WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy has put in a strong plug for his foreign aid program, timed to the opening of House debate on the big measure. "The action represents a direct violation by the Vietnamese government of assurances that it was pursuing a policy of reconciliation with the Buddhists."

CHICAGO (AP) — U. S. District Court Judge Bernard M. Decker issued a temporary restraining order today prohibiting a walkout of United Airlines maintenance employees that threatened to disrupt operations of the airline.

## Defense Scientist Takes Issue With Teller On N-Pact

SAC Chief Lone Holdout In Military 110 Killed, 68 Injured In Collapse Of Mosque He Says Russ Can't Benefit By Cheating

WASHINGTON (AP) — The word in the capital today is that Gen. Thomas S. Power was the lone, strong holdout against the limited nuclear test ban treaty among all military field commanders.

Power has lined up with Dr. Edward Teller, noted nuclear physicist, against the treaty, although not so emphatically as Teller, who has said ratification would be "a tragic and dreadful mistake."

### Production Marks Set By Area Herds

Two registered Holstein herds in this area have completed new lactation averages.

As reported by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, these herd production averages are:

Ludwig Knaus, Traunik, has 27 completed production records averaging 14,730 pounds of milk and 512 pounds of butterfat. Marquette State Prison

has 45 completed production records averaging 17,392 pounds of milk and 631 pounds of butterfat.

These lactation averages are calculated on the generally accepted two-milkings-a-day, 305-day, mature equivalent basis. It provides a uniform means for comparison and selection in the Registered Holstein herd owner's breeding program.

Michigan State University supervised the weighing and testing of production as part of the official herd testing programs of the national Holstein organization.

### School Bus Law Ruled Constitutional

LANSING (AP) — Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley has ruled that the so-called parochial school bus law passed by the 1963 Legislature — under which public schools must furnish transportation to private school students — is constitutional.

Kelley, in a 20-page opinion, said the law must be regarded as a public welfare benefit to parents and children because it helps

them to comply with laws requiring school attendance.

He said it fulfills the requirements of the first amendment of the U.S. Constitution and also is in accord with Michigan's new Constitution which goes into effect Jan. 1.

#### Effective Date

The law, said Kelley, "assures the regular and safe attendance of Michigan children at state approved schools, both public and non-public, and is a further implementation of the policy expressed in the Michigan Constitution and our compulsory education laws."

Kelley's opinion on the validity of the law was sought by Sen. William Leppien, R-Saginaw.

The blaze burned a small area of grass and brush, on property owned by Northern Michigan University.

Children playing with matches were blamed for the blaze.

Six firemen responded to the call with the Nos. 2 (1,000-gallon) and 5 pumps. They returned to the station at 9:21 p. m.

# Extensive Repairs To Storm Sewer Under Baraga School Necessary; To Cost \$6,000

BARAGA — Extensive repairs to a large storm sewer which runs underneath the Baraga High School will have to be made in the immediate future, according to consulting engineers who have been studying the condition of the building.  
Professors Gerald Caspary and Leonard Roberts, faculty members at Michigan College of Mining and Technology, Houghton, told the Baraga Board of Education that this large drainage pipe would have to be repaired and filled with concrete as a much-needed safety measure.

with the soil to harden it. They recommended that the board act quickly to have this work done before school opens next month.  
**Cost Estimated At \$6,000**  
They suggested that the board meet with county, township and village officials to see what financial arrangements can be made to take care of the necessary repairs. Caspary said it is not the financial responsibility of the school board to take care of either filling or removing this pipe since it is an integral part of the drainage system.  
The board agreed to call an emergency meeting with representatives of the county, township and village to set up a program of action. Cost of the project has been estimated at approximately \$6,000 in "very rough figures." The cost may be higher, but board members agree they cannot take a chance on leaving the situation as it is and risk a catastrophe which could endanger the lives of students and faculty members.

**Built Over Drainage Ditch**  
Their investigation revealed that the newer wing of the school, constructed in 1932, had been built over an old drainage ditch which had been filled with cinders, and in which this pipe lies. They said a recent inspection showed the pipe broken in many places, and water is seeping through and around it, further undermining the foundation of the school.

Board president Reuben Niemis telephoned Baraga Township Supervisor Robert P. Brown to give him a rundown on the engineering report. He told the board that Brown agreed that work had to be done, but that "he didn't know where the money was going to come from."

**Installation Of Supports**  
In addition, Roberts and Caspary recommended installation of anchor iron supports underneath the landing over the north entrance and underneath the second floor library. Cost of this work was estimated at only \$100.  
No action has been taken during the summer to rip up the floor at the head of the second floor staircase or to move the old drinking fountain from the center of that hallway. The floor sags noticeably, but a local contractor who examined the job felt the

sag was a result of foundation settling and could not be corrected by merely tearing up the floor and installing new joists.

# Low Insurance Bid Accepted By School Board At Baraga

BARAGA — Competitive bids for school fire and general liability insurance submitted by three L'Anse insurance agents were reviewed, and the low bid accepted, at this month's meeting of the Baraga Township Board of Education.

Following a lengthy discussion and a 10-minute executive session, the board voted unanimously to purchase the insurance from the Tollefson Insurance Agency at the low bid price of \$518.28. Other quotations included a figure of

\$566.75 submitted by the Reliance Insurance Agency and a bid from the Baraga County Insurance Agency for \$711.49.

# He Came Out Ahead In Attempted Burglary

LUMBERTON, Miss. (AP) — In an attempted burglary of a dairy bar here, the owner Fred Tyler came out ahead.

Tyler discovered a man putting silver in a paper bag by the cash register when he was awakened about 3 a. m. He grabbed the man as he ran by causing him to drop the bag of coins. When he counted the money, Tyler discovered there was \$1.55 more than he had left in the register. A nearby grocery reported the loss of a small amount of coins the same night.

# Clements Explains Bid

John V. Clements, representing the Baraga County Agency, told the board that his bid (although \$200 high) included liability coverage on the Baraga Armory, which is used for kindergarten classes and athletic contests. He said this special coverage costs an additional \$202, and claimed that the premiums quoted by the other two agencies would be subject to audit at the end of the year, when an additional premium would be assessed for the armory liability.

Both Tollefson and William Rolof of the Reliance Agency assured the board that their quotations included full coverage on the armory and they further offered not only their word, but a written guarantee that no additional premium charges would be assessed for this coverage.  
Tollefson stated that his policy included full liability protection on the armory, not only for classes, but for the athletic contests to which Clements referred in his

arguments. Tollefson and a special representative of his company stated that their policy, like all comprehensive policies, is subject to audit at the end of the year, but emphasized that the only conditions which could result in an added premium would be an increase in the number of students who are insured or additional vehicles which might be purchased by the school after the original quotation was submitted.

# Student Insurance Plan

The board also agreed to continue the student insurance plan with the Reliance Agency. Premium rates for the coming year will be \$2.50 for grade school pupils and \$4 per year for high school students.

High School Principal Arthur Kujansuu filled the board in on details of insurance coverage which can be purchased for all football players at a cost of \$4.50 per season. He noted that for several years the board has required all students who participate in football to carry special accident insurance or to be able to prove that they are adequately covered against injury and accident. Board members agreed that it is imperative that all boys competing in football be covered by an adequate accident policy.

# Office Supplies Purchased

The low bid of \$947.44 for office supplies submitted by the U.P. Office Supply Co. of Mar-

quette was accepted by unanimous vote. Other bids were received from Northern Stationers, Inc., which quoted \$1,024.47; Valley School Supplies, Inc., \$1,059.93, and the L'Anse Sentinel, \$1,268.63.  
Milk for the school lunch program will be purchased from the Copper Country Dairy Co. at a cost of five and one-half cents per half-pint. A lower bid of five cents was submitted by the Bancroft Dairy, but board members, noting that the Copper Country Dairy purchases local milk and is a local company, agreed that it should have the business again this year.

JFK's Aid Sought To Check Foreign 'Dumping' Of Steel

NEW YORK (AP) — In recent days U.S. steel producers cut prices on polished stainless steel sheets used to make kitchen utensils, appliances and many other familiar items.

The reason: competition from stainless steel rolled in Japan and Europe and sold for less in the United States.

**Worldwide Upheaval**

The incident is symptomatic of problems that have beset the \$16-billion domestic steel industry, driving down production, shrinking profits and drying up jobs.

It reflects a worldwide upheaval in steel production and distribution patterns that has turned the United States from an exporter of steel to a net importer.

Cutting prices hasn't stemmed the tide of some imports, especially wire products, pipe and tubing, reinforcing bars and some types of sheet and strip.

American steelmen say some foreign producers are "dumping" steel on the U.S. market, selling it at prices lower than those charged in the country of origin.

**Kennedy's Help Sought**

Roger Blough, chairman of the board of U.S. Steel Corp., the nation's No. 1 producer, and David J. McDonald, president of

the AFL-CIO United Steelworkers, asked President Kennedy on Tuesday to do something about the dumping.

After a White House meeting, Blough told newsmen Kennedy had agreed to look into the matter. He said he and McDonald didn't suggest specific action.

Blough said he considers a heavy percentage of the 4.3 million tons of foreign steel sold in the United States last year to have been dumped on the market.

American steel exports exceeded imports an average of 2.7 million tons annually in the five years ended in 1958.

**Trend Continuing**

In each of the four years ended with 1962, the balance went the other way and the trend is continuing. The country bought 4.1 million tons of foreign steel in 1962 against 2 million tons sold abroad, for an average balance of 2.1 million tons.

Some steel executives estimate that restoration of the export-import relationship of the middle 1950s would result in 30,000 more jobs in the domestic steel industry.
