Peninsula Forest Fire Hazard Up; Dangers Noted

Forest fire danger, already the greatest it's been in at least 10 years, gets worse by the day and there's still no relief in sight.

Bernard A. Stephansky, Marquette, regional field administration supervisor for the State Department of Conservation, said that the burning index was up to 57 throughout the Upper Peninsula again yesterday.

The burning index gives a numerical rating to the forest fire danger and any rating from 50 to 100 means that conditions are "explosive."

Spot fires, which start from embers blown one-fourth to three-fourths of a mile from a main fire, are common when conditions are explosive.

Poor Visibility Although the relative humidity was up slightly this morning, that wasn't expected to make any difference in the fire danger by afternoon.

In addition, conservation department personnel manning fire towers and flying fire patrol were expected to have a difficult time spotting fires today because of low visibility.

No new fires were reported in this area yesterday. John Kampainen, Marquette, regional dispatcher for the conservation department, said.

Kampainen noted that the fire danger is high this fall in many areas of the nation and that the Upper Peninsula has had relatively few fires in comparison to other areas.

"Lucky So Far" "We've been lucky so far this

fall because we have the cooperation of the public," Kampainen said.

"Our low fire record, in comparison to many other areas, is a credit to U.P. residents, who seem to be fire conscious. They're aware of the value of our forests, perhaps because we have so many hunters and people who depend on the forest for their livelihood," he said.

A ban on burning began yesterday by proclamation of Gov. George Romney. The Governor's order prohibits smoking except at authorized improved campgrounds, places of habitation or in vehicles, all burning of rubbish, all camp fires and the throwing of burning materials from vehicles.

"Only a good, soaking rain would put a stop to the increasing fire danger. A rainfall of a fourth of an inch or less wouldn't mean much," Kampainen said.

"We thought the fire danger was bad this spring, but I can't remember how many years since we've had fire weather like this."

Rainfall Down The area hasn't had any rain since Oct. 3 and the month's rainfall is about an inch below normal. The high temperatures and low humidity adds to the fire danger.

"Usually in October we have a heavy dew that lasts until late morning and forms again in the early evening, which keeps the ground damp most of the time," Kampainen noted.

Swampland Drying Up This year, he said, even the

swamplands are drying up. The result is muck fires, which creep underneath the ground and break through in scattered places.

Most of the leaves are on the ground and they are so dry that they crumble into powder under a footstep, he said.

Still burning is the 80-acre muck fire west of Ishpeming and east of Clarksburg. The fire started Oct. 1 from a railroad flare and conservation department officials say that it may continue until the snow comes.

Also under control, but still smoldering, is the 80-acre woods blaze north of Bessemer and not far from Lake Superior. The cause of the fire is not known, but firefighters theorize it was started by a negligent smoker. It was discovered Tuesday night.

Basement Damaged By Blaze

Fire yesterday afternoon damaged the basement of a vacant house at 346 E. Arch St., owned by Isabelle Dolf, Evanston, Ill.

Marquette's fire department was summoned at 4:40 p.m. and used the booster hose off the No. 2 (1,000-gallon) pumper to extinguish the flames.

Firemen said someone apparently had dropped a cigarette butt or a match on some leaves outside, starting the leaves on fire. Flames spread to the sill of a basement window which had the glass removed, starting the wood on fire.

Embers Drop Into Bin Embers from the burning sill dropped into the coal bin, igniting the coal and burning the bin, firemen added.

Although only the window sill, the coal and the coal bin burned, firemen reported, the basement was filled with smoke. The department's smoke ejector (a huge portable fan) was used to clear the basement of smoke.

Twelve firemen responded to the call, with the Nos. 2 and 4 (750-gallon) pumpers and the service truck. They returned to the station at 5:14 p.m.

U.P. Milk Income Dips Again

Upper Peninsula Milk producers' income in September was down \$6,345 from the same month a year ago, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Production went up from 9.71 million pounds to 9.74 million pounds so the difference was in price.

The blend (average) price of milk was \$3.881 per hundred-weight compared with \$3.90 a year ago.

Handlers Decline The price of Class 1 (drinking) milk in this zone was down from \$4.08 to \$4.01 and the price

of Class 2 (for manufacture) milk was up from \$2.06 to \$3.12. The average seven day income of producers was \$159.62 compared with \$149.93 in September, 1962, while daily average production went from 323,830 pounds to 324,694.

No Fire Permits In City Due To Hazard, Chief Rules

No fire permits are being issued in Marquette until the dangerous fire hazard is eased, Fire Chief John W. Myers announced today.

"With the exceptionally dry autumn," Chief Myers said, "the danger of fire is very prevalent. It is important, therefore, that extreme discretion be employed whenever open fires are made."

Code Cited Myers cited the city code (Section 8.77, on open fires), which states that "no person shall kindle a fire in or upon any street or alley nor within 25 feet of any building unless such fire be confined in a safe container and in no case within 15 feet of any building."

"every person who shall kindle a fire shall have some competent person constantly in charge of the said fire until it is completely extinguished."

In cases of limited fires, where constant supervision and proper maintenance is provided until the blaze is completely out, Chief Myers said, it is important that a water source be immediately available and in working order.

"However," he emphasized, "for the time being, due to the hazard, no outside fire permits will be issued." Myers also added that persons with outside incinerators should have, for year-round use, a screen of not less than one-half inch mesh to cover the container.

Mercury Hits 82 Here As Fall Heat Wave Continues

This region's somewhat fantastic autumn heat wave — practically unprecedented — continued today with no immediate end to the hot, dry weather expected.

The mercury soared into the 80s for the fifth time this month yesterday, reaching a high of 82 at 2 p.m. and remaining in the 80s for two and a half hours. It was the highest official temperature reported in Upper Michigan yesterday.

Low yesterday (in early

morning) was only 59, for a mean temperature of 71, which was 22 degrees above normal. For the month it's averaging 9.4 degrees above normal, according to Meteorologist Emil Ellingson, who said this may turn out to be the hottest October ever in Marquette's history.

Warmest October on record for the past half century was in 1947, when the mean was 56.2 degrees (normal is 48). Unless it gets very cool for the last

part of the month this will be near that record, Ellingson noted.

Southerly Flow Of Air

The hot weather, being enjoyed by most persons, but dreaded by conservation officials and others concerned about the mounting fire hazard (see local forest fire story), is due to a stationary high pressure ridge covering the eastern portion of the U. S.

This is causing a southerly flow of warm air, Ellingson

said. It was expected to be 80 again this afternoon and it'll be warm again tomorrow and Saturday. There's a good chance of some showers Sunday, however, he added.

Last night was one of the warmest nights this year — even warmer than many mid-summer nights. Most of the night it was in the middle 60s, with the mercury dipping to 61 at 9 this morning.

This month the thermometer has recorded five 80-degree temperatures in Marquette (the warmest being the 85 on the 1st) and five other 70-plus temperatures.

That's more hot weather than Marquette often experiences in some summer months.

It was in the high 70s in most

other places in the U. P. yesterday, with the county airport in Negaunee Township hitting 79, Sault Ste. Marie 77 and Calumet 76.

Rainfall this month (including the few drops this morning) has totaled only .18 of an inch, compared to the normal 1.26 inches. Precipitation for the year totals 18.40 inches, seven inches below normal.

U.P. Postal Test Group Meets Here

Participants from Upper Peninsula post office examination points learned to administer the civil service practical road test at a clinic held here during the past two days.

The clinic was sponsored by the U. S. Post Office Department with the assistance of the U. S. Civil Service Commission and was directed by Percy C. Chubb, executive secretary of the Marquette Post Office Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners.

The Marquette board of examiners has jurisdiction over post office positions in the U. P. and the 21 northern counties of the Lower Peninsula.

Emphasis On Safety

The new road test examiners will serve post offices and other federal agencies in various cities in the U. P.

The new road test requirement for post office carrier positions is a result of increasing emphasis on vehicle safety. The road test is also used for regular motor vehicle operator positions.

Now that trained examiners

are available, examinations announced for postal positions will include the road test when most of the carriers are required to perform driving duties, Chubb said.

Certificates of authorization as road test examiners were issued yesterday to participants in the clinic by Alan C. Reid, Chicago, representing the regional office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission.

Supervisors Here Adopt Resolution

At least two Upper Peninsula counties are getting tired of having the Michigan Legislature jam bills down their throats, so to speak, especially when such new laws involve additional costs to the counties.

The Marquette County Board of Supervisors added its voice to the Schoolcraft County Board this week in asking the Legislature to give it a chance to speak its piece before such measures are passed.

A motion to join Schoolcraft County in its appeal to the Legislature was made by Ishpeming

Mayor Theodore Mattson and adopted unanimously.

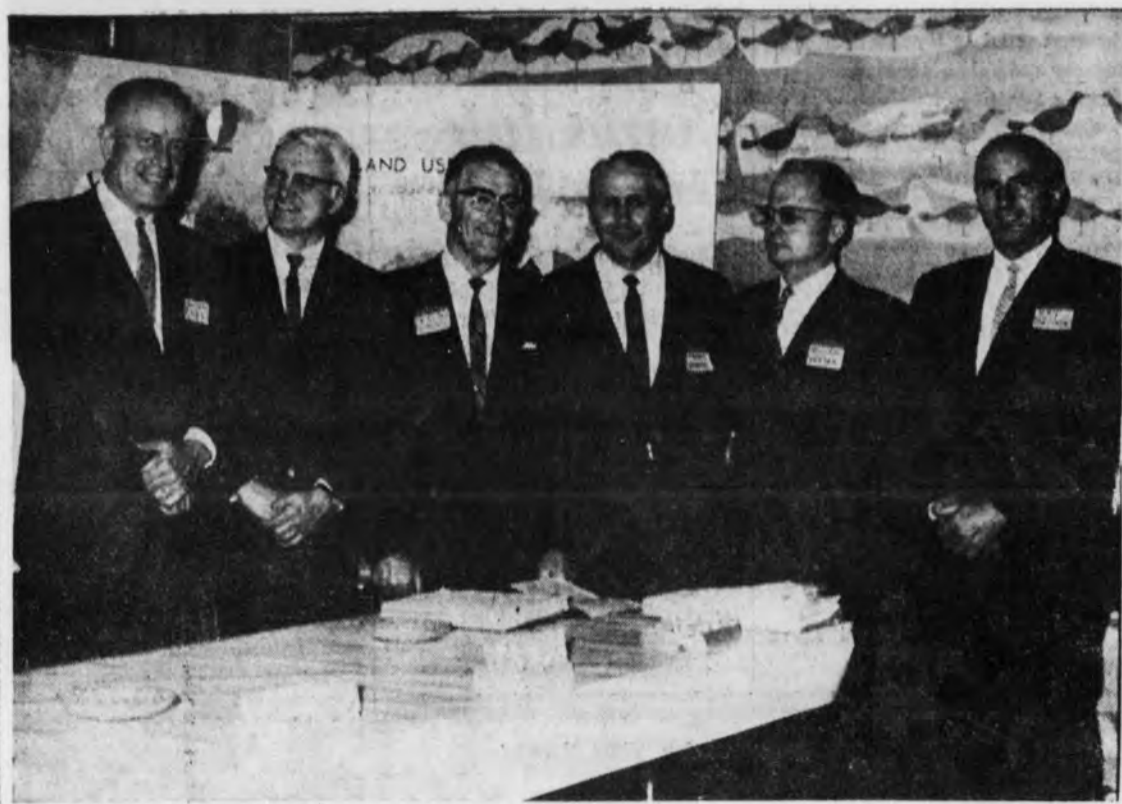

Stricter Enforcement Of Dog Ordinance Slated Here

More stringent enforcement of city ordinances covering the control of dogs is being studied by City Manager Thomas Moore and other city officials.

Mayor C. Fred Rydholm said at this week's city commission meeting that city officials would give full cooperation to take care of a problem of loose dogs, which Commissioner Steve A. E. Johnson pointed out constitutes "more than a full time job for our dog warden."

Refuse To Sign Complaint
"We're getting more than our money's worth from the dog warden. He not only has to answer complaints, but he has to take care of the dog pound every day of the week," Johnson said.

Answering complaints about loose dogs is complicated by the fact that most

persons refuse to sign a written complaint for prosecution of the dog owner, Police Chief George G. Johnson and City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea pointed out.

"Dogs won't just jump into the dog warden's truck," Chief Johnson quipped.

For example, he said that if a complaint of a barking dog is made to the police department, by the time the dog warden reaches the area, the dog has stopped barking and the dog warden has no idea where the dog is.

Won't Give Name
"Sometimes people who call the police department to complain about a dog won't give their name and then the dog warden has no way of checking on the complaint," he said.

A city ordinance states that

dogs must be kept under reasonable control by the owner, either on the premises of the owner or under the control of a competent person.

Some Cases Prosecuted
City Clerk Everett H. Kent said there have been very few cases in recent years in which violators were prosecuted. In most cases, he said, the violation is brought to the attention of the owner and alleviated.

The problem of loose dogs was brought up in a letter to the city commission this week from John J. Moravetz, 330 Mesnard St., who said that children should be able to walk on city streets without being molested by loose dogs. He appeared before the commission to suggest that the charge paid by owners who retrieve their dogs from the animal shelter should be listed as a penalty.

Impounded dogs are released to their owners upon payment of \$2 for the first impoundment, \$3 for the second impoundment, \$4 for the third and \$5 for each impoundment of

the same dog thereafter.

In addition, the dog owner must exhibit a currently effective dog license and a veterinarian's certificate that the dog is currently immunized for rabies.

City officials are discussing the possibility of issuing a summons, similar to a traffic ticket, to violators of the dog control ordinance, in addition to fees paid to retrieve animals from the dog pound.

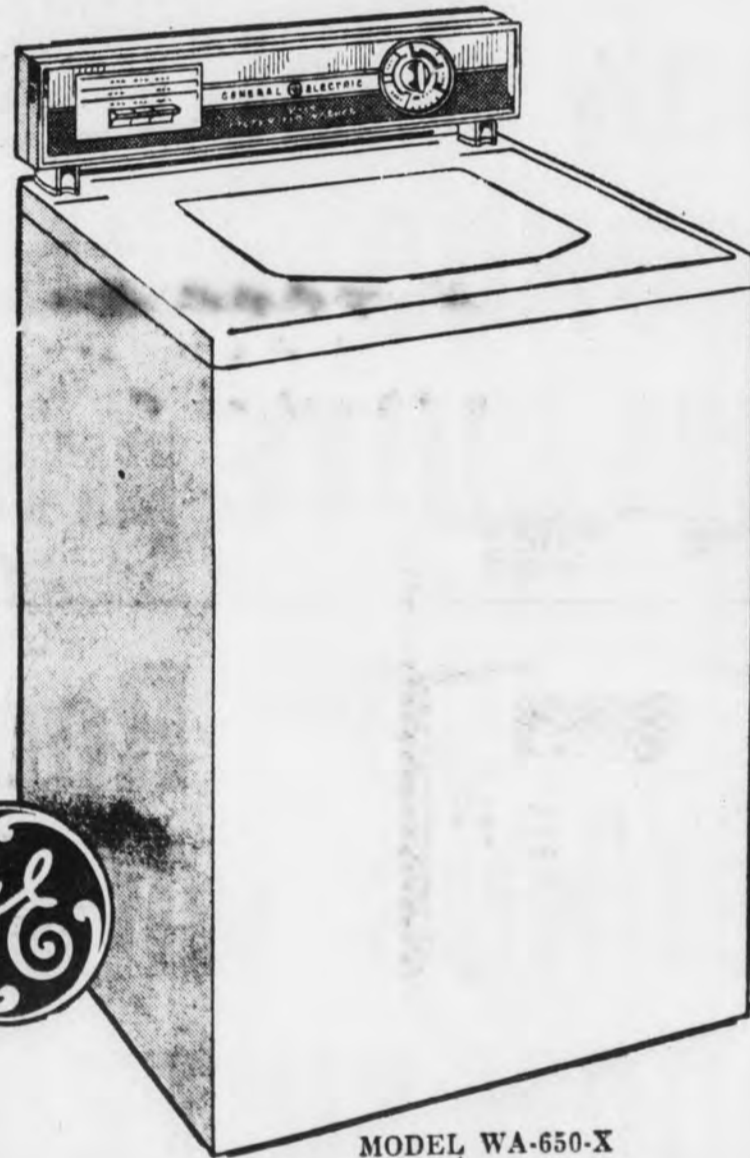

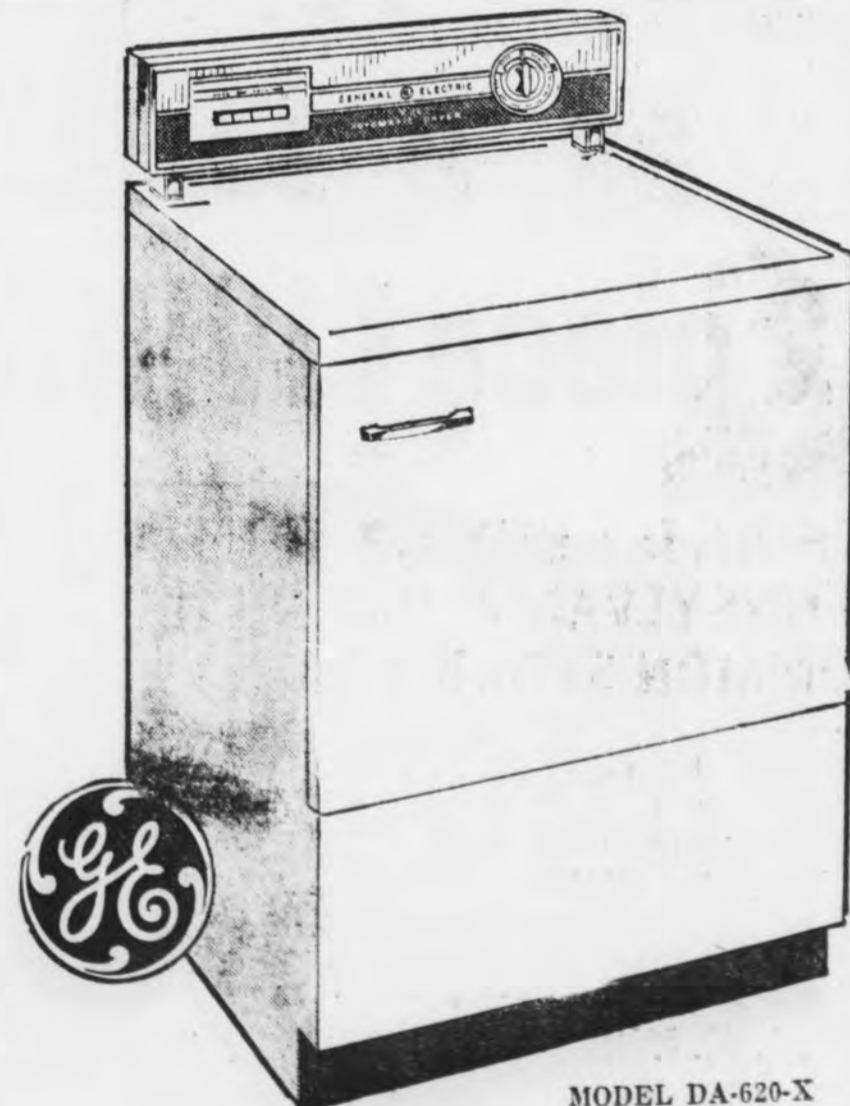

Merchants' Thoughts On Christmas

By JACK LEFFLER

NEW YORK (AP)—It's too early for most of us to think about Christmas shopping. But it's uppermost in the minds of merchants.

It looks like a good season ahead.

The National Retail Merchants Association predicts that Christmas buying will run as high as \$3 billion, exceeding the 1962 total by 2 per cent.

Optimistic On Holiday

"Retailers are justifiably optimistic about their Christmas prospects this year with business conditions good and consumers wealthy and inclined to spend," says the Value Line Investment Survey, a research organization.

Merchants who have long since ordered their Christmas wares are beginning to receive them and already are making plans to get an early jump on the selling season.

Fewer Shopping Days

This year there will be five fewer shopping days between Thanksgiving Day and Christmas, the traditional buying period.

To offset this, top departments will be bursting into life as early as Nov. 1.

And although people do their Christmas shopping when they finally feel the seasonal urge, merchants will try to inspire that urge before Thanksgiving arrives.

Stay Open Longer

Stores also will stay open longer hours and more evenings in an effort to win back those five lost days.

Christmas buying represents 18 per cent of the entire year's sales and this is a big factor in the annual profit picture.

The mail order houses also are getting ready for the yuletide season.

The big four — Sears, Roebuck Co.; Montgomery Ward & Co.; Spiegel, Inc.; and Aldens, Inc.—will distribute more than 23 million Christmas catalogs.

Prices listed in the new catalogs are about the same as last year but toys are lower.

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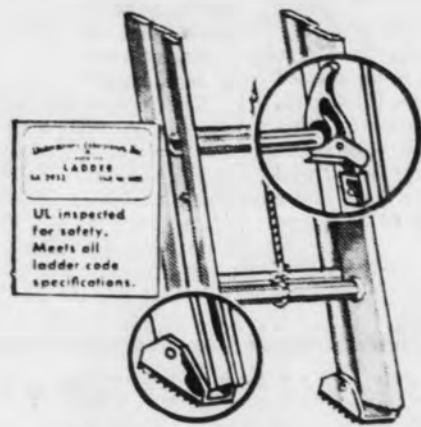

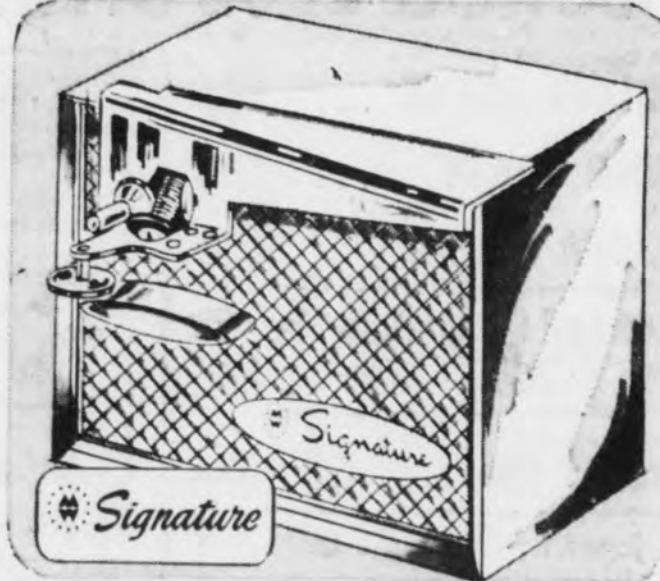

Scenic Railroad Engine Makes Run To Big Bay; 25 Men Working On Job

A train appeared in Big Bay recently for the first time since 1957.

It was a 1910 steam locomotive, once used by the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Co. and now owned by the Marquette and Huron Mountain Railroad Co.

The new railroad company has purchased 11 of the old LS&I steam engines for lease to Thunder Bay Recreations, Inc., which intends to operate a recreational railroad for tourists and railroad fans as a first phase in the Superiorland tourist project.

Like the elephants in a circus, the steam engine is being used to rebuild the railroad line over which it will run, the old Lake Independence Line which extends for 23.74 miles from the LS&I yard in Marquette to Big Bay.

Bought For \$90,000
The unused line was purchased by the Marquette and Huron Mountain Railroad Co. from the LS&I for \$90,000. It is being rehabilitated by Thunder Bay Recreations, Inc., which also will lease the line, at an estimated cost of \$60,000. Twenty-five men are now employed on line rehabilitation

crews, John A. Zerbel, of Milwaukee and Marquette, main Superiorland developer, said.

On the trip to Big Bay, seven carloads of ties and two carloads of bridge timbers were

FHA Loans Now Include Recreation Enterprises

Farm operating and ownership loan programs of the Farmers Home Administration (of the U.S. Department of Agriculture) now include income-producing recreation enterprises for which loans may be made to family farmers.

According to word received by FHA officials and County Extension Director Melvin N. Nyquist of Marquette, loans for recreation enterprises are made only to farmers and ranchers who manage and operate their own farms and who are classified no larger than family farming units.

These loans are aimed at helping borrowers develop recreation enterprises that will supplement their income from farming, Nyquist noted.

A booklet available in the Michigan State University county extension office in the

courthouse here or in FHA office in Marquette explains how the loan funds may be used, the security required, the terms and the interest rate and the factors determining eligibility, Nyquist said.

2nd Hearing Slated On Judgeship

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Herbert Walters, D-Tenn., said Wednesday a second hearing would be held for further testimony on President Kennedy's nomination of Detroit Police Commissioner George Edwards to a judgeship on the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the 6th District.

Walters said the assurance came from Sen. Sam Ervin, D-N.C., of the Senate Judiciary Committee, after Walters asked for the additional hearing.

No Date Set
An earlier hearing was held about a week ago. No date was set immediately for the new hearing, Walters said.

The 6th District includes Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky and Tennessee.

Meanwhile, the president of the Tennessee Bar Association, S. Shepard Tate, sent a telegram to Sen. James Eastland, chairman of the Judiciary Committee, in which Tate urged Edwards' appointment not be confirmed.

'Disqualification'
Tate told Eastland that Edwards' "reported admissions of past activities would show a disqualification for this high judicial office."

This came after testimony before the committee last month in which Edwards said he had been jailed in Michigan and Arkansas for contempt of court in connection with labor strikes in the 1930s.

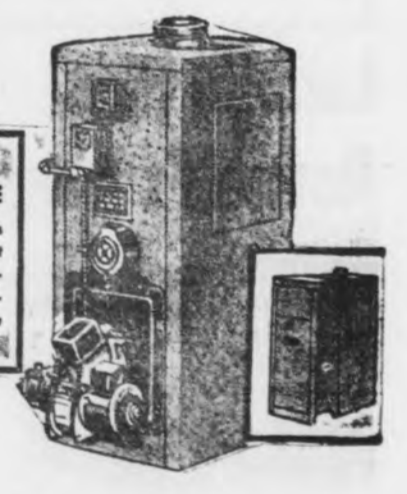

U.P. Scout Council Leads Four-State Region In Gains

Hiawathaland Upper Peninsula Council, Boy Scouts of America, is still leading the four-state Region 7 in percentage gain of boy membership according to Guy Petersen, Marquette, the council's organization and extension committee chairman.

At the end of the third quarter of 1963, the six districts of the council were each ahead of last year, both in number of units and boys.

173 Gain For District
The districts and their number of boys gained compared to Sept. 30, 1962 are: Chippewa District (Chippewa, Mackinac and Luce Counties) 306; Copper Country District (Baraga, Ontonagon, Houghton and Keweenaw Counties) 143; Pere Marquette District (Marquette and Alger Counties) 173; Red Buck District (Delta, School-

craft and part of Menominee Counties) 206; Menominee Range District (Dickinson and part of Florence, Wisconsin Counties) 92; and Iron Range District (Iron County) 36.

Council President Burton Boyum, Negaunee, commented in his letter to the executive board members of the council that, "this 999 boy increase reaffirms my belief that more and more boys and their parents are realizing the great value of Scout training as well as its opportunities for fun and fellowship."

Council Finance Committee Chairman Dwight Leavitt, Calumet, added that he hoped every citizen of United Fund or Community Chest areas would realize this increased need for operating funds when

they make their pledge to their community's campaign, now being held in most areas of the Upper Peninsula.

He demonstrated the need by pointing out that if the present employed staff worked only the usual 40 hour week that they could spend only three minutes each month with every registered Scouter in the council.

"These four men are helping us produce records, not only in numbers of boys being served by Scouting, but the quality items, such as advancement and camping, are keeping pace with the membership growth," he said. "We can meet this increased challenge only if the citizens of our council believe enough in Scouting to provide adequate financial support."

Editor's Note — The U. S. payments deficit has been rising when it was supposed to fall. Will my five highest years be used in figuring my benefits? I paid the maximum social security tax from 1950 until I was laid off in January 1961." — F. J.

Answer: No, Mr. F. J. Ten

years must be used in the computation of your benefit rate. The law provides that no more than five years of low or no earnings may be dropped when a benefit is computed. In your case, the years 1951 through 1965 must be considered in figuring the benefit due you. The five years of low or no earnings would be 1961 through 1965, and these would be dropped. The years 1951 through 1960 would be used to figure your average monthly wage on which your benefit rate is based.

Q. "My ex-husband was killed in an automobile accident last month. He worked regularly and paid the social security tax for over ten years. We were divorced three years ago and he contributed \$150 a month for the support of our

two minor children who live with me. I have been told that the children are eligible for social security benefits. Will I receive a payment for myself as their mother?" — Mrs. G. S.

Answer: No, Mrs. G. S. Since you were divorced and your husband was making support payments for the children only, you cannot qualify for any benefits from his account.

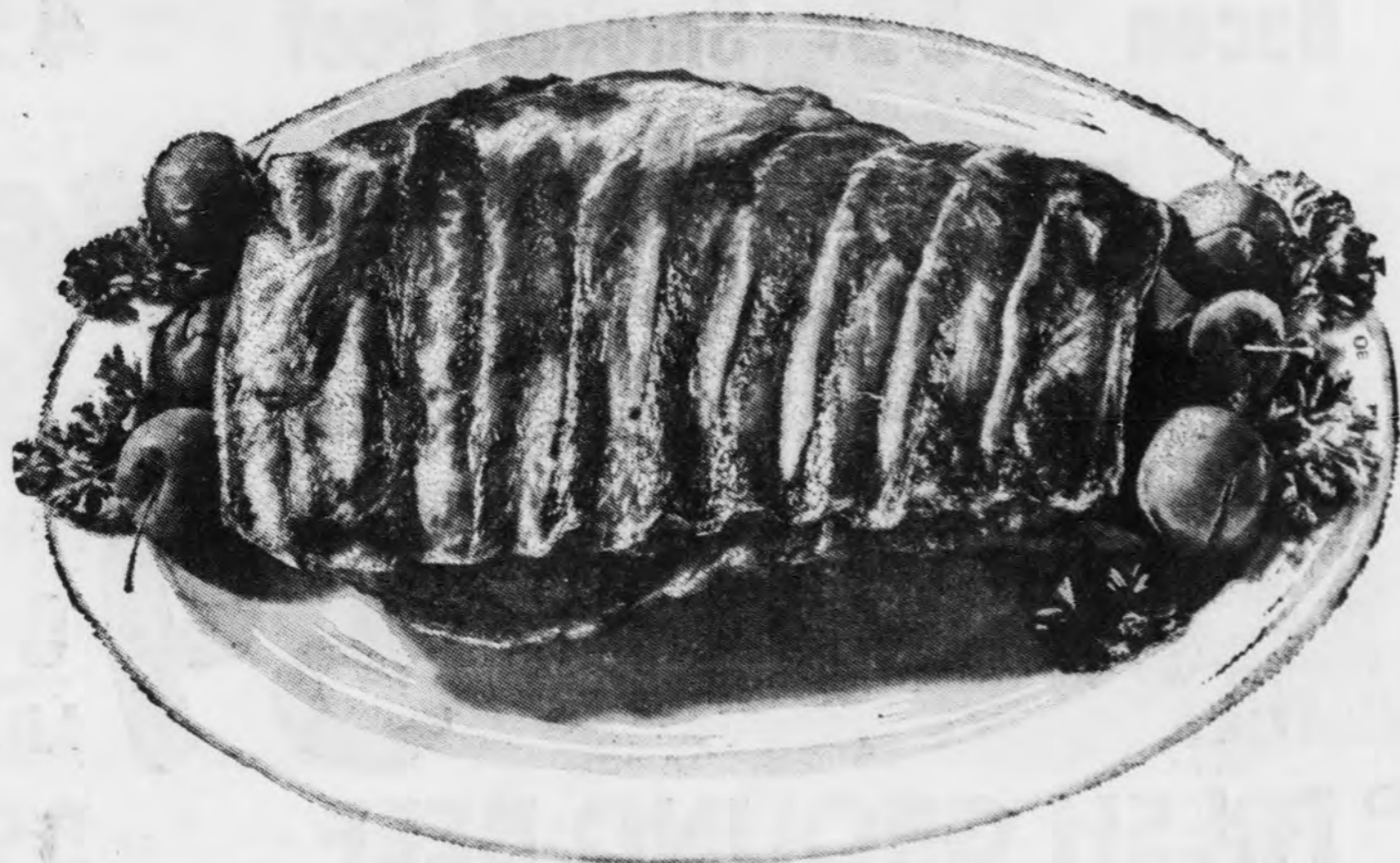

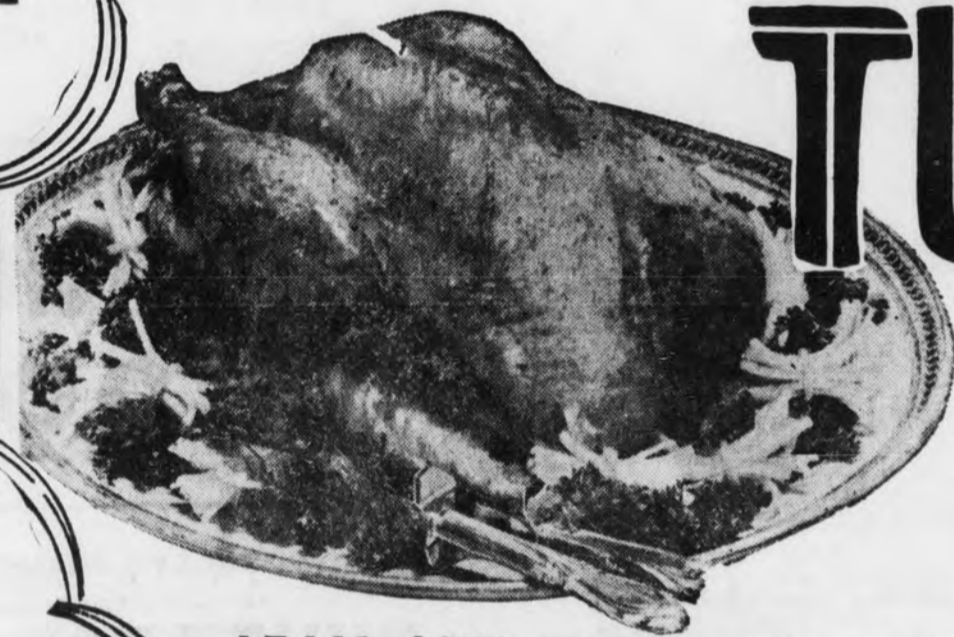

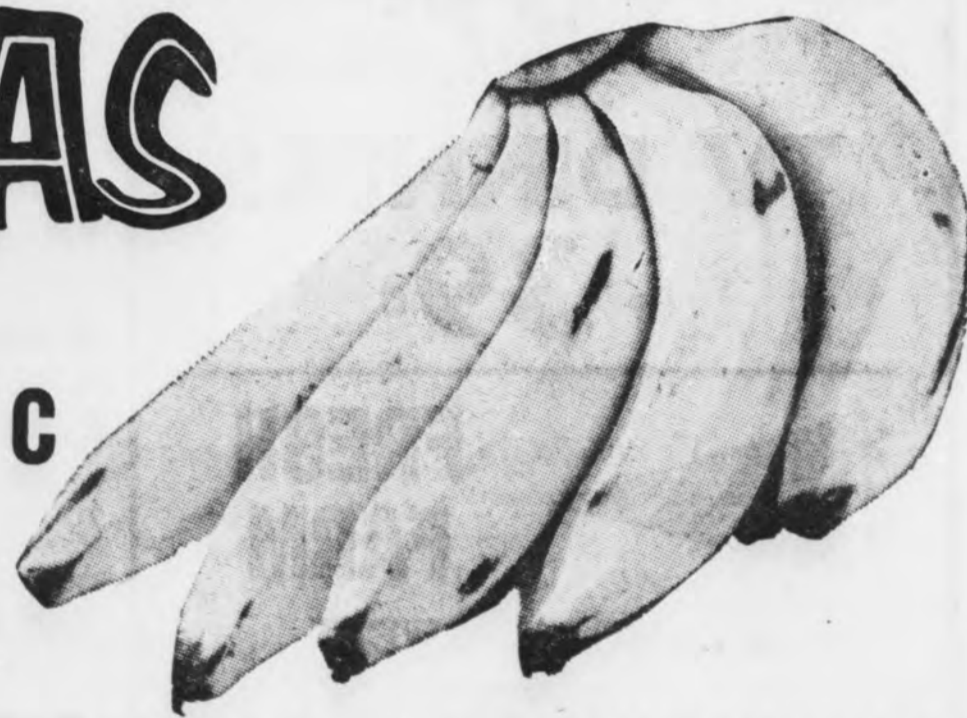

Battle Of Sexes: On Jobs?

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Saucy reporter May Craig asked President Kennedy early in his administration, "sir, what are you doing for women?"

So in December 1961 the President created a 26-member Commission on the Status of Women with the late Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt at its head to study the situation.

Twenty-two months later on the anniversary of that great lady's birth, the commission filed its report and went out of business.

The first natural reaction of any mere male to all this is to don misogynist robes and imitate Schopenhauer. What do women want with any more status than they now have?

But women are never satisfied and never will be, which is one of the things that makes them so—so womanly.

The commission report, titled "American Women" is an 86-page slick paper job that sells for \$1.25 from Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., Zip Code 20401...

At last report, Old Nassau was not a coeducational institution. This either makes Dr. Lester a traitor to his sex or a moderating influence that kept the report from being any more extreme than it is.

Details of the commission's findings and all 24 of its major recommendations will be reported in the news columns or in the women's pages.

In 1900 the average life expectancy for women was 48 years. Today it is 73 years. American girls are marrying younger than their mothers and grandmothers did.

What this means for the future is that more women will find that they have a second life to live after their children are grown.

One third of the labor force is women. Half of the 24 million employed women are in the 45 or older age bracket and 55 percent of them are married women.

These are women who for financial reasons can't or for personal reasons don't want to sit out the second half of their lives. They want to resume old careers or find new ones.

There is another aspect of it which the commission report doesn't go into, but which is worth a close look. This is the effect which the employment of more and more women has on the total unemployment picture.

To provide jobs for all these women means that the growth rate of the economy must be accelerated more than if only an expanding male labor force has to be kept at full employment levels.

TV Backlog Could Prove Dangerous

NEW YORK (AP) — When the average filmed television series makes its network debut at the beginning of the season...

In the case of one established hit, "Hazel," the crew and cast worked through last spring and early summer on the fall production.

But in the case of the new programs, this practice of storing up episodes so far in advance is dangerous and, in some cases, fatal.

When plans were announced for CBS' new "Judy Garland show," the network hoped to have 13 shows completed before the variety hour had its premiere.

Because of a shift of producers resulting in a month's suspension of tapings, there were only five, and maybe it was a lucky break.

With a flexibility rare indeed in television, network executives recently pulled one show from its schedule and substituted another, made only two days before. They decided that it was a better show. And it was.

Usually, however, a series must go its pre-determined course. Story lines, formats and concepts — even players — are chosen by a handful of "execs" months, sometimes years before the public finally passes judgment.

NBC's "Espionage" on Oct. 23 has a timely subject: a security leak in a British ministry. NBC plans to adapt Britain's "That Was The Week That Was," a satiric treatment of the news, to a weekly series for Americans next season.

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However, while chuckling at the antics of New York lawmakers, it's only fair to watch Washington. So far Congress hasn't stirred toward a self-governing code of ethics so vigorously discussed in past national campaigns.

THE \$100,000 FLOP A television quiz show which offered a top prize of \$100,000 in cash has been withdrawn from view after three performances, and its producers seem a little puzzled over why it failed to draw an audience.

A couple of possible reasons suggest themselves. Maybe the ghost of the rigged shows of several years ago is destined to haunt some of the new efforts, no matter how honest.

Dodgers Get \$12,794 For Winning

NEW YORK (AP) — The dazzling World Series pitching of Sandy Koufax, Johnny Podres and Don Drysdale, which buried the New York Yankees in a four straight, put an additional \$4,919.68 into the pockets of each fulltime member of the Dodgers.

In a breakdown of the Series player shares, Commissioner Ford Frick disclosed Wednesday that a full share was worth \$12,794 to a winning Dodger while each full share for the losing Yankees amounted to \$7,874.32.

They are the highest winning and losing shares in Series history. The Dodgers voted 32 1/2 full shares, the Yankees 35 3/4. It was the first million dollar player pool, the Dodgers getting \$427,369.51 and the Yankees \$284,913 from the \$1,017,546.43. The Dodgers' winning share surpassed the old winners' high of \$11,232.18 paid to each full-time Dodger in Los Angeles' victory over the Chicago White Sox in 1959. The Yankees' losing share is some \$600 more than the previous high of \$7,291.49 which the San Francisco Giants received after they lost to the Yankees in 1962.

The 38-year-old auto executive, known as Bill Ford to everyone in the Lions' organization, is a grandson of company founder Henry Ford and a brother of Henry Ford II, the firm's board chairman. Ford became Lions' president in January, 1961, ending a proxy battle for control among two former team presidents.

He said he had been planning his offer to buy the club for a year, and the offer was not affected by the Lions' record this season — two victories in five games.

Nobody Happy "Nobody is happy with the way things are going," said Ford. "But it's a long season and we haven't given up on this club. Maybe one man can't solve all the problems, but he can cut them down at least. That is what I hope to do."

If his offer is accepted, he said, "I don't intend to coach the team. George (Wilson) is the head coach and still will be. "George will be talking to one guy (Ford). That's better than talking to a crowd after a loss," he added.

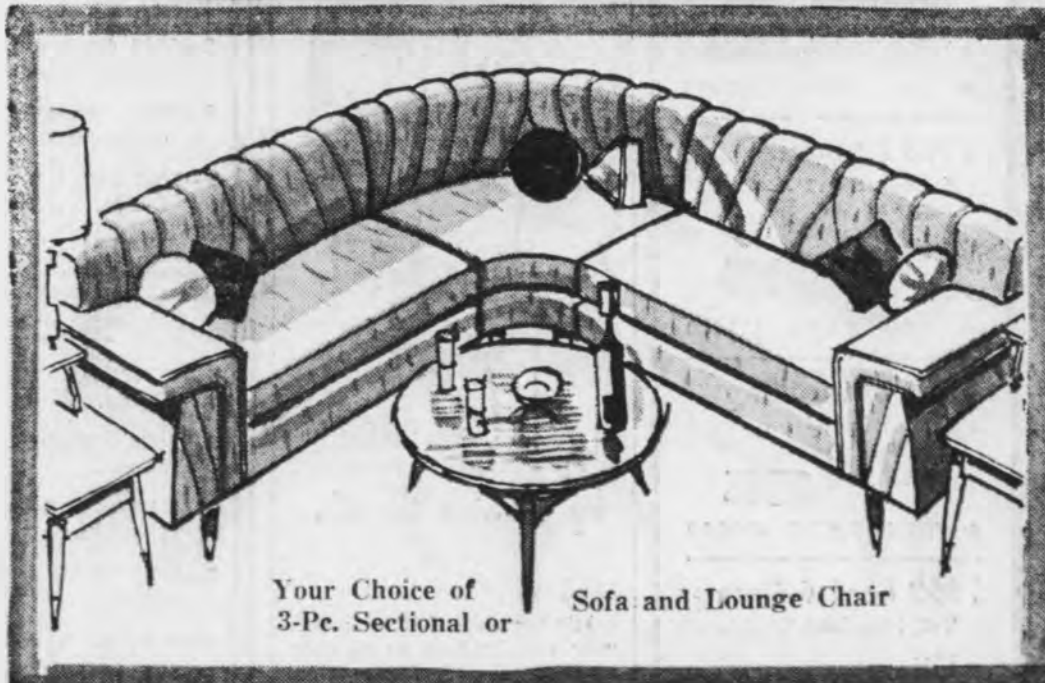
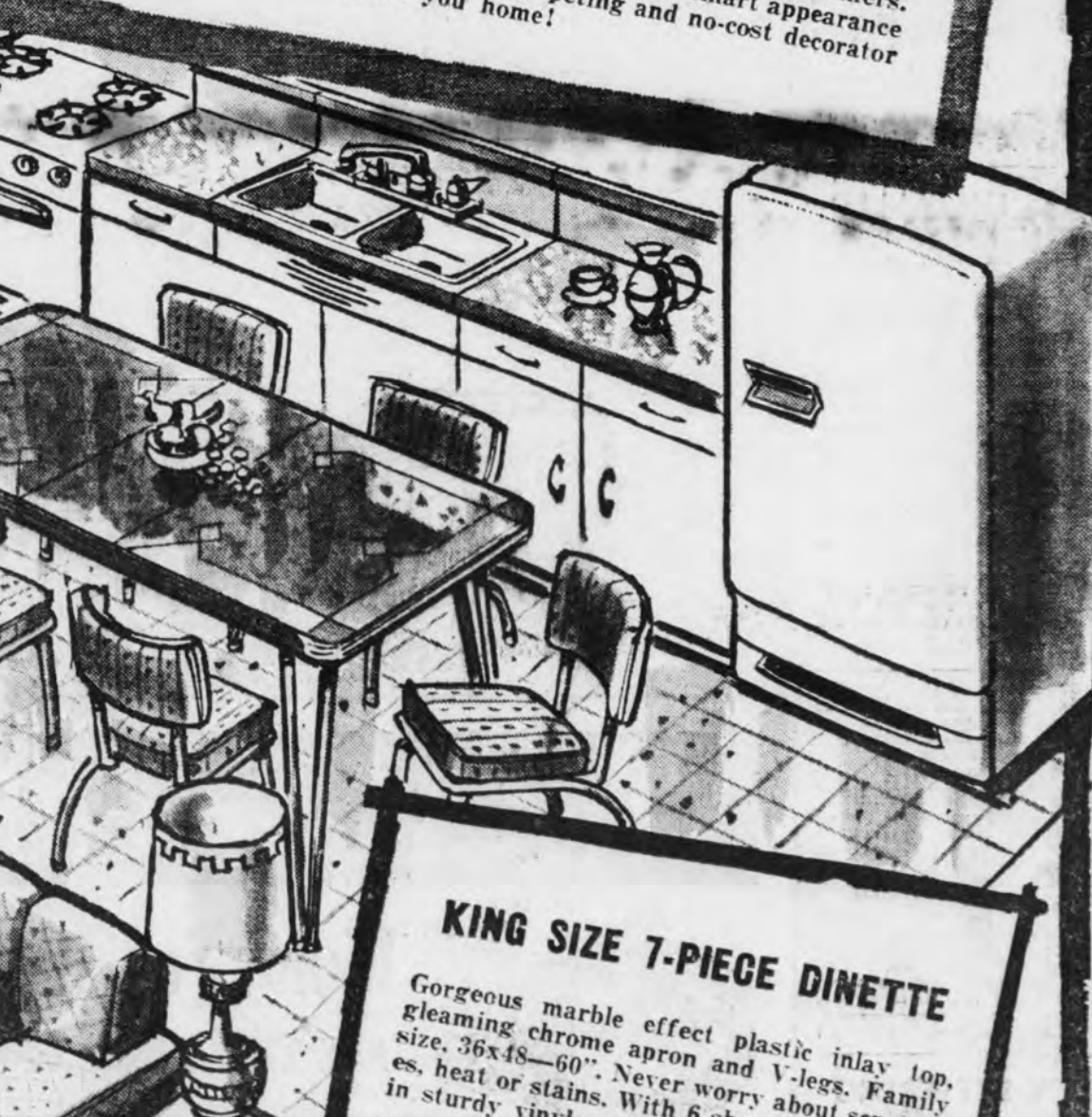
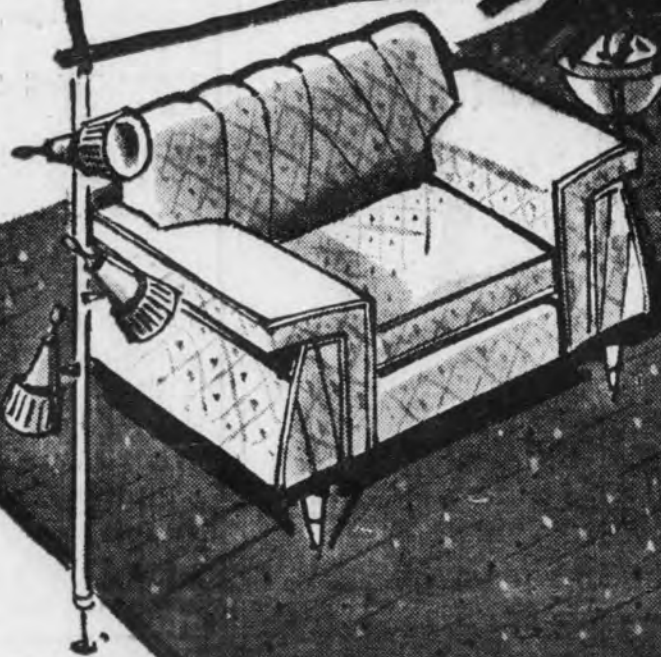
