



Dr. Adenauer's Maneuver

By WALTER LIPPMANN

The reaction in Bonn to the test ban treaty s a reminder on two points that are easily forgotten. Has Already Signed Treaty

The maximum gain would be to kill the treaty by inducing the Senate to attach a destructive rider to it. The minimum gain would be to demonstrate that, whether or not he retires in October, he is still the master of German foreign policy.

We have to remember that Dr. Adenauer's maneuver is concerned with internal and external West German politics and has nothing to do with nuclear tests. Whether the federal republic does or does not sign the test ban treaty, the fact is that the federal republic has already signed a test ban treaty - a solemn treaty not to do anything whatever about nuclear weapons. If Bonn now decides to abstain from signing the treaty, it will make no difference to the nuclear situation.

In this, West Germany differs from the two other principal abstainers, France and Red China. For them, all testing will remain lawful, because they will not have signed the treaty.

The East German government has adhered, so I have been told, to about 11 international conventions, and that fact has not altered the situation. East Germany is not recognized by the three principal allied powers - France, Britain and the United States - which have authority in regard to the solution of the German question. The President of the United States has, moreover, declared publicly that East Germany's adherence to this treaty will not bring United States' recognition. And if the President says it will not bring recognition, it will not bring recognition.

Object Of The Drive For this reason, we must not treat the nitpicking as the real thing. The real thing is the Gaullist drive. In this drive, Dr. Adenauer is collaborating while his successors are not. The object of the drive is to take into French and German hands the political leadership of Europe and to do this by diminishing the influence of the United States. That is the reason why the West German foreign minister has been rebuffed and why the next chancellor, Dr. Erhard has so long been ignored. The object of the maneuver is to see how many stumbling blocks can be put in President Kennedy's path during the long pro-

cess of ratification. It remains to be seen whether any sub-stantial number of senators will lend themselves to a maneuver which is not concerned with the vital interests of the United States, but only with continental European politics



The federal bureau began its hemical treatment program to reduce populations of the parasitic lamprey in 1958. The Mosquito River in Alger County and the Silver River in Baraga County were experimentally treated in the spring of that year. The treatments vere pronounced successful, and a ull-scale program of chemical radication of lampreys from Lake iperior streams was undertaken

The sea lamprey has been the 13-foot long fish struck. Its trout populations in the lower lakes and nearly exterminating this species in Lake Superior. It preys on lake trout and other game itself to its hosts with its suckerlike mouth and siphoning body juices from the fish.

Although regulations will remain far "tighter" than they were uring the mid-1950's, the state's uck hunters may find their bag mits and number of shoot days somewhat liberalized this October. A slightly longer goese seaon may also be in the offing, but to change is expected in its bag

Thousands 'Saved'

Fall flights of ducks and geese should be up moderately from last year throughout the flyway, which includes Michigan, judging from the council's latest pooling of survey findings by state, federal and

The brighter forecast is tied to last year's highly-restrictive regulations, which "saved" thousands of birds for this spring's nesting season, and a general improvement in water conditions throughout much of North America's waterfowl breeding grounds.

6 Per Cent Hike

Surveys point to an over-all six per cent increase in this spring's breeding population of ducks, as compared with a year ago. Preliminary figures indicate that mallard production has doubled its 1962 to-tal, but remains well below the five-year average.





Also, beginning next year, fisheries managers plan to kill off excess stunted panfish with annual application of toxaphene - a fish poison which, if used in carefuly controlled doses, kills small fish but does not affect larger ones.

Research records show that bluegills, perch and crappies in the Prickett backwater are badly stunted, especially the younger ones. In addition, the largemouth bass are growing much slower than he state average when they are young and don't reach a good average size until after they are four


