





MOSCOW (AP) - U.S. Am-bassador Foy Kohler today demanded the immediate release of Prof. Frederick C. Barghoorn. Yale University professor held by the Russians on spy charges.

The ambassador spent 15 minutes with Valerian Zorin, deputy foreign minister. He also demanded the right to see Barghoorn and to have the charges against him given in detail. Statement

In a brief statement, the embassy said the ambassador "registered a strong protest at the completely unwarranted arrest and detention of Prof. Barhoorn od of time between his arrest and notification of the American Embassy by the Ministry

of Foreign Affairs." The Foreign Ministry announced the arrest of the visiting professor Tuesday, said it took place several days ago but gave no other information.

Demand "The ambassador demanded immediate access to Prof. Barghoorn and requested his release forthwith," the statement continued.

Barghoorn, professor of politcal science at Yale, has writen a number of books critical of the Soviet system and was here on a tourist visa preparing to write a further book.

Jet Victim's **Mother Gets** JFK Letter

Mrs. Cele Mertins of Iron River, mother of a K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base officer who was killed Sept. 18 in a jet crash at the base, has received a letter from President John F. Kennedy, noting with regret the death of her son.

Mrs. Mertins' son, Capt. Milton M. Mertins, 29, was the radar observer in a plane piloted by Capt. Floyd J. Chandler, 28, Eau Claire, Wis., which crashed into the north end runway at the base, killing both officers.

They were returning from a routine flying mission. Mertins had been stationed at Sawyer since Dec. 1, 1959. Text Of Letter

The letter from the President states, "I have learned with deep regret of the death of vour son, Capt. Milton M. Mertins.

"Words, I know, are of little comfort in the loss of a loved one. However, I do hope you will gain some consolation in the knowledge that your son's service in the U.S. Air Force is sincerely appreciated by his fellow Americans.

"Capt. Mertins was an outstanding leader and his death will be keenly felt by all those with whom he came in contact. "Mrs. Kennedy and I extend our heartfelt sympathy to you." Other Letters



The debaters wouldn't come off so well if they left camp and debated with the persons who have written the rules for the hunt, but unfortunately this doesn't happen. And the affirmative gets aid and comfort from some conservation officers who agree with them that the shoot-any-deer rules are a mistake. These conservation officers don't understand the control plan. either.

The complexity of the situation is such that the debaters are often right. They judge the success of the management plan Dear Sir: from their observations in their local hunt area and they are usually qualified to do this. It is when they project their local situation as a statewide or regional criterion that they part company with the professional game managers.

\$600 Billion Country

By JOSEPH ALSOP

WASHINGTON - According to the government forecasters, the United States will be producing goods and services at the rate of \$596 billion per annum by the end of this year. And if all goes well, the Gross National Product will considerably exceed \$600 billion in 1964. The fact that we are about to become a \$600 billion country is remarkable enough, in itself, to deserve special notice. As anyone can see, moreover, it is a fact of great political as well as economic significance. It is bound to affect the world balance between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R., and it is also bound to affect the 1964 election.

If the nation's economic growth continues as prophesied, in truth, President Kennedy will be able to claim that he has kept his promise to "get this country moving again." When he took office, the Gross National Product was at the level of \$502 billion per annum. Thus the gain by the end of this year will be just short of \$100 billion. Furthermore, if the economy is given the additional stimulant of a generous tax reduction, the nation is expected to be producing goods and services at an annual rate well above \$600 billion - probably around \$620 billion by election time next year.

If this is achieved, the national growth in the President's year's in office will be above 20 per cent, and the average rate of growth will be more than 5 per cent per annum.

Two Reasons For Poor-Mouthing

Thus far, nonetheless, the Kennedy administration has been singing very small about the improved American growth-rate. There are two reasons for this poor-mouthing on the economic front.

On the one hand the combined effects of automation and a regular population increase of 2 per cent per annum partly cancel the effect of the growth-rate. Even more rapid growth, creating even more jobs, is needed to reduce the pool of unemployed workers in America to an acceptable level.

On the other hand, the President and those around him are deeply convinced that the tax bill must be passed, both to provide more jobs and to insure sustained growth. They fear that Congress will be reluctant to grant the desired reduction in taxes if Congress becomes too confident about present prosperity. Hence all the emphasis is now placed on the dire results to be expected from defeat of the tax bill.

Longest Peace-Time Economic Upswing

That will no doubt change quickly enough if and when the tax bill becomes law and the United States attains the impressive status of a \$600 billion country. Meanwhile, it is also worth noting that the U.S. under Kennedy seems likely to break still another kind of :ecord on the economic front.

Unless a wholly unforeseen slump lies just ahead, the country is now experiencing the longest peace-time economic upswing on record, except for the long, slow recovery that covered the first months after Franklin D. Roosevelt's first inauguration. The opposite was of course expected when the current upswing began.

The main reason for the undue apprehensiveness in the early stages of the current upswing was a natural but misleading argument from past experience. In brief, the upswing from 1949 to 1954 (not counted in the peace-time list because of Korea) lasted for a total of 45 months: the 1954-57 upswing endured for 35 months, and the 1958-60 upswing stopped after only 25 months. Looking at these statistics, the analysis began to suspect that hidden factors were operating to shorten our periods of upswing.

Contrast With Soviet Growth

Even the Kennedy administration's economists, who unanimously blamed the early cut-off of the second Eisenhower era upswing on unduly restrictive economic policies, nonetheless feared at the outset that the Kennedy upswing might be limited to only 15 months - thus making a neat 45-35-25-15 series. By the end of April, therefore, the Kennedy upswing will have ning for President, and he has endured longer than the next-longest peace-time upswing after the Roosevelt era of recovery, which was a period of 36 months of growth in 1879-82.

In sharp contrast, the Soviet rate of economic growth, which had averaged 7 per cent per annum in the years 1955-59, dropped to 6 per cent in 1960, to 5 per cent in 1961, and to 4 per cent in 1962. Estimates for the 1963 growth rate of the Soviet Union are not yet available, but, because of the misfortune of a very bad harvest, a further slowdown seems likely. It may be debated whether President Kennedy and his econmic advisers should get the credit for the encouraging performance of the U.S. Economy in the Kennedy era. But if you compare the performances of the U.S. and Soviet economies in these years, you must at least conclude that those who were getting ready to bury capitalism were just a mite premature.



City Okays Assessment **Roll Changes**

Adjustments in special assess-ment rolls in cases where part of the work has not been done by the city have been approved by the Marquette City Commis-

Because of city charter regulations, three resolutions covering the various types of changes had to be approved by the city commission. **Three Resolutions**

Resolutions were adopted enabling the following action:

1. Crediting various amounts to certain property owners in Kildahl's Addition (Raymond Fagerberg, Donald Thomas, George Oja, Victor Saari, Albert Leppanen and Gary Gutzman), for curbing work which had been included in the special assessment project but which had been done by the taxpayers named.

2. Crediting against the total assessment for taxpayers charged in 11 assessment rolls curbing, 334, 346 for paving, 336 for curbing, 339, 340, 341 for than five per cent larger than was necessary to pay for the project.)

3. Crediting four property owners in Spear's Subdivision No. 2 (Rodney Smith, Hilpie Liupakka, Clyde Winberg and Carl Pelto) with assessments projects, in which the taxpayers performed all the labor and furimprovement.

Differences Noted

Different resolutions were necessary because in some cases credit was given to taxpayers who provided labor and materials for part of the project, but who did not pay any of the special assessment; in some the taxpayers furnished labor and materials for part of the project and are paying the assessment by installments, and in the other taxpayers furnished labor project, but are required to pay city engineering fees and curb return rentals.







Vision Tests Given 767 In October

NEGAUNEE — Massachusetts vision tests were given 767 students attending local public and parochial schools during October, according to the monthly report filed yesterday by Mrs. Alice Sivula, health supervisor, with Supt. Robert E. Northey.

Mrs. Sivula pointed out that, out of the total number of pupils screened, 35 were referred for additional eye examinations. Communicable diseases increased during October when 20 cases of mumps were reported, plus seven upper respiratory infections. Other medical conditions consisted of one brain concussion and one urinary infection. Surgical procedures included two fractures and one tonsillectomy.

During the month dispensary visits were made by 188 pupils and Mrs. Sivula made six scalp inspections. One child was referred to the orthopedic clinic at Marquette, and one to the Child Guidance Center.

Dr. R. J. Sanregret conducted a dental clinic during which 791 children were examined.

Mres. Sivula visited all school buildings in the district, and held consultations with representatives of the Michigan Crippled Children's Commission

Students in the Lakeview, Central Grade and Kirkpatrick elementary schools consumed a total of 7,330 half pints of milk.

Upper Peninsula Basketball Season Opens Friday

If height, experience and ability make a team, the Upper Peninsula is on the eve of one of the greatest high school roundball campaigns in its history.

Throughout the region, it's apparent that more teams have more taller players and more capable veterans available for upcoming cage action than ever before.

Several schools have their 1962-63 outfits virtually intact for another winter; a few coaches of such veteran lineups actually do an about-face and admit they're looking for "even better" seasons. No less than eight players tower five or six inches over six feet, while an unusually large number go 6-4 or 6-5, according to reports from more than 50 of the 73 schools which sponsor varsity basketball teams in the Peninsula.

The 1963-64 campaign, which gets under way with 20 games this Friday night, could rival even 1955-56 as far as scoring and other accomplishments are concerned.

That was the year when (1) Stephenson, Crystal Falls, Chassell and Trout Creek took U. P. and state championships; (2) Trout Creek scored 1905 points for the biggest team basket barrage ever; (3) Chassell began its 65-game winning streak; (4) Stephenson's Mel Peterson appeared on the scene to shatter one individual record after another, and (5) Alpha's John Kocinski ended a four-year scoring spree that wasn't topped until Trout Creek's Jim Manning came along.

Missing from the scene this season will be Bill Koski, last year's scoring champ who hit 609 points in leading Champion to 19 consecutive regular-season victories, the second straight year the Indians had gone unbeaten in scheduled competition.

But back for at least one more winter are high scorers like Nahma's Brian (Pat) Groleau, polished 6-foot-5 cager who just missed gaining the point crown as a junior; Negaunee St. Paul's Dominic Jacobetti, who led the Emeralds all the way to the state Class D finals last spring; Trout Creek's Bob Manning and Bob Gale, who undoubtedly will score more than a combined 800 points; Hermansville's Ron Povolo, who could become a 30-point scorer even in his junior year; Wakefield's Terry Salmi, who could be just as valuable to the Cardinals in basketball as he was quarterbacking his football team to a 7-1 record this fall, and Marquette Graveraet's Bruce Forstrom, spark of the defending Class A champions.

Besides Marquette, Peninsula titles currently are held by Rudyard (Class B), Houghton (Class C) and St. Paul (Class D). All four champs could be even tougher in the new season

Of more immediate interest, however, are the conference races. Titleholders include Escanaba in the Great Lakes, Niagara, Wis., in the Menominee Range, Ironwood in the Michigan-Wisconsin, Champion in the Mid-Peninsula, Hermansville in the Big Eight, Nahma in the Central U. P., Mass in the Porcupine Mountains, Ontonagon in the Copper Country and Brimley in the Little Seven.

Names of two of those circuits have been changed. With the addition of Pembine, Wis., the Big Eight becomes the Big Nine, while the Little Seven hereafter will be known as
