## Capitol Police Alerted

WASHINGTON (P) - Police raced to the roof of the 7-story Internal Revenue Service Building today in response to a report that a man had been seen on the roof with a weapon.

The roof overlooks the Justice Department entrance used by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, brother of the assassinated Presi-

Officers of the General Services Administration found no one on the redtiled roof, But officer David M. Randall said he had seen a man with what looked like a weapon when he inspected the roof from a tower of the adjacent Old Post Office Building.

Kennedy, still in mourning over the death of his brother, had not come to the department at the time of the alert.

Police indicated they would keep an all-day watch on the roof and inspect elevators and vacant rooms in the Internal Revenue Service Building.

WASHINGTON (AP) - An eternal flame burning at the head of his grave, John F. Kennedy slept the eternal sleep today in Arlington National Cem-

The day of Kennedy's last journey was sharp and clear, its bright crispness in sharp contrast to the gray sorrow that etched the faces of the million people who lined the streets of Washington to say goodby. 'Hail To The Chief'

Nine servicemen bore the bier from the Capitol as the band played "Hail to the Chief." To the steady beat and roll of drums and the mournful tolling of church bells, the caisson rolled up Pennsylvania Avenue along the historic route the young President had traveled after his inauguration less than three years ago.

This morning, on response to eports that Mrs. Kennedy might fly to Boston today, a spokesman for the former First Lady said she was remaining 'in seclusion" at the White House today.





A final irony: In or near Dallas stands a statue of a Texas Ranger. Inscribed on the statue are these boastful words: "One Riot - One Ranger." ## **Protecting Our Presidents**

By BRUCE BIOSSAT WASHINGTON -(NEA) - President Kennedy's assassination stirs strong prospects that vastly tighter Secret Service safeguards and new limits on presidential freedom may quickly be

The assassin in Dallas had a clear shot from a high vantage point along the crowded route the late President followed.

Bullet-Proof Top Was Down The bullet-proof bubble top on the presidential car, flown to the Dallas scene at considerable expense, was down - exposing Kennedy to just as much danger as if he had used an

Not only Kennedy but at least two of his predecessors often chafed at Secret Service restrictions, and sometimes overrode their precautions. Reporters, including the writer, have frequently commented on the risks.

Only a few days ago Kennedy refused the customary local police escort on a New York City visit, exposing himself to all the hazards incident to rush-hour traffic delays. Incident In New York

In New York a young girl, camera raised high, raced past

all barriers, right up to the window of the presidential limousine, and snapped his picture. Commented a Secret Service man

'It could just as well have been an assassin." Months ago the late President, shaking hands with a wellwisher as he rode in an open car, was pulled off his feet as the man failed to let go.

Again and again veteran White House reporters watched Kennedy on tour as he shook hands at close range with citizens along fenced areas at airports and other points. Secret Service men, in the judgment of many, would have

been powerless to prevent the quick flash of a gun. Even around the White House, generally thought of as the most impregnable security zone, presidents now and then are subject to unreasonable risk. Kennedy had a habit of mingling with veritable hordes of visitors, any of whom could have shot him or thrust a knife into him.

Tight Security During World War II Newsmen traveling with presidents in recent years have been stunned at the ease with which would-be assassins now and then have had access to them. Ground routes seldom are fully protected at surface level. High vantage points, unguarded,

are common along such routes as Kennedy used in Dallas. It was not always so. In the tight security of World War II high spots were patrolled with extraordinary caution. When Franklin D. Roosevelt paid a wartime visit to Chi-

cago, I noted that every overpass and high building was lined with guards. Washington observers foresee now that far stricter regulations will govern such points, They believe also that the Secret Service may be given stiffer authority to control the President's

#### Memorial Half-Dollar Proposed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A San Francisco advertising man proposed today that five million 50-cent pieces be struck off in memory of the late President Kennedy.

The pieces should be sold for \$1 to raise money for scholarships, assistance to the family of the Dallas policeman killed in capturing Kennedy's accused assassin and to aid the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, advertising man Al Toth proposed in a letter to the examiner.

Toth said he believes everyone would agree with the first two objectives.


"As for the third, the Oswald widow and children knew nothing of the horrible plot concocted by Oswald....It would give notice to the world that we are a humane and compassionate people," Toth said.

#### Oswald Sought Visa From Cuba To Go To Soviet

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - The Cuban government said Monday night that Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President John F. Kennedy, tried Sept. 27 to get a visa to go through Cuba on the way to the Soviet Union.

Oswald's request was turned down, the Cuban government said in a statement broadcast by Havana radio and monitored in Miami.
