## Wirtz Moves To Head Off

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz met again today with both sides in the railroad dispute to outline steps the government may take if an agreement is not reached by midnight next Wednesday.

Wirtz, calling the situation deady serious, held an Independence Day conference at the White House with President Kennedy on the threat of a nationwide rail tleup. He said they discussed specific possibilities, presumably ranging from voluntary arbitration to congressional legislation.

Wirtz said the suggestions would be presented to the meeting of railroad and union representatives, but that they contained nothing new. Although he said he was "not going to give up hope." the secretary indicated chances of a negotiated settlement are not

A strike would affect virtually all U.S. railroads and could idle up to 700,000 workers.

The dispute centers around the announced intention of the railroads to institute new work rules, doing away with thousands of jobs which they say are not necessary. They call such jobs





### European Campaign Tour

By WALTER LIPPMANN

President Kennedy's trip to West Germany will be followed in a few days by President de Gaulle's trip. Whatever the official explanation, the fact is that the two heads of state have now involved themselves in a popularity contest. It is an absurd predicament for the western world to be in, both Presidents trying to carry West Germany as though they were candidates in an election

The notion that the character of the Western Alliance and its leadership can be determined by campaigning is a false one. The contest with Gaullist France is not an election, but an exercise in power politics, of which the outcome will be shaped by the astute use of the pieces that each side possesses. The whole conflict, we must remember, began with a press conference which announced an action. The press conference was not an argument. It brought forth the news that the British entry into the Common Market would be vetoed by France. France had the power to apply the veto. The whole subsequent Gaullist movement against the NATO military structure and against an Atlantic low-tariff association has been a series of actions - of withdrawels, abstentions and

Embarrassing Exchange

Since Gaullism is not generally popular in Western Europe, it was tempting to assume that the exasperating disruption of the western system could be stopped by rousing the Europeans to stop it. That has been a misreading of the nature of the issue. Gaullism cannot be thrown back in Europe by electioneering, and it will soon be evident that the cheering crowds in Germany do not mean that Britain will be admitted any sooner to the Common Market or that the grand de-

sign is any nearer realization than it was.

But seeing the conflict as an election problem has led directly to the embarrassing exchange on the subject of American trustworthiness between the President of the United States and General de Gaulle's minister of information. The President of the United States should not put himself in the position of beseeching the Europeans to trust him. Moreover, in the effort to make the Germans trust him, Kennedy laid himself wide open to the Gaullist retort, which was that the French trusted Kennedy, but how could he speak for the "successor of the successor of the successor" of Kennedy.

So grave a matter as the nature of a pledge f life and death should not be declaimed to an excited crowd. When President Kennedy told the Germans that the American government would risk its cities to defend German cities, the occasion did not lend itself to a full explanation of the situation. The situation is that the United States will risk nuclear war to stop an unprovoked aggression against West Germany or West Berlin. But this does not mean that the United States has pledged itself to nuclear war in order to give total support to Bonn's policies in Berlin, in East Germany or beyond the present Polish fron-

Dangerous Method Of Communication The stakes are too high to be played about

with in electioneering speeches. How should the response to Gaullism be nade? Since electioneering is a dangerous method of communication, since the French president does not want to talk directly with the American President and since neither man seems to be able to talk through his ambassador, there remains the classic instrument of diplomacy which is to write notes, some private, some public. The advantages of writing notes are many - chiefly they can be composed deliberately; they are addressed not to the gallery, but to the head of the government, and they are immune to the intoxi-

cating effect of cheering crowds. Not that note writing is likely to resolve the conflict between the two governments. It is a deep conflict hard to resolve, but not necessarily tragic. Note writing might, however, open up channels of communication and perhaps avert an intensification of the popularity contest. For that contest is already on the verge of competitive demagoguery.

The most vitally necessary subject of consultation between Paris and Washington is that of relations with the Soviet Union. It is not the French nuclear deterrent, which is still far in the future and is of no prime importance to this country. It is not the proposed multilateral force, which is now on the shelf. Western relations with the Soviet Union are approaching a point where there might be an opportunity to reach a provisional accommodation.

It is no time for the French and the American governments not to be on speaking terms. (c) 1963. The Washington Post. Co.

#### THE \$10,000 QUESTION

The printing of 10,000 one-dollar bills with mismatched serial numbers was one of the worst errors in the history of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, but the bills are now in circulation and cannot easily be recalled. Coin collectors naturally are inspecting closely the greenbacked surroundings of the portrait of Washington, and a Chicago dealer is reported to be asking \$40 for one misprinted bill. But Bureau Director Henry J. Holtzclaw says the bills are legal tender and should have no special value. Being against inflation, we hope he is right. #### FRYING PAN TO FIRE

Trying to stop Rep. Adam Clayton Powell (D) of New York from junketing at taxpayers' expense, the House of Representatives refused to authorize a trip to Geneva. This, says the UPI, may permit Powell and other members of the Education and Labor Committee to spend more money. Economy advocates may have jumped out of a fiscal frying pan into a fire of free spending.

The reason: State Department has invited the group to go as its guests. The invitation was renewed in spite of the House action. Like other federal bureaus, State has access to "frozen" foreign currencies and other funds to spend, with little pressure to cut expenses or account for them. Congressmen, federal officials, and employees and even some private citizens are traveling and being entertained on this largess, which eventually comes out of the pockets of taxpayers.

If Congress and the Administration want to cut costs, here's a good place to do it. Wasteful spending should be stopped, no matter who does it and no matter whether the funds are farnes, marks or dollars. -Dallas Morning News

Using the photographs, the Lake States Forest Experiment Station will direct field work of the survey starting next spring. The field survey will follow photo-interpretation, locating and measuring timber on ground plots determined from the aerial pic-

Counties to be surveyed from the air this summer are Marquette, Menominee, Dickinson, all of Keweenaw except Isle Royale, Houghton, Ontonagon, Gogebic and Iron that lie outside the gross boundaries of the Ottawa National Forest.

The other Upper Peninsula counties will be air-surveyed from mid-June to mid-September in 1964.
