1.75 miles of road grade.

The crushing plants produced 3,779 tons of crushed gravel during the month.

**Maintenance Work**

Snow and ice removal operations accounted for the use of two tons of rock salt, 1.1 tons of calcium chloride and 12 cubic yards of chlorinated-sand on county roads.

Road surface and shoulder repair required the placing of 698 tons of crushed gravel and 352 cubic yards of gravel. In addition, 915 cubic yards of frost heave material was excavated and 682 cubic yards of sand backfill was replaced. The black top plant produced 911 tons of patching material during the month.

He said 84 lineal feet of culvert were placed, 20 guard rail posts were installed, four signs were replaced and six signs repaired.

Also, 29 cubic yards of rubbish and debris were picked up and removed from county roadsides and 28.3 tons of calcium chloride were used in dust abatement operations.

In improving the trailer site facilities and the boat ramp at Perkins Park, 178 cubic yards of gravel and 83.5 tons of crushed gravel were placed, and 21 trees were cut and removed.

# Trailer Court Request Here To Be Studied

Being studied by City Manager Thomas Moore and the various department heads involved is a request for the installation of facilities for a trailer court in Marquette.

The request was made by William K. Gannon of Eisemann's Motor Court, who said he would like to start installation of such facilities on property which he owns directly behind his present site off Wright St.

However, to accomplish this, he said, the only practical means of access from Wright St. is over property owned by the City of Marquette. Gannon asked the city to grant an easement for a roadway over this city-owned property.

"There is an existing road there which, he said, if widened and extended would make an adequate access road to the proposed site of the trailer court.

"Would Fill Need"

"This proposed trailer court," Gannon said, "is to be for the use of overnight guests. We feel that its installation will fill a very definite need for such a facility in the city.

"However, if we find that the court does not sustain itself as an overnight facility, we may extend its use to a sufficient number of permanent guests to offset the maintenance costs.

"This, however, will not interfere with the trailer court's primary purpose of providing space for overnight tourists."

Mayor Pro Tem Steve A. E. Johnson said he, Mayor C. Fred Rydholm and City Clerk Everett H. Kent had gone over the property, which lies west and north of the motor court. "They want to fix up this property," he said.

City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea, asked for comment, said the city should determine if the roadway would affect the city's power plant operations in that area and reserve the right in the easement to have the easement reverted in the event the property ceases to be used for this purpose.

A report on the matter will be given by the manager at the next city meeting.

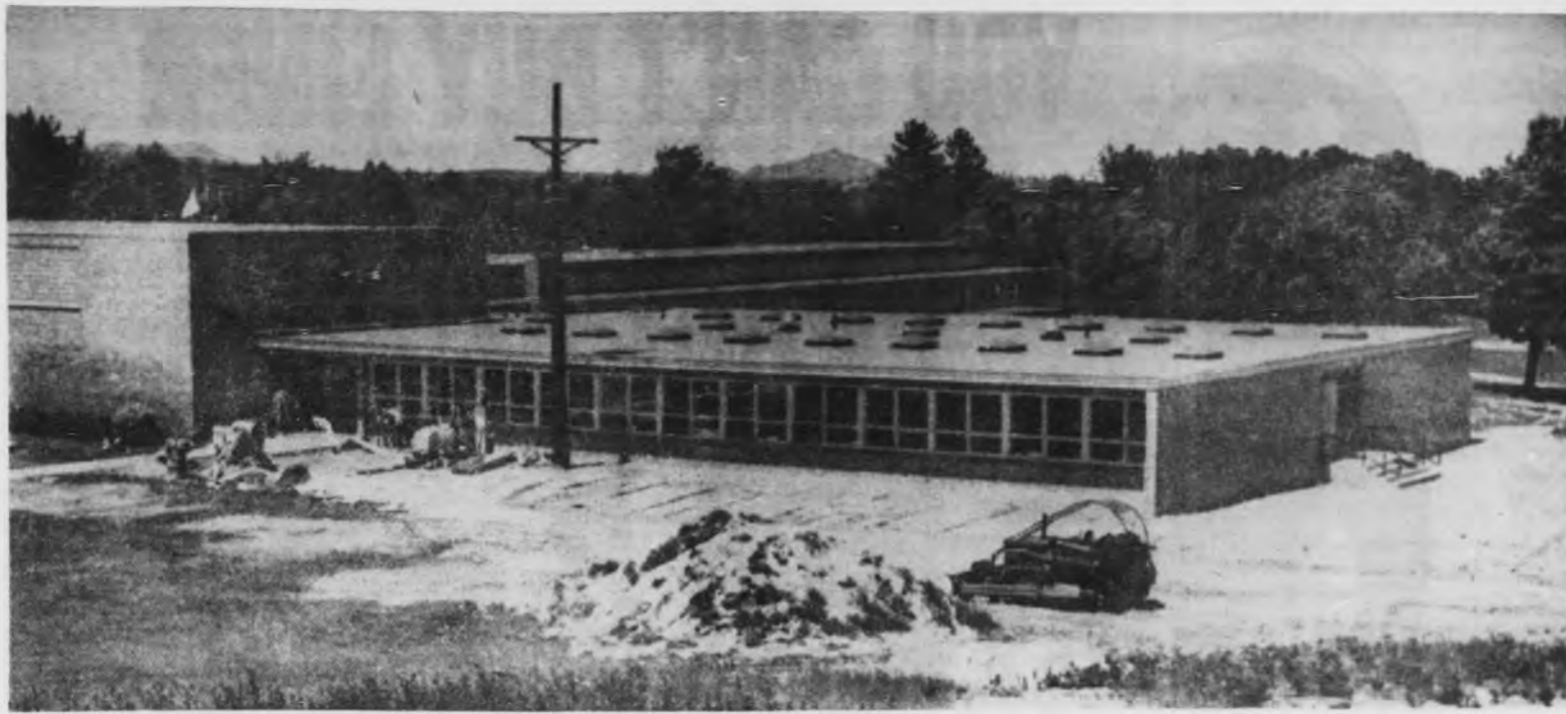

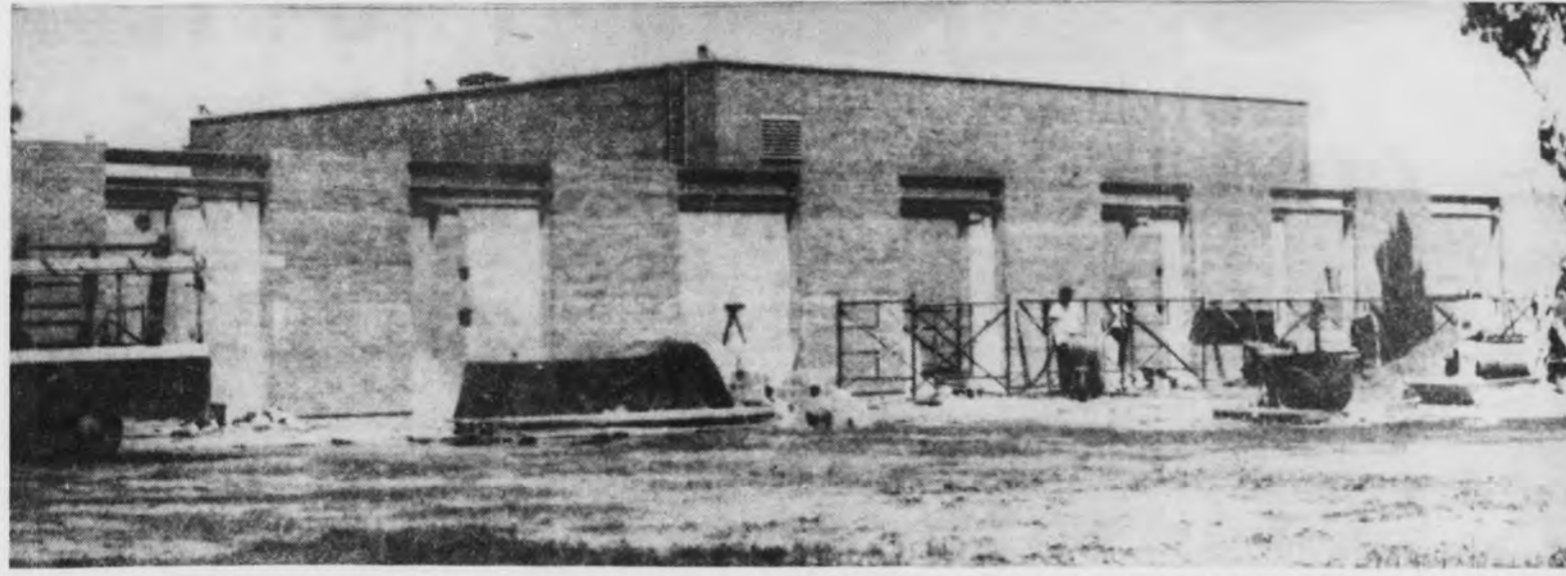

## Construction Work On School Projects 'Going On Schedule'

Work on the public schools' three construction projects is progressing on schedule, Wilho Kilpela, clerk of the works for the three projects, reported to school board members this week.

If construction continues on schedule, completion deadlines for all three projects will be met, Kilpela said.

The fall of 1964 is listed as occupancy date for the Marquette Senior High School by Caspian

Construction Co., Caspian, general contractor. This means that senior and junior high school students have only one more year on split shifts, board members noted.

For the six-room addition to Whitman Elementary School, completion date is set for Aug. 1. Kilpela noted that specifications call for a \$100-a-day penalty for work done on the addition after Aug. 1. Completion date for the six-room

addition to Sandy Knoll Elementary School is Sept. 1.

At the senior high school site, 60 men are now on the job, pushing to have construction 50 per cent completed by the end of October, Kilpela said.

If the October half-way point deadline is met, the roof will be on the building before the snow comes, Kilpela reported.

**Foundation Almost Finished**

"Foundation work is almost completed at the high school and next month you'll be able to see construction above ground," Kilpela told board members.

The five per cent construction point at the new high school was completed on schedule May 31, he said. He noted that workers at the high school site lost two and a half days earlier this month because of rain.

Caspian Construction was awarded the general construction contract for the high school at \$1,544,000. Electrical contractor is M. J. Electric, Inc., Iron Mountain, for \$193,886, and mechanical contractor is Industrial Piping Co.,

## Escanaba Opens Centennial Celebration Next Sunday

ESCANABA — This city, which is debating the meaning of its name after using it for 100 years, is celebrating its centennial June 30-July 7 with a week of festivities.

The city takes its name from the Escanaba River, of which Longfellow wrote in his Song of Hiawatha, and the Algonquian Indian name for it has usually been translated as "Flat Rock." Years ago an alternate and competitive translation of "Land of the Red Buck" was offered, and it was argued that it had much more tourist appeal than "Flat Rock."

**'Century Book' Published**

The historians suggested that it

smacked of "Land of the Fast Buck" and was very shaky linguistically, and they seem to have prevailed in "The Century Book," which has been published to chronicle Escanaba's first century.

The city, which got its great industrial impetus as an iron port, still is one of the greatest ports on the Great Lakes and the only one on Lake Michigan. The Peninsula Railroad completed its line from the Jackson Mine at Neegaunee to Escanaba, and part of the early ore went to Fayette on the Garden Peninsula to be smelted in charcoal iron furnaces.

The port still ships five million tons of ore a year and serves the Menominee, Marquette and Gogebic Ranges.

**From Wood To Metal**

Escanaba's wood chemical, charcoal iron and big sawmill industries have flourished and disappeared in a century, but wood industry still is important and the city is a large producer of fine veneers and paper, cedar fencing, timber homes, saunas, wood novelties and lumber.

Metal working has succeeded much wood working, however, and the city's industrial effigy is a 40-foot-high cut-out of Big Ole. He was Paul Bunyan's blacksmith, and the city has shifted part of its job dependence from mythical Paul, the woodsman, to his smith, Harnischfeger Corp. of Milwaukee is the largest employer. It manufactures welders, truck cranes and excavators in Escanaba. Top taxpayers and a big employer is paper making Mead Corp.

**Sunday's Activities**

The center of centennial festivities will be Ludington Park on the city's Little Bay de Noc shore, named for Nelson and Harrison Ludington, pioneer Chicago lumbermen who had operations here. The park is larger than Vatican State.

The opening Sunday will offer Protestant and Catholic field services, the Navy Chuting Stars air show, crowning of the centennial queen and Venetian Night. There will be contestants, entertainments and pageantry throughout the

week and a three-hour parade on Saturday morning, July 6.

**To Dedicate Two Schools**

The Saturday afternoon highlight will be a beard shaving contest sponsored by a national manufacturer of electric razors, which will clean the chins of thousands of men who have grown whiskers for the centennial. Those who shaved had to buy a shaving permit which helped finance the program.

Centennial milestones will be dedication of the new \$3,500,000 Escanaba Area High School on Sunday, June 30, and dedication on Tuesday evening, July 2, of the new Bay de Noc Community College, which will open in September.

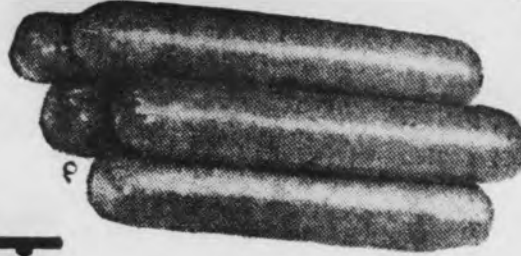

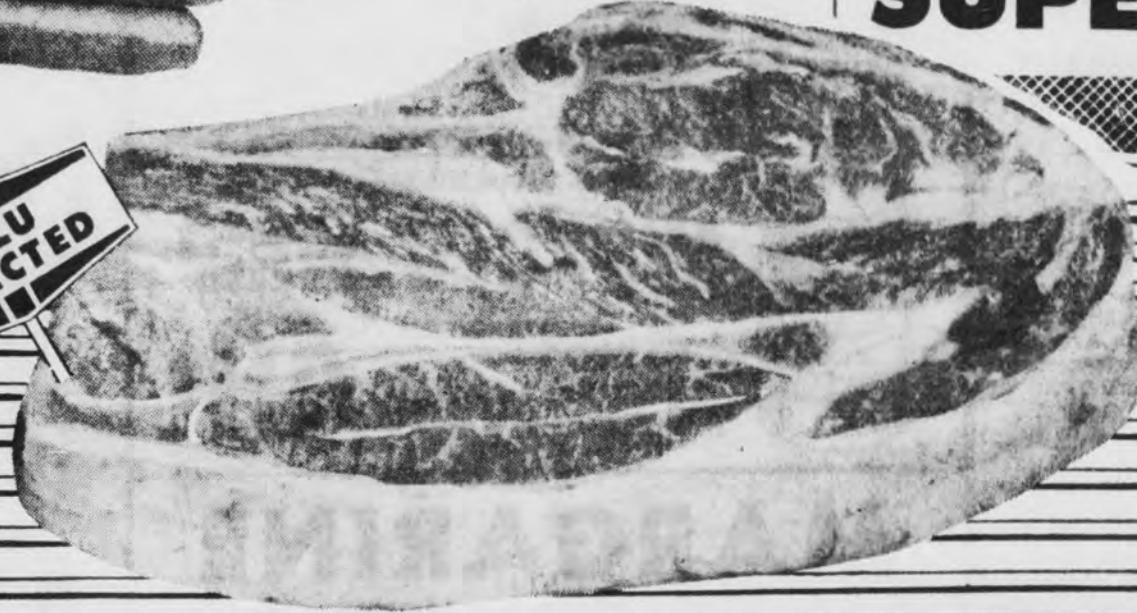

**State's Cities Ask Revenue Guarantee**

LANSING (AP)—Spokesmen for city government have asked Gov. George Romney to guarantee that any loss of municipal revenues resulting from state fiscal reform be replaced, even if it means tapping new sources of revenue.

That cities cannot afford to lose revenues assured them under the present system of taxation—and need more—were major points laid down Wednesday by the Michigan Municipal League's board of trustees, during a five-hour meeting with Romney.

Romney declined to say if his position on any aspect of fiscal reform had been influenced to the point of change. But he said in reference to what league spokesmen told him:

**Confident**  
"I got the point." Romney said he was confident a majority of those present favored fiscal reform.

William Kirby of Grosse Pointe Farms, president of the MML, told newsmen afterward no concrete program for fiscal reform will be advocated by the league.

"Our chief concern is how the state would agree to make up revenues lost to cities through such action as abolishment of the intangibles tax or reduction of the sales tax," said Kirby.

**Points**  
Outlined by the MML were these points:

- Any loss of city revenues through tax reform would have to be replaced in some manner by the state.

- Cities and villages would oppose any restrictions imposed by the legislature on their power to levy non-property taxes under the new Constitution.

Robert Fryer, director of the MML, said the league's view is that the new Constitution grants cities broad self-executing powers that would include the levying of non-property taxes.

Turkeys are selling for about 39 cents a pound in many shops as dealers seek to clear out frozen stocks to make way for fall arrivals.

Beef prices have shown little sign of breaking out of the low pattern of recent weeks. Best buys are in round, chuck and rib roasts. One national chain offers bottom round at 69 cents a pound and top round at 75 in the New York area.

Broiler-fryer prices run about 39 cents a pound but are featured at lower levels many places. Some Southwestern shops are tagging them as low as 25 cents a pound this weekend.

Other firms competing are Bell Helicopter Co., Ft. Worth, Texas; Hiller Aircraft Co., Palo Alto, Calif., and Hughes Tool Co., Aircraft Division, Culver City, Calif. The Army is expected to order 275 helicopters for use in basic training of Army aviators, General Sibley said. Enstrom Corp. already has received commercial orders for helicopters and is breaking ground next week for a 20,000-square foot

plant at the Menominee Airport. **Meets Requirements** Army aviation experts sent to Menominee earlier this year found the small firm and its product met exacting military requirements, Sibley said. A military contract could create as many as 500 new jobs in Menominee and hundreds more in Upper Peninsula supplier plants, he added.

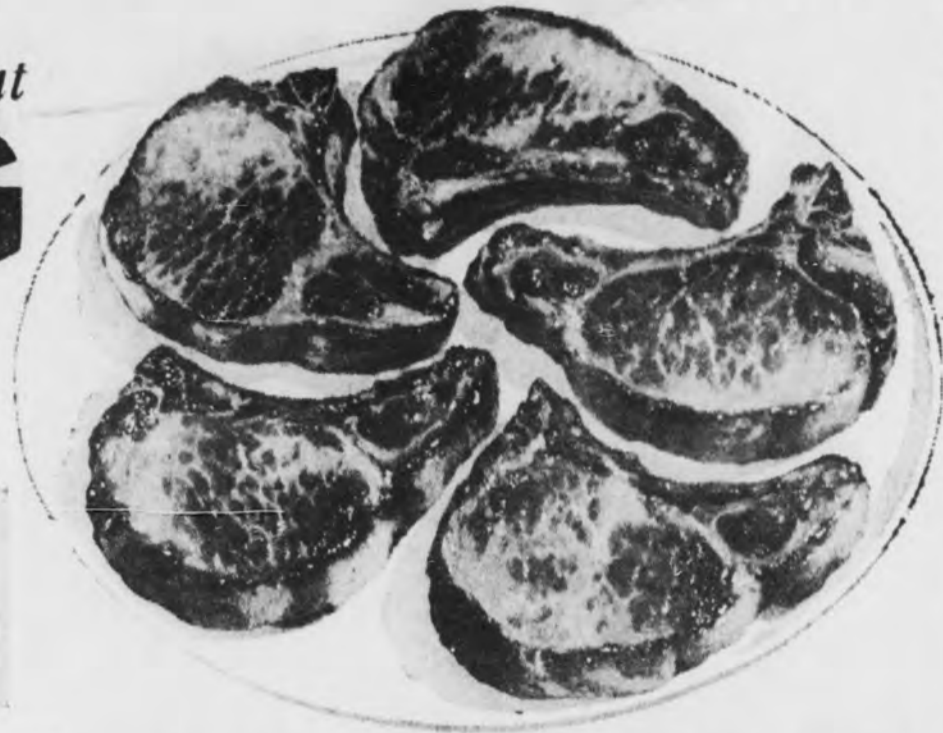

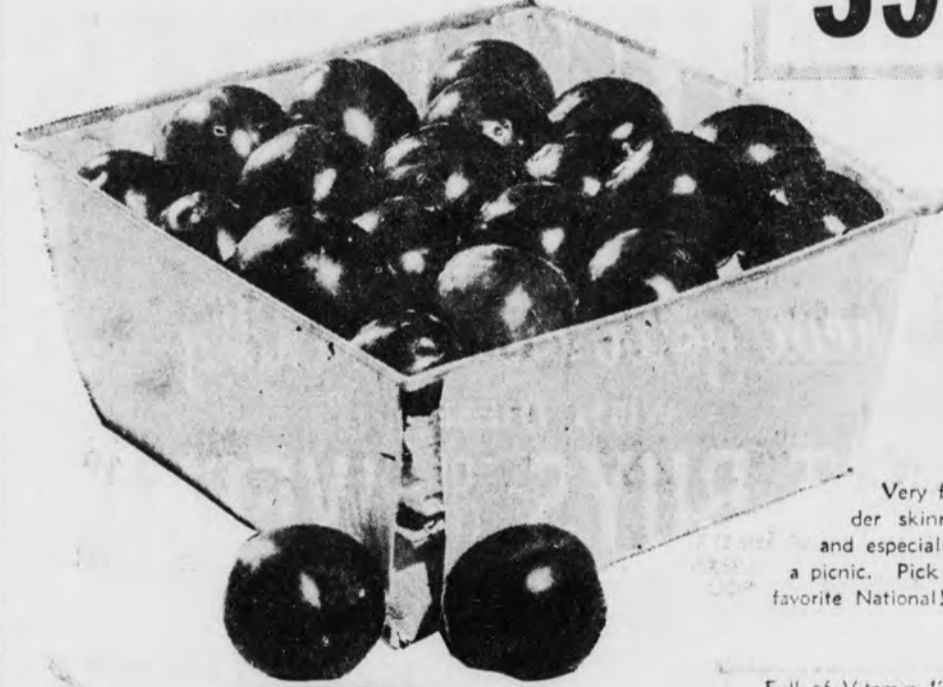

Area Group At MARC's Conference

A child's response to a red light in a dark room may hold a clue to why he is mentally retarded, a large delegation attending the annual conference of the Michigan Association for Retarded Children held over the weekend at Alma College were told by an expert.

Willard C. Evert of Marquette, regional vice-president of the association, reported today that Carl H. Poit, clinical psychologist at Lapeer State Home and Training School, reported at the conference that a method developed by him and Stanley W. Bennett, also of Lapeer, may prove a simple technique for distinguishing between brain-damaged children and those who are slowed mentally because of environment or other factors.

Techniques used at Plymouth State Home and Training School for improving the physical condition of severely retarded children were demonstrated by George Andrews, physiotherapist and director of adjunctive therapies. Results of this program at Plymouth have received national attention.

Plans Outlined Dr. Floyd Hampton, consultant in mental retardation for the Michigan Department of Health, outlined state plans for intensifying maternal and child health services in a major attack on mental retardation resulting from lack of prenatal care, inadequate nutrition, and prematurity.

Closing the session, Dr. Robert W. Talley, Ford Hospital physician and president of the Michigan Association, said public attitudes reflect confusion with mental illness and urged further emphasis on physical aspects of the handicap. "We tend to forget that the brain actually exists," Dr. Talley said. "If it fails to develop or suffers damage, this is a physical handicap which must be evaluated on such terms. Programs for these children will differ widely from those for the emotionally disturbed, whose functional difficulties may be improved or cured."

In addition to Evert, the Upper Peninsula delegation included Mrs. J. O. Simon, who teaches children in the Marquette School for Trainable Retarded Children; Dr. George Maniaci, Gladstone, a past president of the Delta County Retarded Children's Association; and Joseph Lakovic, president of the Menominee County RCA.

Saint Paul Of Chartres Sisters, Coming To U. P. Soon, Visitors In Diocese

Three top administrators of the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres, France, who are establishing a foundation in the Catholic Diocese of Marquette this summer, have just completed a visit to several communities in the Upper Peninsula and a two-day conference here with the Most Rev. Thomas L. Noa, bishop of the diocese.

The trio included Mother Marie Paul, the order's Casa Generalizia (administrative headquarters) in Rome; Mother Anne de St. Jean, chief counselor of the order, also from the Rome headquarters; and Sister Bernadette Charles, who has been serving in the Philippines and is to be the first superior of the new foundation.

Accompanied by the Very Rev. Msgr. Edmund C. Szoka, assistant chancellor of the diocese, the nuns visited first in Sault Ste. Marie following their entry into the United States from Canada and then went on to Manistique, Escanaba, Menominee and Iron Mountain. They concluded their tour in Marquette, where they will establish their provincial house (motherhouse) in Holy Family Home.

The three nuns made an inspection of the Bishop Noa Home for Senior Citizens in Escanaba and Menominee's St. William School, both of which they will staff, and of Holy Family Home, where they will continue to care for children housed there under the aegis of Catholic Social Services. Sight-seeing tours were included in their itinerary.

Novitiate Planned Here Msgr. Szoka reported today that the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres plan eventually to establish a novitiate at Holy Family Home in connection with the provincial house. Although they will be ready to accept postulants (young women interested in joining the order) immediately after their arrival here this summer, the novitiate will not be established until there is enough growth in religious vocations among young women of the area to warrant it. In the meantime, the first postulants wishing to continue in the religious life will be sent to one of the order's other English-speaking novitiates, one of which is in Rome.

A total of 15 nuns, all of them fluent in English, is included in the first group arriving in the Upper Peninsula. Six of these, who have been teaching in the Philippines, will be assigned to St. William's in Menominee; there are also four Irish nuns, two Canadian and two French among the others assigned to the area. Sister Bernadette Charles is of French descent.

The Marquette Diocese foundation will be the first to be established by the Order of St. Paul of Chartres in the United States. The order, begun in France in 1694 and headquartered in Chartres since 1802, operates missions, schools, colleges and hospitals in several other countries throughout the world. Present membership in the order totals 3,500.

When Bishop Noa and Msgr. Szoka were in Rome last fall for the opening sessions of the Ecumenical Council, they conferred with Mother Marie Paul about various matters related to the proposed foundation in the Marquette diocese, and soon after the first of the year plans were set in motion to finalize its establishment this summer. Efforts to bring the St. Paul nuns to the diocese, however, were actually initiated by the bishop a year ago.

BY INGRID BARTELLI Consumer Marketing Information Agent, Michigan State University It's the homegrown berry situation that makes life worth living in July. And you'd better consider berries if you want your fruit cellar to be loaded this year.

Why? The rest of the fruit picture doesn't look too hopeful. The damage began last December when the weather knocked out the Florida citrus crop, which will be reduced for the next three years.

Tart and sweet cherries have been severely damaged. Many of you drive to Traverse City (the cherry capital of the world) to get your cherry supply. George McManus, extension marketing specialist for that area, has a message for you. "Sweet cherries are extremely short. What there are will be available about the week end of July 13. Tart cherries will be available beginning about July 22, with best volume July 28. This is also a short crop but best in U. S."

Grapes Scarce Grapes, too, will be practically nonexistent. California is the only state expecting a normal crop. Michigan will suffer a 50 per cent loss of peach crop, though southern states (Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and

the Carolinas) fared better. Practically the entire peach crop was wiped out in Indiana, Illinois, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Colorado.

The apple crop is predicted to be the same as last year. Plenty of prunes, melons, apricots, nectarines and plums are predicted.

Because of the predicted shortage in fruit, you may wish to take advantage of some of the canned "specials" still available from last year's crop.

So it's the berries for you! Strawberry Crop Good The best news in berries is the prospect of the strawberry crop in and juicy. About 85 per cent of the production is the Robinson variety — big and sweet. Sparkles are produced in limited quantity but the favorite of some consumers for freezing.

and cool nights, along with the soil type and the elevation, combine to produce berries that grow big and berries that grow to be sweet and juicy. About 85 per cent of the production is the Robinson variety — big and sweet. Sparkles are produced in limited quantity but the favorite of some consumers for freezing.

Half Shipped Out About half of the berries produced are shipped out by the two grower organizations of the area. The other half of the crop stays here in the Peninsula and is harvested primarily by the folks who drive to the Copper Country to enjoy a day or two in the berry patches to pick their own.

Should you want to pick your own for the first time this year, you must learn the ropes of the game. Many producers have their regular customers to whom they send cards when it's picking time. This way you can be pretty well assured of berries when you get there.

The season is expected to start around the Fourth, which is normal for this area. And because of this, the "clan" congregates in the Copper Country to celebrate the holiday and break in the berry season. The weather in the Copper Country, long warm sunny days

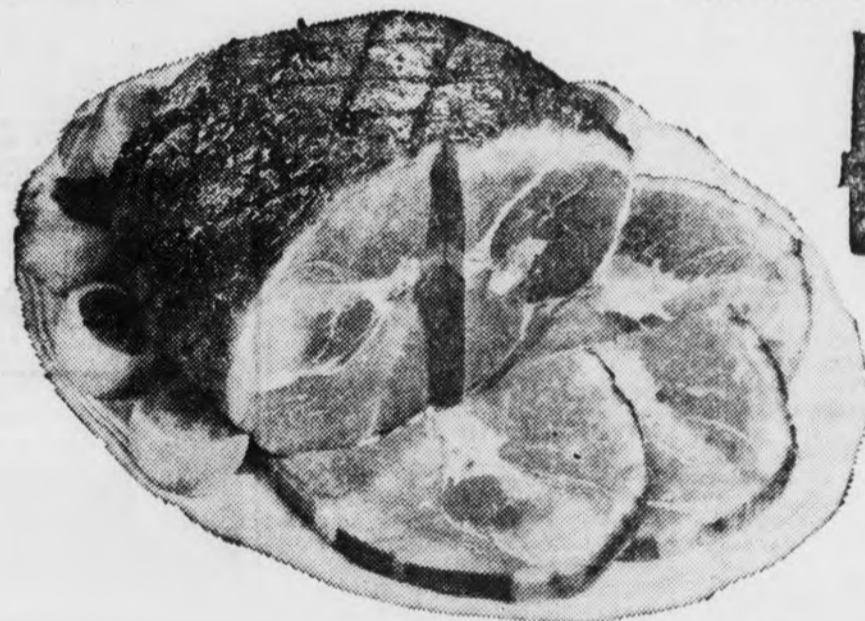

## Pay Hike, Improved Fringe Benefits Asked By Employees

NEGAUNEE — Requests submitted by the Negaunee Local of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Union for pay hikes and improved fringe benefits will be considered by the Negaunee City Council at a special session scheduled for 7:30 tonight.

Other items on the agenda for the special session include a discussion on the municipal water works and the third reading of a proposed anti-peddling ordinance.

CHICAGO (AP) — Teamsters President James R. Hoffa labeled as stupid the 13-week vacation plan in the steel industry.

Major producers and the United Steelworkers Union agreed last week to 13 weeks of paid vacation once every five years for employees with the longest service records.

"They talk about creating 20,000 to 25,000 jobs in the steel industry because of the long vacations," Hoffa told a reporter. "Want to know what those guys
