# High Winds Add To Soaring Fire Hazard In Peninsula

## Smoking, Open Blazes In Woods Halted By Governor

Showers near DeTour and Wakefield will keep the east and west ends of the Upper Peninsula relatively safe from forest fires today and possibly tomorrow, but the vast area in between is a virtual tinderbox.

John A. Angulin, Marquette, field administration supervisor at the regional conservation department headquarters here, said today that high winds predicted for today and tomorrow will add to the fire danger.

### No Immediate Rain

The Weather Bureau here anticipates no rain until Sunday or Monday, and then only one-fourth of an inch or less is expected.

Marquette has had no measurable amount of rain since Oct. 2-3, when .18 of an inch fell. Normal amount of rainfall for the month through today is 1.3 inches, Meteorologist Fred Mueller said.

Yesterday the burning index, which gives a numerical rating to the fire danger, registered "explosive" conditions in the districts near Marquette, Crystal Falls and Newberry.

By proclamation of Gov. George Romney, U. P. woods are now closed to smoking and open fires.

Angulin said that smoking is allowed only at improved campgrounds, places of habitation and in moving or parked cars.

### Blaze Near Ishpeming

Today 10 to 20 men were fighting the fire which has been smoldering since Oct. 1 in more than 80 acres of muck west of Ishpeming.

Thirty conservation department fire fighters were working today at the site of another 80-acre fire near Bessemer and men were out all night battling a one-acre ground fire at Woodlawn in Menominee County.

Continued mild temperatures and mostly fair weather is the weather forecast for the next few days.

### In 80s Fourth Time

Yesterday the mercury went up to 80, the fourth time here this month the temperature has been 80 or above.

With the low of 62 yesterday, the average was 71 or 22 degrees above normal. The average temperature also was more than 20 degrees above normal Monday.

For the month, the average temperature now stands at 8.6 degrees above normal. The average tempera-

ture has been normal or above for the past 11 days and was below normal only two days this month.

Overnight the low temperature was 59 in Marquette and 46 at the Marquette County Airport in Negaunee Township. Lows tonight are expected to be between 50 and 55, except for readings in the upper 40s in some inland areas.

### Long-Range Outlook

For the next five days, the average temperature is expected to average around 10 degrees above the normal extremes of 54 and 40.

Mueller noted: "If this warm weather keeps up, we're going to set a record for the warmest October." The warmest October in this century was in 1947, when the average temperature for the month was 56.2, or 8.2 degrees above normal.

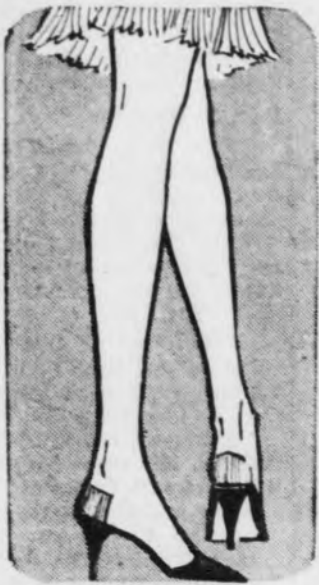

Trouble is, the elk are eating themselves out of house and home.

"If they move into Antrim County, and they are just at the border, and start nipping at the cherry orchards, then you will hear some demands for cutting down the herd," MacMullan predicted.

#### Eye 500 Harvest

MacMullan told the Conservation Commission that between 400 and 500 elk could be harvested each year without damage to the herd.

An elk season would need an enabling act by the Legislature. It is probable that the legislature will move slowly, although the Michigan United Conservation Clubs are behind the idea of a limited season, he said.

If the season is allowed, hunters would have a chance to fire at the second largest trophy animal in Michigan.

#### Preserve On Isle Royale

There is a moose preserve on Isle Royale and a few moose wander over to the Upper Peninsula every year. It is estimated, however, there aren't more than a dozen moose ranging through the Upper Peninsula.

The Conservation Department already is trying to figure out a way of reducing the elk herd that would satisfy the most and disappoint the fewest people.

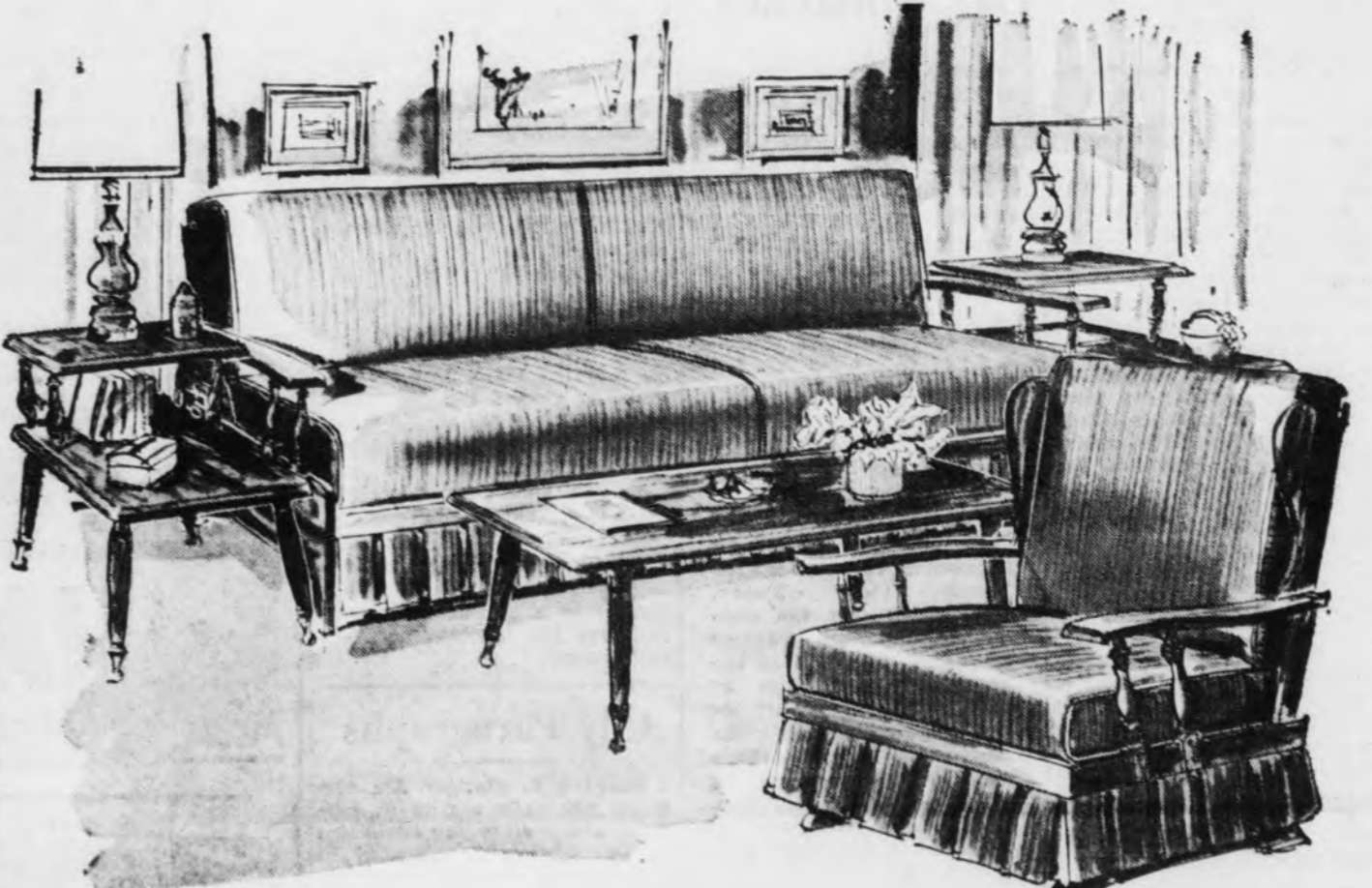

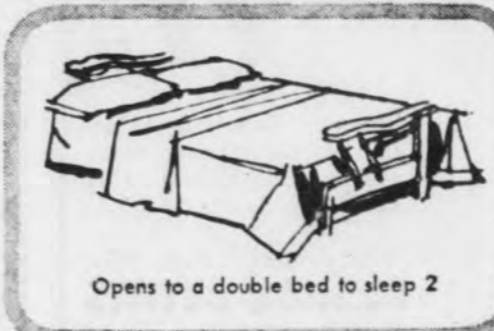

**Financial Scene: Oil Firms In Fertilizer Business**

By JACK LEFLER  
NEW YORK (AP)—Oil companies have been in the business of taking something—petroleum—out of the ground. Now they're going into the business of putting something back—fertilizer.

A rush is on by major oil companies to get into the chemical fertilizer business. It involves investment of hundreds of million of dollars.

The oil companies feel it is a natural avenue of diversification. For one thing, their by-products, such as ammonia, are used in producing fertilizer.

Some big deals have been brought off recently and others are cooking.

Socony Mobil Oil Co. stockholders will meet Nov. 20 to vote on the proposed acquisition of Virginia-Carolina Chemical Corp. for an \$80 million in stock.

Cities Service Corp. acquired Tennessee Corp., owner of valuable Florida phosphate lands, last June.

The consolidation of Continental Oil Co. and American Agricultural Chemical Co., is pending.

The oil companies have come

to the conclusion that in an ever more populous world where cultivated land will have to produce more and more food, the role of fertilizers, and other agricultural chemicals, becomes obviously urgent.

They are backing with big money their opinion that they are well-suited to fill that role.

The waiver of oil company acquisitions of independent fertilizer producers has aroused the interest of the government's antitrust officials.

**Concerned By Increase**

They are concerned by such a sudden increase in industrial concentration and are apprehensive that the trend might put the remaining independent fertilizer companies at a sharp disadvantage with the well-financed oil company subsidiaries.

Justice department lawyers are taking a look at the pending acquisition proposals with the idea of stepping in if it is thought that they might tend to reduce competition and thus violate the antitrust laws.

**In Gun Accident**  
Now 35, McCready suffered accidental loss of sight in a gun accident in October 1949. But by 1953 he had earned his bachelor's degree. Three years later, he obtained Storm, his German Shepherd, from Leader Dogs for the Blind, in Rochester, Mich. He got his law degree at the University of Michigan in 1958.

A charter member of the

East Tawas Lions in 1959, he was to become Isosco County prosecuting attorney in 1960 (possibly the first blind prosecutor in the nation).

**First In Michigan**  
He is the first blind district governor in the 43 year history of the Lions in Michigan, and Storm was the first dog to cross the Lions International convention stage.

McCready and Storm made quite an impression at the Miami Beach convention, as they attended the meetings, and The Miami Herald featured them in a story and photo.

**Have 3 Children**  
The McCready's have three children, all under 5. Mrs. Rae McCready will accompany her husband on the U. P. trip. They will attend a Ladies Night program in St. Ignace, Friday night, and a similar program by the combined Copper Country clubs, Saturday night.

They will be greeted here by Alden S. Clark, governor of the Upper Peninsula's District 10. County Lions clubs invited to take part include Ishpeming, Negaunee, Gwinn, Big Bay, Michigan, Skandia, Champion, Republic.

## Dow Gives New Life To Ore Carrier

LUDINGTON (AP) — New life has been granted to a Great Lakes iron ore carrier in a radical step by Dow Chemical Co. to augment steam power needs at its plant here.

The 450-foot carrier Princeton was docked at the Dow plant today under lease from Rowen Steamship Co. of Sturgeon Bay, Wis.

John Corey, Dow's Ludington division manager, said the ship will be used to supply extra steam to aid plant production increases in winter months.

**Two Boilers Running**  
The idea was conceived by W. S. Butler, power plant superintendent for Dow at Ludington. The plant has two boilers which, running at full capacity, now produce 200,000 pounds of steam per hour. They were installed when the plant was built in 1942-43 and their life expectancy of 20 to 30 years is nearing its end.

Boilers on the Princeton provide 50,000 pounds of steam per hour. They will augment winter needs and serve as standby next spring when the plant alternates boiler shutdown for overhaul.

The ship was built in 1900. It has not sailed for two years and was destined for scrap when the Dow offer was made.

## Demos May Trim Down Convention

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic National Convention, which like Tony just sort of grew, may be trimmed to a more manageable size next year. And its collective voice may have less Southern drawl and Western twang.

The decisions will be made when the Democratic National Committee meets in November or early December to allocate the votes for the 1964 convention at Atlantic City.

**Bonus System**  
A subcommittee headed by Jacob Arvey of Chicago, the national committee member from Illinois, has been studying the allocation of votes since last May. No proposals have been announced, but sources close to the national committee say these could be among them when the committee meets.

A return to the bonus system. It would reward with larger representation those states — mostly east of the Mississippi — which voted for President Kennedy in 1960.

No bonuses, but a reduction in voting power of those states which lost representation in Congress because of population shifts in 1950 and 1960 but, in effect, never lost any of their convention votes.

A combination of the two that would allocate votes on an up-to-date population basis plus bonus votes for multiples of Democratic votes in 1960, regardless of whether Kennedy carried the state.

Also expected to come up is a hardy quadrennial — the number of persons at a Democratic convention.

Republicans limit their state delegations to a one man-one vote basis. But Democrats over the years have split things up into half votes. That way more delegates get to go to the convention, a form of reward for party faithful.

**Can Be Confusing**  
But it also can be confusing. In 1960, there were 3,042 delegates authorized to cast 1,521 votes at the Los Angeles convention. And that didn't include more than 1,400 persons present as alternates.

To the politician, however, the number of delegates isn't nearly so important as the number of votes allotted each state.

Some critics felt the 1960 convention was weighted in favor of many—but not all—Southern and far Western states.

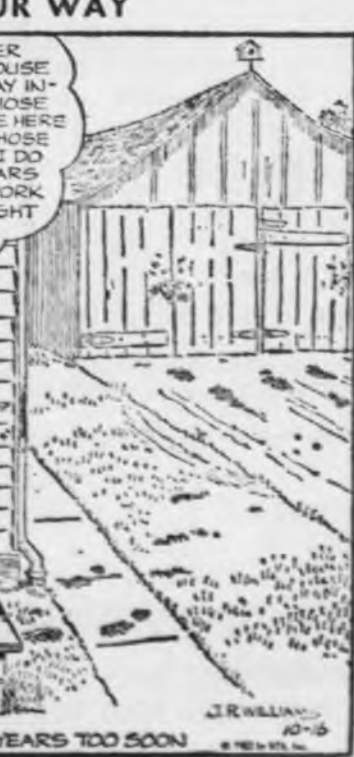
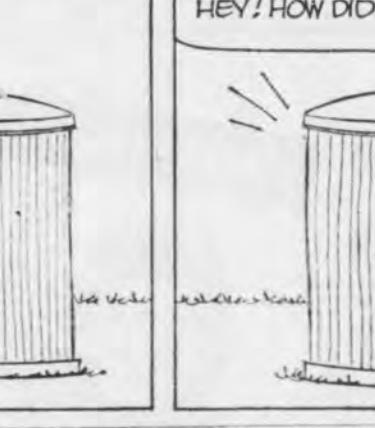
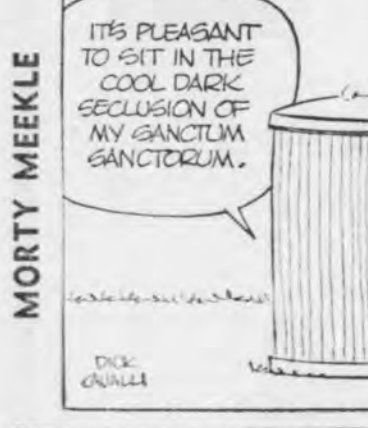

# Baraga Canvassers Named; Board Delays Budget Action

L'ANSE — The Baraga County Board of Supervisors selected a four-man bipartisan county board of canvassers, reappointed two members to the hospital board and named a third to succeed himself on the county social welfare board at Monday's meeting.

Lack of time forced the board to postpone examination and approval of the budget until next Monday night at 7.

Chosen by unanimous vote of the supervisors to serve on the canvass board were two Democrats, Eugene Racette, L'Anse, and Uno Norvack, Watton, and two Republicans, William Warkonen, Spurr Township, and Wesley Myllyla, Arnheim.

Racette and Myllyla were appointed for four-year terms. Norvack and Warkonen will serve two-year terms. Racette has been a member of the canvass board for several years.

The four were selected from slates prepared by Elmer A. Ellis, Democratic County chairman, and by Mrs. William Konstenius, Republican County chairman.

**Duties May Be Expanded**

In past years, the board of canvassers has been comprised of only three members — two from the party of the majority of elective county officials and the third from the opposing political party.

The canvass board is responsible for certifying the results of all county, state and federal elections. If legislation now pending is passed, the board also will be required to check results of local elections.

Benjamin J. Grobaski and Curtis C. Menard, both of L'Anse, veteran members of the Baraga County Memorial Hospital board of trustees, were named to succeed themselves for additional six year terms. Grobaski has been a member of the board since its inception and was instrumental in getting the hospital established. Menard and Grobaski both have served as president.

Other members of the hospital board include William Parkila, president, L'Anse; George Maki, Baraga; Bert Clishe, Skanee; Kosti Numminen, Three Lakes, and Uno Norvack, Watton.

Edward E. Erickson, Keeweenaw Bay, superintendent of Baraga Township public schools, was reappointed to another three-year term on the county social welfare board.

Erickson has been a member of the welfare board for a number of years and has served as its chairman. Frank Sengebush, L'Anse, and Eino Lehto, Aura, complete the three-man board.

# Substitute Teacher Salary Hike Approved In Negaunee

NEGAUNEE — Members of the Negaunee Board of Education at their October meeting approved an increase of \$3 per day in the pay schedule for substitute teachers in an attempt to bring the Negaunee rate more nearly in line with reimbursement for this type of work paid by other schools in the area.

Board action boosting the compensation from \$15 to \$18 per day followed a recommendation by Supt. Robert E. Northey, who advised the board that the local rate was low compared to other schools in the area.

Approval also was given to purchase of five new band uniforms at a cost of \$103 each, which will permit qualified ninth graders to play in the senior band. The board agreed to consider purchase of five additional uniforms later in the year.

Permission was granted to three faculty members to attend special educational meetings. Mrs. Patricia Sloan will attend the state meeting on guidance Nov. 3-4 at Michigan State University in East Lansing. Miss Berlyene Miller was authorized to take two senior members of her debate squad to a debate session at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti Oct. 26. Mrs. Jonelle Collins and Mrs. Muriel Wills will take part in a conference on special education Oct. 31 and Nov. 1, which is being sponsored by the State Department of Public Instruction at Northern Michigan University, Marquette.

In other action, the board approved monthly reports by the superintendent and Business Manager T. George Williamson, ordered claims and accounts against the school district for September paid, granted permission for St. Paul High School to use Memorial Gymnasium for its home basketball games during the 1963-64 season, and authorized an administrative committee to confer further with Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co. regarding a site for a new school building at Palmer.

# Board OK's Hunt Leave On Nov. 11

NEGAUNEE — Because of an increasing number of requests over the last several years for excused absences during the deer season, the Negaunee Board of Education at its October meeting approved a policy pertaining to deer hunting by students during days in which schools are in session.

Board members authorized an excused absence for pupils who go hunting Monday, Nov. 11, provided a request for an excuse is submitted in advance and signed by the parent.

In adopting the policy, the board noted that "it does not encourage students to take time off from school to go hunting."

Forms will be sent home with students next week on which parents will be asked to indicate that they desire an excused absence for children and that the students have their permission to go hunting on the designated date. The forms also advise parents that this is the only date on which children will receive an excused absence slip for hunting.

# Pathet Lao Conceals Yanks Fate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Tuesday L'ao pro-Communists still are concealing the precise fate of a Michigan man and two other Americans whose cargo plane was shot down Sept. 5.

Joseph C. Cheney of Wayne, Mich.; Charles G. Herrick of San Antonio, Tex.; Eugene H. of Bruin of Kaukauna, Wis.; and four Asians were on a food-dropping mission over Laos when their plane was shot down.

There were reports that one of the three Americans was killed when the plane crashed.

L'ao officials interpreted the Pathet Lao invitation to the families to write to the American prisoners as an indication the Pathet Lao is not ready to release the men.

# Pupils Form Safety Unit At Diorite

DIORITE — Eighth graders at the Diorite School have organized a safety patrol, the first time such a unit has been formed here.

"Students have shown a great deal of enthusiasm towards making the school a safer place in which to work and study," Peter Ogea, captain of the patrol, said.

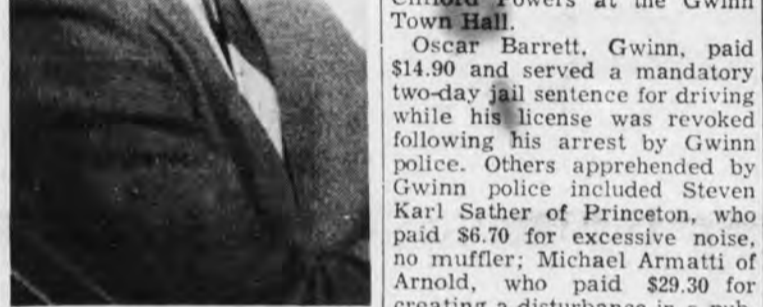

# Board Lacks Authority In Flood Case

Responsibility and authority over building of dikes by the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co. does not lie with the Marquette County Board of Supervisors.

On recommendation of its budget and executive committee — which attached an opinion from Prosecuting Attorney Edward A. Quinnell to its report — the board ordered that George Donaldson be so notified and that the matter be placed on file.

Quinnell had been asked by the committee to give an opinion on Donaldson's complaint relative to CCI construction of a series of dikes to hold water for use in operations at the Republic Mine.

"These dikes necessarily result in some flooding of lands," Quinnell wrote, "but I understand that all of the lands flooded belong to the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co."

"Under these circumstances, the County Board of Supervisors has no responsibility in connection with this flooding, the powers of the board over the level of waters relating only to inland lakes and not to a storage facility which is entirely privately owned and used for industrial purposes."

He added that if Donaldson's complaint relates to the purity of the water entering Horseshoe Lake, it should be addressed to the State Water Resources Commission, adding:

"That commission is possessed of full and complete powers to investigate and initiate any proper action to prevent the contamination of the waters of this state."

However, the prosecutor pointed out that if the complaint concerns the flooding of lands which belong to him resulting from the damming of a non-navigable stream, "his only remedy is to file a complaint in circuit court seeking to enjoin such flooding, inasmuch as it would constitute a continuous trespass."

# Crane On Rail Car Causes 2nd Power Outage; Towers Hit

ISHPEMING — For the second time within a month, a crane being transported on a railroad car was responsible for a power outage in part of Ishpeming and west of the city to Three Lakes.

At 9:45 last night, a crane being transported on an L. S. & I. freight train knocked down two 65-foot steel towers, each with a 33,000-volt circuit attached, and yanked power lines off a third tower.

A report on the accident indicated that the boom on the crane was protruding beyond the safety limits of the train, thus causing the accident.

Upper Peninsula Power Co. officials stated that the accident could have been much more serious because of the high content of electrical current in the power lines.

Twenty-six men were called from Republic, Gwinn, Chatham and Munising to work through the night in order to provide power for residents. Power was restored at 8 this morning.

Considerable damage was done to the towers, which served many distribution circuits.

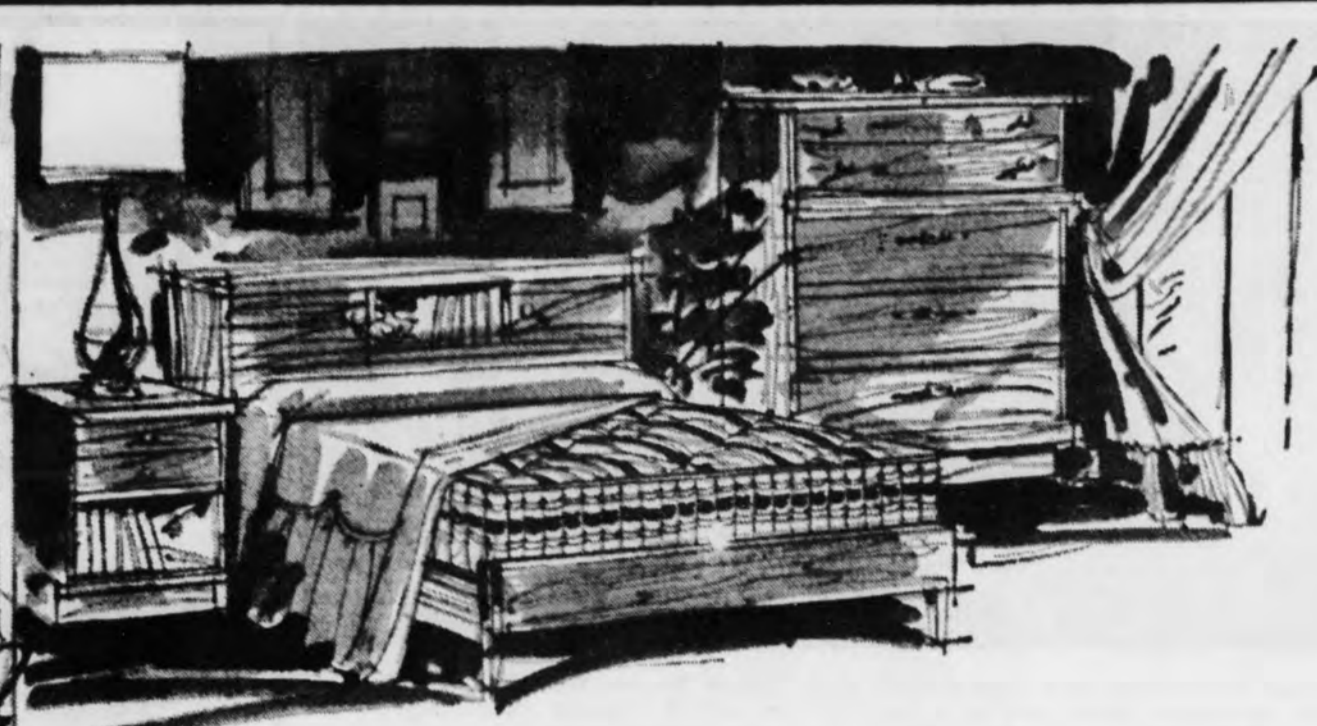

Alger Herd Tests Good Last Month

MUNISING — John Matekel, Limestone, Alger County Herd Improvement Association tester, indicated today that Alger County herds on test during September — although pastures were hard hit by the dry weather — produced an average of 26.6 pounds of milk per day per cow and averaged .95 of a pound of butterfat a day.

Dairymen fed their cows an average of 6.3 pounds of grain daily with a high of 11.2 pounds and a low of 3.4 pounds. The state average for 80,411 cows on test is 10.8 pounds of grain. High-producing cows are grained heavy and generally reflect a higher butterfat test. The highest herd butterfat test in Alger County in September was 3.99 and 419 cows on test averaged 3.57 as compared with the state average of 3.69.

Herds high in milk production were: Ed Stone, Treenary, 18 cows, 1,089 pounds average; Edgar Williams, Treenary, 28 cows, 967; Walter Maki, Eben, 31 cows, 955; John Henning, Traunik, 29 cows, 940; Arnold Hill, Treenary, 23 cows, 938, and Leonard Johnson, Chatham, 19 cows, 902.

Butterfat production was led by the Ed Stone herd with 39 pounds; followed by Walter Maki, 34; John Henning, 33; Arnold Hill, 33; Leonard Johnson, 32; Edgar Williams, 32; Urho Pokela, Traunik, 31, and Arthur Swajanen, Eben, 30. Feed costs per hundred pounds of milk produced ranged from a low of \$1.14 to a high of \$1.79 with an average of \$1.58, which equalled the state average.

Loaded Proposals He threw his challenge down as the committee delved into the Soviet Union's submission of four loaded proposals: A World Congress of Sport in 1965 to include all present groups and federations under IOC sponsorship.

Granting full status to Communist North Korea and Communist East Germany. Break-up of the present "All German" Olympic team, and as a consequence, give West Berlin special status with its own team.

Some action to ostracize nations such as France, which chose not to sign the pledge against nuclear bomb testing.

At the time the Yanks were tied for first place with the Orioles and White Sox, Houk moved Tom Tresh from left field to Mantle's position in center and also got considerable mileage out of John Blanchard, Maris' replacement in right field.

Mantle, who was out of the regular line-up for almost three months, played in only 65 games. Despite this, the Yanks won the pennant by 10 1/2 games.

### Boxer Dead After Bout For \$250!

BALTIMORE (AP) — Heavyweight boxer Ernie Knox died in a Baltimore hospital today, a day and a half after he battled for a \$250 purse.

Doctors said a blood clot on the brain killed him, and even had he lived he would have been partly crippled. Knox died at Provident Hospital at 6 a.m.

He was knocked out in the ninth round of his fight with Wayne Bethea of New York Monday night.

Knox, floored for a nine-count earlier in the round, lay stretched out on the ring canvas for nearly 10 minutes after a volley of Bethea punches sent him there at 1-15 of the round.

The 26-year-old Baltimorean was carried from the ring and later sent to the hospital.

At the hospital Knox seemed all right. But early Tuesday morning, he lost consciousness. An emergency operation removed a blood clot from his brain.

The loss was the fighter's sixth in 19 bouts. He won 10 and drew three.

His last one, before the Bethea fight, was nine months ago when he licked Jim Robinson in Reading, Pa.

In between his scattered bouts he sometimes worked as a hod carrier. He was collecting unemployment insurance when he stepped into the ring at the Coliseum to face Bethea.

### Bill Ford Offers To Buy Lions For \$6 Million In Sudden Move For Control

DETROIT (AP) — The Ford automobile family's William Clay Ford is laying \$6 million on the line to buy the Detroit Lions.

Bill Ford, a scion of the famed auto world's Fords and who is president of the National Football League club, created a sensation at the Lions' directors meeting Tuesday with the surprise offer.

Ford offered the reportedly startled Lions' directorate the \$6 million for full control.

The Lions now are governed by a board of directors responsible to 144 stockholders.

For his \$6 million Ford would get a squad of players and the Lions modest headquarters office, the club's only tangible assets.

The 38-year-old Ford Motor Co. official—he is a company vice president—is the first member of his family to be a sportsman on a major scale.

Ford asked the Lions board to give him an answer by Oct. 29. He made no immediate public comment on his offer.

The \$5.5 million for the Detroit Tigers was paid by a syndicate headed by radio magnate John F. Fetzer of Kalamazoo, who obtained full control two years ago.

Came In 1934 The Lions came to Detroit in 1934 when the late radio executive G. A. (Dick) Richards bought the Portsmouth, Ohio, pro football franchise.
