Republicans Eye Revised Tax Plan

LANSING (AP)-Gov. George Romney and Republican legislative leaders held out hopes today for their sharply - revised tax reform program after watching it receive a cool response in its first test.

The program - built along lines originally proposed by Romney but with several changes including an increase in state aid to schools - was headed for a second scrutiny by GOP caucuses in the House and

In its first exposure Tuesday, the program encountered mixed "It didn't win any medals-

but it wasn't a total flop, either." said one member of the Republican "Leadership Committee" formed last week to end the tax reform stalemate. Meet Again The 10 - member committee

met again with Romney Tuesday night in an effort to iron out objections raised by Republican lawmakers in the caucuses. The revamped program would

change property tax relief provisions and offer state school aid amounting to some \$42 million over the next three years. Where Romney had called for a 20 per cent reduction in school

property taxes to be rebated to districts by the state, the committee proposed an across-theboard 10 per cent reduction in all general property taxes. This would be tied to an in-

crease in state payments of \$7 per pupil over the next three years, plus a 14 mill increase per year in the deductible millage equalization factor.

This would cost \$7 million in 1964-65, \$14 million in 1965-66. and \$21 million in 1966-67.

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



Storm Over Cancer Drug

By PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON -(NEA)- The 13-year-old medical battle that has been fought over the so-called "anticancer drug" Krebiozen is coming to a climax within the next few weeks. The issue is whether Krebiozen, having now been found to

have caused cancer regression in two out of 504 cases on which records are available, should be tested further.

On the other hand, U. S. Food and Drug Commissioner
George P. Larrick has asked the drug's discoverer. Stevan Durovic, and his scientific adviser in the Krebiozen Foun-

dation, Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, to show cause why they should not be prosecuted in criminal court. The drug has been administered to more than 4,200 patients on payment of a \$9.50 contribution for each injection ampuls containing one part Krebiozen to 1,000 parts mineral oil

Some patients are reported to have paid out thousands of dollars for treatment. The total receipts could conceivably have run into millions of dollars. High Production Cost Claimed

Dr. Durovic, of Yugoslav birth, developed Krebiozen from an extract of infected horse blood in the Argentine before bringing it to America. He has claimed it cost \$170,000 a gram to pro-Food and Drug Administration laboratory tests have

identified Krebiozen as creatine, costing 30 cents a gram to produce, or eight cents for the amount in each injection. The developers counter that Krebiozen is not 100 per cent creatine and that it contains an added factor not yet identified. Medical Records From 504 Patients

Food and Drug Administration field investigators collected medical records on 504 patients identified by the Krebiozen Foundation as having received treatments. FDA is now assembling information to see if there has been violation of the law.

Points covered by the investigation include the possibility of misbranding through incorrect labels, the shipment of impure or adulterated drugs not up to standard, shipment in interstate commerce of a new drug without authorization, the making of false statements as to its efficacy.

After assembling all the evidence, it will be presented to

deterring Dorovic and Ivy in the slightest. They are going ahead with demands for new, joint chemical analyses of Krebiozen and further clinical tests. The Krebiozen backers base their case on a finding that

natural regression of cancer without drugs, X-ray or surgery occurs in one out of 50,000 cases. National Cancer Institute's advisory council found two cases out of the 504 reviewed in which the council says regression could be attributed to Krebiozen.

On the basis of these two cases, it is argued that Krebiozen is 200 times more effective than nature and therefore worth further research.

The whole controversy, which has raged for years was given a public airing when two rival medical meetings were held in Washington Oct. 25-26.

Three Named To Baraga's Plan Group

63

L'ANSE - Three new members were appointed to the Baraga County Planning Commission and a \$600 increase in the commission budget was authorized at a special meeting of the Baraga County Board of Su-

Acting on recommendation of the commission chairman, Dr. Eric A. Bourdo Jr., the board unanimously named Leroy A. Stevens, Thomas B. Durling and Hubert Mather, all of L'Anse, to posts on the planning

Stevens, Michigan Conservaion Department district forester, will head the forestry and wood products section of the commission; Durling, district fisheries supervisor for the conservation department, will be chairman of the recreation and tourism committee, and Mather, a practicing attorney and Baraga County prosecutor, will handle the laws, ordinances and zoning phases of the county planning report.

Inventory Of Timberlands

Bourdo, appearing before the supervisors to report on the work of the commission during the past nine months, submitted a copy of the forestry report prepared by a resource committee headed by Stevens. This report includes a detailed inventory of timberlands in the county, with complete figures on state, federal and large privately-owned blocks (such as Celotex Corp. and Ford Fund holdings), plus a careful estiate of the timber in small private ownerships. The report also contains information on growth potential, a breakdown by specie, quality and anticipated harvest date, and detailed information on the type, number and proximity of roads providing access to these stands.

Bourdo told the supervisors: "This is the finest county report of this kind I have ever seen. This type of detailed information is invaluable to new woodusing industries which might be considering Baraga County as a plant site.'

Bourdo commended Stevens and his committee, comprised of M. O. Olson of Celotex., T. A. Rogge of the Ford Motor Company Fund and Blaine Fenstad of the U.S. Forest Service, for the time and effort they expended in preparation of the report. He added he hoped to get this type of well-organized. comprehensive reports on the other important facets of the overall planning program for the county, in order to complete the over-all economic development project report required by the federal government for any county participation in ARA or APW programs.

Other Members

Other members of the commission, which is limited by law to 11 members, are Dr. Bourdo, Raymund J. Tembreull, George Falk, Mrs. Dorothy Jacobs, G. Glen Sands, Robert Godell, Henry Salvador and Michael J Strucel. G. F. Biekkola, county secretary to the planning body. official advisor to the commission and Mrs. T. B. Durling is secretary to the planning body.

The supervisors also granted Dr. Bourdo's request for a budget increase from the \$200 allotted last year to a total of \$800 for 1964. A breakdown of this figure lists \$100 for UPCAP annual dues, \$200 for travel expenses, and the remaining \$500 for stenographic services, printing, binding and any miscellaneous expenditures incurred in completion of the final OEDP report for the county.






