BOTH MEN IN EXCELLENT SHAPE: Workers Free 2 Miners

HAZLETON, Pa. (AP)—Joking and singing all the way, Henry Throne and David Fellin were lifted to the surface today unharmed in a safety harness from more than 300 feet underground where a mine cave-in trapped them 14 days ago.

The men were examined in a first aid tent, then quickly removed by two helicopters to the Hazleton State Hospital nine miles away, where a special ward was prepared for them.

Dr. Peter Saras, who examined Throne, and Dr. Anthony Fidulla, personal physician to Fellin for the past 10 years, said they were both amazed that the miners survived in cramped quarters in such excellent shape.

Drilling Begins On Escape Hole For 3rd Miner

HAZLETON, Pa. (AP)—Drilling of a 17½-inch escape hole for Louis Bova similar to the one used to free Henry Throne and David Fellin began today less than five hours after Throne and Fellin were lifted to the surface unharmed in a safety harness. The drilling began with only a handful of men on the scene at 6:45 a.m. amidst optimism by Bova's relatives and Throne and Fellin that Bova is alive after 14 days underground without food.

All three miners were trapped in a cave-in Aug. 13 but Bova was separated from Throne and Fellin by a wall of debris and was believed about 25 feet away from them, reportedly injured. He has not been heard from since last Tuesday when Fellin reported he made contact with him.

Believe He's Alive
Fellin, 38, and Throne, 28, while being examined by doctors, said they could not believe that Bova was dead. They said he probably still lay trapped under a pile of rubble and that the search should continue.

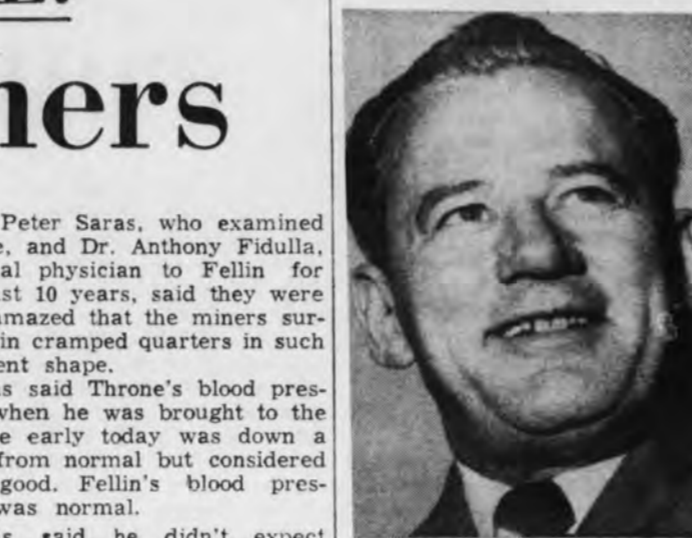

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower has urged Senate sponsors of the limited nuclear test-ban treaty with a call for an anti-aggression reservation to the pact.

Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana told reporters that this proposal—one of the reservations previously suggested by Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission—already is "inherent in the treaty."

Some witnesses have expressed the fear that the treaty would bar the United States from furnishing nuclear weapons to an ally under attack.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Arleigh A. Burke, former chief of naval operations, urged senators today to demand some system of verification or limited inspection of Soviet nuclear facilities before they ratify the limited nuclear test ban treaty.

Plans For Sewer Extension On McClellan Ave. Prepared

Plans for a sanitary sewer extension along McClellan Ave. from W. Washington St. to Ridge St. and sanitary sewer and water mains on Ridge St. from McClellan Ave. to Garfield Ave. were prepared last week by the city engineering department.

This and other information is included in the weekly report of City Manager Thomas Moore.

Last week the engineering department also made a field check of installation of a sanitary sewer along the U.S. 41 bypass construction site and discussed construction with representatives of the contractor and the Michigan Highway Department.

Excerpts from the weekly reports of other municipal departments follow:

Construction, Maintenance Work On County Roads Told

Construction and maintenance work carried out on state trunklines and on county roads in Marquette County during the past month was outlined today by H. L. Shroeger, Marquette, superintendent-engineer of the county road commission.

On state trunklines during the month, Shroeger said, maintenance consisted of road surface and shoulder repairs, guard rail replacement and painting, mowing and roadside table cleanup.

In carrying out this work, 73 tons of bituminous aggregate, 1,500 gallons of asphalt, 98 tons of cover stone, 49 tons of crushed gravel and 1.4 tons of calcium chloride were used.

used in carrying out road and structure repairs and dust abatement operations.

In addition, 136 miles of road shoulders were mowed, 65 roadside signs were refinished and erected and 25 cubic yards of refuse was removed from the Gwinn Park and Sugar Loaf Mountain landing site.

Action Needed On Studies, Group Told

HOUGHTON — Too many communities "research themselves to death" then never take any action on the information they accumulate, a group of area businessmen, governmental and educational leaders were told here.

The 17-man group was assembled at Michigan Tech to hear community planning specialists George Vilican Jr., of Vilican-Leman & Associates, Inc., Southfield.

The fact-finding meeting was called to determine interest and opportunities in urban renewal-type programs. Vilican said some 15 federal programs are available for assistance in the planning and execution of community master plans.

Some of the agencies and programs discussed were the Housing-Homes Finance Agency, of which FHA is a part; Urban Renewal Administration; Plan 701 for planning assistance; ARA accelerated public works programs; a demonstration grant program and a privilege loan program of FHA.

"Regional Unit"

A logical "regional" unit to undertake a renewal program in this area, said Vilican, would be one including Houghton, Hancock and Tech. It would be a relatively small unit with each participant having a like problem.

An existing county planning board could coordinate this unit's program in relation to the county's plan, and relate overall efforts to those of adjoining counties. Under such an arrangement, the College wouldn't be recognized by the federal government as a participating entity, but there would be College representation on the board.

Dr. E. T. Williams, Tech vice president, said the meeting was called to investigate the possibilities of some form of urban renewal program in view of encouraging reports from a cooperative college-community program in another state.

Accounts and finance — Completed general property inventory and prepared statement. Closed 1962-63 operating accounts and began preparing ledger for new fiscal year.

Assessor — Issued five building permits and continued recording changes in real property ownership on tax and assessment rolls.

Health — Made three blood tests, dispensed 385 doses of biologicals to physicians, and investigated 52 complaints.

Light and power — Line crews continued work on new three-phase line along U.S. 41 at Green Garden; replaced two poles in Sands Township; connected a three-phase service for contractors at new high school and connected one new customer. Water received at the hydroelectric plants was more than last week and more than this time last year. Elevation at the Hoist Pond dropped .65 feet and was 5.25 feet higher than the same week last year and 8.2 feet from the top of the dam. The total system's kilowatt hour load was seven per cent higher than the same week a year ago.

Financial Scene: Fall Season For Business Starts Soon

NEW YORK (AP) — A larger than usual pack of problems crowds the final week before Labor Day.

The long weekend will start the fall season for many businesses and consumers.

But there is an offsetting bundle of firm statistics and high hopes.

Rail Deadline

This pre-holiday week will see another deadline in the long bubbling feud between the railroads and their operating unions over work rules and employment. Both sides and the racial turmoil dramatized this week by the march on Washington hold potential threats to industry and citizens alike, if the issues aren't solved.

This week will see continuing arguments in Congress over the limited nuclear test ban treaty and the proposed tax on American purchases of foreign securities and the bill to cut individual and corporate income taxes. All affect phases of business planning and operations and go deeply into basic issues and problems ahead.

uncertainty this summer, consumer confidence apparently still holds high. And so does individual spending and business activity.

More persons plan to buy new houses and cars than did last spring, but fewer plan to buy household durable goods. The surveys are regarded as a guide to consumer confidence. Plans can change, but they do show how people are feeling about their own and the general economic outlook. For a current guide to consumer confidence the economists watch retail sales and housing starts.

Building has held high, with apartment houses accounting for most of the total increases in recent months.

Retail sales are well above a year ago.

Auto Industry Confident

The auto industry is expressing confidence that the new models coming out in the next few weeks will spark a third straight year of good sales.

In one section of the household durables market, the American Home Laundry Manufacturers' Association reports that July factory sales of washers and dryers ran 9 per cent ahead of last year. Sales in the first seven months of 1963 topped the like period of 1962 by 8 per cent.

Both industrial production and personal incomes set records in July.

GOP's Morton To Speak At Mackinac Is.

Sen. Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky, a leading Republican Party figure on the national scene, will be in Michigan in September to meet with state GOP members at their fourth biennial fall conference on Mackinac Island.

The three-day convolve is scheduled Sept. 13-15. Morton will be feature speaker at the closing session Sunday noon. His topic will be "Preview of Grand National Strategy for 1964."

Other GOP leaders who will appear before an anticipated 600 party members are Gov. George Romney, who will speak at the Saturday noon luncheon session and Rep. William E. Miller, New York, chairman of the Republican National Committee, who will be featured speaker at the Saturday dinner meeting.

Targets For '64'

Gov. Romney will discuss "Republican Opportunity in '64" and Miller's topic will be "Road to 1964 Victory." Theme of the conference is "Targets for '64."

Morton, chairman of the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, is a former GOP na-

tional chairman, serving from 1959-61. He entered the Senate in 1957 by defeating the incumbent senate Democratic floor leader after a career that included three years as assistant secretary of state for congressional relations, six years in the house of representatives, over four years as a naval officer and many years as a successful business executive.

Unprecedented Election

His re-election to the senate in 1962 was unprecedented for a Republican in Kentucky. In defeating his Democratic opponent by a substantial margin, Morton became the first Republican senator from Kentucky, serving a six-year term, ever to be re-elected for another six years.

Morton is a member of the senate finance committee and the senate commerce committee. He served as a delegate to the Republican national conventions in 1948, 1952 and 1956, and in 1960 was one of the leading contenders for the vice-presidential nomination on the Republican ticket.

to be given by Gov. and Mrs. Romney at the Governor's summer home on the island Saturday afternoon; a discussion on "myths and blunders" of the Kennedy Administration by members of Michigan's Republican congressional delegation Saturday afternoon and a panel discussion by four key legislators on accomplishments of the Republican-led legislature and the Romney Administration Saturday morning.

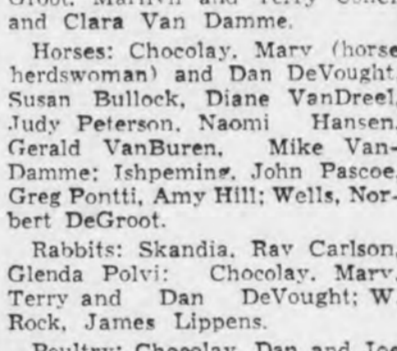

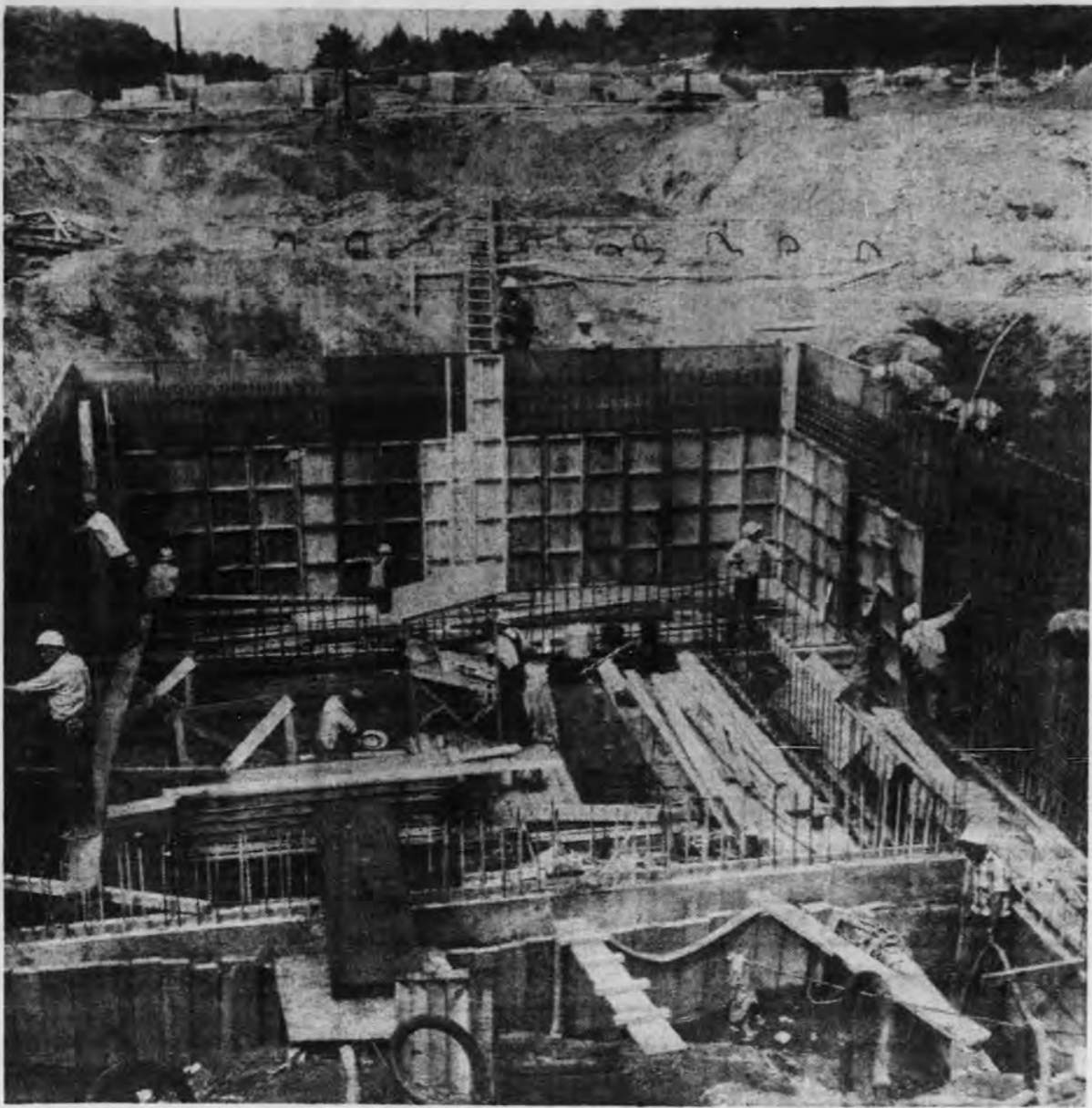
