Such premium pay should be required on work in excess of seven nours a day and 35 hours a week, said Joseph A. Beirne, president of the AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America.







The Liston-Patterson fight was seen only on closed circuit television as an extra benefit from the cable company, or in theatres of other communities where patrons paid an average charge of Five Dollars for admission

But at the same time the championship match was broadcast over radio, free to anyone who had a radio set. Why are people willing to pay for the addition of sight? This is a serious question and deserves serious consideration. What is there about seeing with your own eyes that adds so much

Spectators attend a fight for the excitement of it. For some rounds of swift paced action they are lifted to a peak above the ordinary level of daily living. There is identification with one or both the fighters at different moments where the spectator feels almost as though he were one of them. There is the uncertainty of the outcome. This holds good even when the prediction is for a sure shot finish. Because it is human beings who are slugging it out, there is always a chance of an upset.

Of course many of those who are present, either at the arena or in front of the television screen, bring a knowledgeable appreciation of the fine points of prize fighting. They combine excitement with a running analysis of the action.

Whatever the mix of reasons, the true fight enthusiast would rather be at the ringside in person. With the obvious impossibility of millions of interested spectators being close enough to clearly see each movement, the television camera becomes the eyes and ears for those who will watch from their homes or the closed circuit theatres.

But the television camera does a much better job of seeing than is possible from all but the front rows at the arena. Even if the results are sent over radio without delay, whatever happens is seen through some one else's eyes. Nothing satisfies an intereted peron like seeing for himself.

An added factor comes into play. The mind uses what it sees and hears to fill in any gaps that might remain. The person who sees the fight even experiences the touch, smell and tingle of excitement. He is there, as close as possible to being there in person, and often has a better view than if he had been at the scene. That's why sound alone is not quite the same thing.

County Under **Budget For** Half Of 1963

For the first time this year, county budget expenditures last month were under the budget allowance, and the expenses for the year are now running slightly less than the appropriated amounts, County Controller Robert H. De-Roche of Marquette reports.

During the first half of the year, expenses totaled \$182,-312.49, while the total budget allowance for this period, including refunds and income, amounted to \$182,472.24, leaving an "under the budget" balance of \$159.75.

Last month's report showed county expenses running nearly \$500 ahead of appropriations, while in the previous month the county was about \$1,700 in the red on current operations.

Total county budget for the year was \$284,927.50, leaving an unexpended balance at the start of the last half of the year of \$138,087.96.

Mussolini Era Ended 20 Years Ago

ROME (AP)-"I want to make a mark on history with my will, like a lion with his claws." The words were Benito Musso-

He made his mark. History recalls that he made Italy's trains run on time. History records that he made war a national policy, and history notes that 29 years ago today Benito Mussolini came to the beginning of the end.

That was the day King Victor Emmanuel III put Mussolini under arrest. The shock of Allied landings in Sicily 16 days earlier had been too great for tottering Italy. Its Fascist leadership split. The military stepped in. Field Marshal Pietro Badoglio replaced Mussolini as premier,

Flame Still Burns German forces freed Mussolini and helped him set up a Fascist republic in northern Italy. The end came on April 28, 1945, when the tommy guns of Italian partisans riddled Mussolini and his mistress, Claretta Petacci.

Fascism's flame still burns in Italy. A million and a half Italians voted the Fascist ticket in national elections last April. Thousands of young Fascists still thrill to a street fight with Communists -as their black shirt fathers did 40 years ago.

But the Fascist vote represented only 5 per cent of the electorate, and there is no apparent heir to Mussolini, creator of fascism whose doctrine inspired Adolf Hitler.

Rise To Power Mussolini came to power in 1922, just before his 40th birthday. Thousands of his followers marched on Rome and forced the king to turn over the government

to Mussolini. Mussolini, once a Socialist himself, said Italy needed a strong and vigorous leader. He took the title Il Duce-the leader.

He replaced Italian parliamenfary institutions with what he called a corporate state-an economy of privately owned industry directed by the state through "corporations" of business, labor

and government representatives. In 1936 Mussolini led Italy against Ethiopia. Then came the "stab in the back" against France and World War II.

Hitler's Partner Mussolini had become Adolf Hitler's partner. It was soon clear Hitler was the dominant


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

Defense Of The Dollar

By WALTER LIPPMANN

The Administration program for dealing with the deficit in our balance of payments is quite evidently provisional. Something had to be done, because the deficit has not really been reduced in the past year. But only provisional measures were judged to be practical in the present climate of international finance. The most serious proposal is to check the outflow of dollars for foreign investment. This is to be done by taxing the sale to Americans by foreigners of long-term foreign securities. This tax is to last for two years, ending on Aug. 16, 1965. It would make it more expensive for foreigners to raise money in the United States' capital market. Direct investment abroad by American companies in plant and equipment would not be affected.

No one can be certain that these measures and the underlying situation will bring American payments into balance in two years. However, even if they do, as the President allowed, "As we close our payments gap, we will cut down on our provision of dollars to the rest of the world." This will put serious difficulties in the way of an expansion of world trade and economic development. If deflationary pressures develop, as is probable, there will be needed big reforms in the international monetary system.

Share Burdensome Honor

It is perhaps fair to say that while the Administration has been in the past opposed to such reforms, they have been favored by the British, who share with us the burdensome honor and privilege of providing the world with a reserve currency. There are many American experts within the Administration and outside it who favor major reforms. And the President himself has recently shown con-

But the Treasury has been taking the position that the open discussion of any major change in the world monetary system would shake confidence in the soundness of the dollar. The only reforms and remedies that are safe and sound are those which can be arranged privately and carried out with a minimum of publicity by arrangements with foreign finance ministers and central bankers. The Treasury is hoping to maintain confidence in the dollar by the time-honored banking rule of not allowing anything to let the dollar be questioned. While measures may be necessary to enlarge the reserves at the base of the international monetary system, these measures must not be talked about publicly or treated as important, but must be made to appear as an unalterable, rock-like monetary system. The rule of our conduct must be, therefore, that the reform of the monetary system must come after, and not before, we have closed our own payments gap.

Proceeding according to this austere principle, the Treasury has been active in devising arrangements to protect the dollar against bear raids by speculators. And in this it has had admirable cooperation from foreign central banks and finance ministers, including notably the French. A big expansion of export trade is not going to be had easily in this time of sharpening commercial competition.
