

Ladies and Gentlemen:

At a special election to be held in Marquette County on Monday, July 15, 1963, the matter of continuing the two extra voted mills for general county purposes (\$2.00 per \$1,000 of valuation) will be voted on. The Marquette County Board of Supervisors urgently requests all voters in the county to vote yes on this proposition so that the people may assure themselves of a continuation of county services as at present.

This IS NOT a new tax. In 1958 a similar tax allowance for county purposes was voted by the people for a five year period. Ever increasing costs, especially in the welfare departments, brought about a huge deficit in county funds that year. The extra millage voted has now expired and your vote on Monday, July 15th, can keep your county government on a sound financial basis by approving the proposition and continuing the tax rate at the same level as the past five years.

That portion of county tax represented by the two mills is small as it applies to the average homeowner. When this rate is spread over the entire county, however, it produces approximately \$180,000.00, or one-half the total cost of operating the Social Welfare Department. County revenues will be cut back somewhat in 1963 and succeeding years because of the reduction in mining valuations and the new system of taxing some of the underground mines which becomes effective in 1964. A further loss of \$180,000.00 per year for welfare purposes, should the proposition fail, would put the county in a position where it could no longer give its people the services they require and demand, nor could it meet its obligations under state law.

In the interests of maintaining good county services and the solvency of your county government, VOTE YES on the county millage proposition on July 15th. Again, this is not a new tax but a continuation of the rate you have been paying. Your county taxes will not be increased over the present rate if you VOTE YES.



ISHPEMING - The Ishpeming Blue Notes Drum and Bugle Corps, Upper Peninsula champions, have taken the spotlight with impressive performances recently. Their latest effort produced a second place finish in Marinette in the "Drums in the North" contest, four points behind the Racine Boy Scouts, a unit which was termed sensational.

Since their formation in 1957, the Blue Notes have come a long way.

With Joseph Mayrand and Jim Medlyn instrumental in forming the group, a surprising total of 100 boys turned up for the first practice. Their first trip - to Crystal Falls - turned out to be more of an inspirational trip than a competitive event. Many Hours Of Hard Work

That first year was one of patience and perseverance and most of the youngsters

turned in many hours of hard work. In the first year the Blue Notes (who didn't as yet have an official name) concentrated mainly on parading, as there was a shortage of instruments and equipment.

The following year was one in which a dream was realized. The youngsters were being molded into a compact and talented group. After what was termed a successful year, the organization chose the name of Blue Notes Drum and Bugle Corps.

The corps has given many performances since its origin and has always cooperated to the fullest in community celebrations.

Has 150 Members Now Presently operating with 150 members which includes a feeder corps of 70 members, the groups practice on the Ishpeming Playgrounds during the summer and in the American Legion building in the winter.

The Blue Notes are sponsored by Post 58 of the Ishpeming American Legion, which recognized the need for an organization which would give youngsters a chance to learn to play an instrument, give them an outlet for their stored up energies and create in them a sense of responsibility.

Medlyn said, "It is our objective to give these youngsters a bit extra and also to give the City of Ishpeming and anywhere else they may travel a bit more too.' Sense Of Responsibility

Addressing the Ishpeming Kiwanis Club this week, Medlyn said, "Ishpeming can feel justly proud of this unit of youngsters, not just for their musical accomplishments, but for their sense of responsibilty in everything they do. In each city we have competed in, we have had excellent reports on the behavior of every youngster. At first, eight adult chaperones were needed but presently this is down to four. A truly remarkable example of the quality of Ishpeming's 'kids.'

'Operating such a corps is a tremendous undertaking," remarked Al Hendra, equipment manager of the Blue Notes who was also a guest of the Kiwanis Club. "Our youngsters work hard all through the year in a number of ways obtaining revenue needed to buy equipment for the unit. I'm sure the average individual has no idea of the terrific expense in the operation of a corps the size of Ishpeming's.

Since last September the Blue Notes have spent nearly \$3,500 on instruments and nearly \$1,800 on uniforms. Presently the Blue Notes have over \$20,000 tied up in the organization.

In the biggest event of the year, the Blue Notes have readied themselves for the "Buglers Holiday" tomorrow night at the Ish-peming Playgrounds. This will feature the Blue Notes and their feeder corps, the Menominee Northernaires, L'Anse Golden Eagles, Cedarburg, Wis., Mercury Thunderbolts, Ontonagon Mountaineers and the Munising Sil-

Over 250 youngsters will participate in one of the top musical attractions of the year in Marquette County.

City Band Opens Event Officially opening the Buglers Holiday will be the Ishpeming City Band under the direction of Roy Ketola.

The night of music will be ushered in at 7:15 with a flag raising ceremony. Color guard competition wil be handled by the All-American Judges Association.






