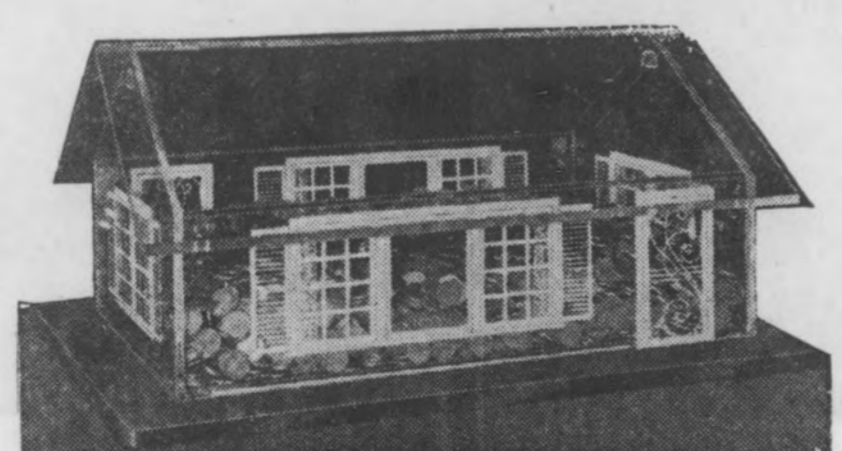

### Retraining Program Approved For 40 At NMU Area Center

Retraining programs have been approved for 40 unemployed men at the Northern Michigan University Area Training Center. The announcement was made today to The Mining Journal by U.S. Senators Pat McNamara and Philip A. Hart, who said the programs were approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Total federal participation in the programs is estimated at \$35,000. The men are all to be trained as welders in two separate programs, both beginning Monday, Dec. 2. In a 20-week program, 20 unemployed underground miners will be retrained as combination maintenance men and welders. They will be employed after training at the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co.'s new Empire Mine. Trainees are being selected now at the Ishpeming Michigan Em-

ployment Security Commission office. CCI and the U.S. Steelworkers Union have cooperated in the project by proposing the program, aiding in selection and aiding in employment of the trainees. The second program is a 16-week course which is aimed at upgrading the skills of 20 journeymen ironworkers. Trainees for this program are seasonably unemployed because of lack of skill. The course is expected to give them a greater assurance of permanent employment with construction firms because of increased productive ability. Being Selected Here Trainees for the 16-week program are being selected at the MESC office in Marquette. Both courses will be conducted at the NMU Area Training Center shops at the corner of Rock and S. Front Sts.

Davis told 500 persons, "We pray for the soul of John Kennedy, for his family, and for the new President of the United States." Churches About 2,000 persons jammed the Detroit Council of Churches' services at Central Methodist Church. The church seats 1,000 in its main auditorium. The Rev. Allan A. Zaun, council president and a Presbyterian, told the worshippers the late President "will be signally honored in history because of his ardent and unremitting pursuit of peace." More than 1,800 persons crowded the Adas Shalom Synagogue in Detroit to hear Rabbi Jacob E. Segal eulogize President Kennedy. "How deeply we wish it had never happened," Rabbi Segal said, "and how deeply we have been enriched by his life and stunned by his death." Bridge Closed The toll gate barriers on the Mackinac Bridge were lowered for one minute at noon. It was the first time the bridge had been closed since it opened six years ago. Air and train travel was cut sharply. People had cancelled their plans, or waited for another day.

### Business At Halt In City Thanksgiving

Thursday, for the second time this week, practically all business will be at a standstill in Marquette. Most stores and offices and places of amusement were closed here yesterday out of respect for the funeral rites for President John F. Kennedy. Legal Holiday Thursday's closing, which will not affect places of amusement, will be in observance of Thanksgiving, a national legal holiday. With the exception of some newsstands, places of entertainment and recreation, restaurants and a few neighborhood stores, which are normally kept open on holidays and Sundays, all business establishments, offices and factories in the city will be closed on Thursday. The Marquette City Hall, Marquette County Courthouse, state offices, federal offices, banks and private offices will be closed here on Thanksgiving Day. The Peter White Public Library, draft board office, Michigan Employment Security Commission offices and recruiting stations are among the places which will be closed for the holiday. Long Holiday For Many Some employees who do not work Saturdays also are taking Friday off, to give them a long holiday weekend. For most persons, however, it'll be back to work Friday as usual. Postmaster John S. Courtney reminded postal patrons that there will be no city or rural deliveries of mail on Thanksgiving Day, and that only special delivery mail and perishable packages will be delivered on Thursday. Mail will be distributed in all of the post office boxes, however, and all outgoing mail will be dispatched as usual. Street letter collections will be made on the regular holiday schedule. Church Rites Set There is no public observance or celebration scheduled in Marquette on Thanksgiving, so most residents will spend the day with their families eating turkey, watching the Green Bay Packers-Detroit Lions game on television or enjoying some other activity, since the deer sea-

Ten years ago at the gala wedding of John Kennedy and Jacqueline Bouvier in Newport, R.I., he had rendered the same selection. Vena had hardly finished when a police escort riding through the city at 60 miles an hour delivered Mary Ann Ryan, a distant cousin from Ireland, at the doors of the church. "You must come visit us at the White House, you have the Kennedy look," the President had told her when he visited his ancestral home in County Wexford last June. Now here she was arriving at his funeral after a hectic transoceanic flight taken at the invitation of Mrs. Kennedy.

### JFK Death Noted At City Meet

Mayor C. Fred Rydholm noted at last night's city commission meeting that although Marquette residents joined the rest of the nation in mourning the death of President John F. Kennedy yesterday, government officials had to carry on their duties. Most activities in Marquette were cancelled yesterday, but the city commission conducted its regular meeting, which is scheduled on the second and fourth Monday of each month by the city charter. Preceding the pledge of allegiance, which traditionally opens the commission meetings, last night Mayor Rydholm called on the Rev. Albert R. Parker, pastor of the Seventh Day Adventist Church, to lead the commissioners and spectators in prayer. The Rev. Mr. Parker said, "We must not ask why the President was killed, but ask

Announcement of the special indulgent granted to the diocese, and promulgated for the diocese by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Nolan B. McKeitt, pastor of St. Peter's Cathedral and vicar general of the diocese. Applies Only To Friday The dispensation applies only to Friday, Nov. 29, Msgr. McKeitt noted. ### City Buys Winter Supply Of Rock Salt, Transformer For Service To High School

A contract to provide 200 tons of rock salt to the public works department for use on streets this winter was awarded to International Salt Co. of Chicago by the Marquette City Commission last night. International was low bidder meeting all specifications, at \$15.50 per ton, or \$3,100. City Manager Thomas Moore said there were two low bids. He concurred with the recommendation of Public Works Superintendent Howard L. Coppen that the bid of International Salt be accepted, because the other low bidder, Morton Salt Co. of Milwaukee, did not meet specifications. Didn't Meet 'Specs' Morton offered \$15.50 per ton, or \$3,100 for the 200 tons, but bid a firm price only until March 31. Specifications called for a firm price until Dec. 1, 1964. Other bids were received from:

Eugene Belmore, 113 N. Fifth St., Marquette, dropped a 115-pound buck while hunting in Ely Township Sunday afternoon. A 180-pound doe was downed Sunday afternoon in Ely Township by Clarence Hanley, 219 S. Front St., Marquette. In Saturday's edition, the deer kill of Bill White, 701 Summit St., Marquette, was incorrectly reported. White has shot a deer every year for 11 years, including this year when he dropped a 150-pound doe with one shot on the second day of the season while hunting south of Ishpeming.

### Coincidences Mark JFK's Final Ride

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy's final journey through the nation's capital to the waiting grave at Arlington was everywhere attended by little ironies and coincidences. Like the mournful echoes of the muffled drums reverberating down the canyon of gray government buildings — echoes of his short but brilliant career resounded on the stricken hearts of the spectators along the funeral route. On a brisk bright Monday in November, John Kennedy was being taken to his final resting place at Arlington. Only two weeks ago to the day he had visited the National Cemetery to lay a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and his little son, John, had charmingly fractured protocol by running out in front of the honor guard. Cardinal Cushing Now here was little John observing his third birthday by clutching his mother's hand and walking behind his father's flag-draped casket in as moving a moment of personal his-

Millions Mourn Loss In State (By the Associated Press) "Let his death be not in vain," Michigan's lieutenant governor urged 3,000 of the millions of state residents who paused Monday and mourned the loss of the late President Kennedy. A lull overcame the normal bustle of the state as factories, offices and businesses closed. The working folk, the housewives and children paid tribute to Mr. Kennedy, many flocking to churches and synagogues. Final Salute Lt. Gov. T. John Lesinski urged a crowd at services on the steps of the State Capitol in Lansing to "let his death charge every one of us to take up the burden of his unfinished tasks: to rid our hearts and world of the ignorance, hate and violence; to pursue with mutual responsibility his goals of equality, brotherhood and peace." Six 105 millimeter howitzers boomed a final salute Monday afternoon in Lansing. The guns fired 50 shots, each representing a state in the union, at five-second intervals. Portrait Inside the State Capitol Rotunda, a color portrait of Kennedy was draped in black before a basket of white flowers with an honor guard beside it. Some 6,000 persons gathered in Detroit for ceremonies at the site of the old city hall. Long lines formed outside churches in Grand Rapids and throughout the state at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Two enduring souvenirs brought back to Italy by that famous traveling salesman, Marco Polo, are spaghetti and velvet.

From the very beginning spaghetti democratically became everybody's dish. But, that fabric with a lustrous nap that caught a play of light and was so exciting to touch, it was reserved for kings.

During the Middle Ages velvet became the official fabric of the princes of the church, available only to a privileged few for raincoats, church vestments and noble Europeans. In France blue velvet was reserved exclusively for the king's family.

And yet an occasional commoner did come to know its luxury and beauty. Presumably after the closets and the bed dusters were checked for royal spies, the wife or pinning widow of a soldier would bring out his spoils of war, a velvet swatch or garment, to be touched and marveled at by her friends.

Sweet Revenge It is known whether Marie Antoinette muttered "Let them wear velvet," before dressing for her own date with the guillotine, but after the French Revolution commoners flouted it, even using velvet at their windows.

Meanwhile Italian housewives were perfecting spaghetti, and Flemish people were becoming experts at velvet weaving. The German people, too, around the 1700s and particularly in Krefeld, were developing the textile talent.

A spectacular fireside treat is shish-kebab. Grilled steak, double thick chops, chicken, game hen and small turkeys are popular, too. Shore dinners to please all include charcoal-broiled lobster, jumbo shrimp, oysters in the shell, swordfish and salmon steaks. Specialties such as Swiss fondue can also be made over a wood charcoal briquet fire.

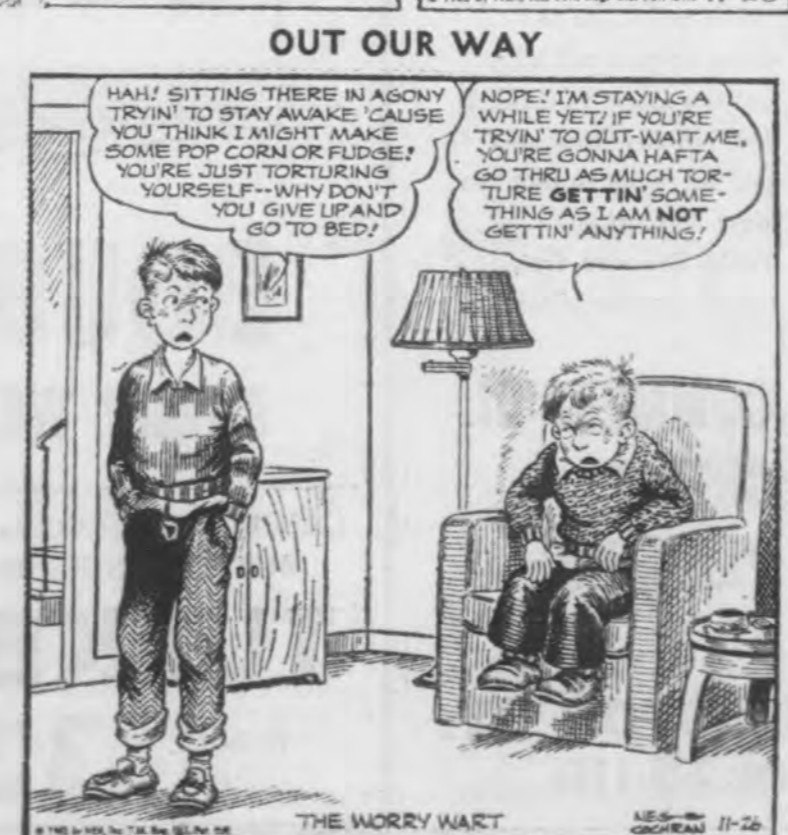
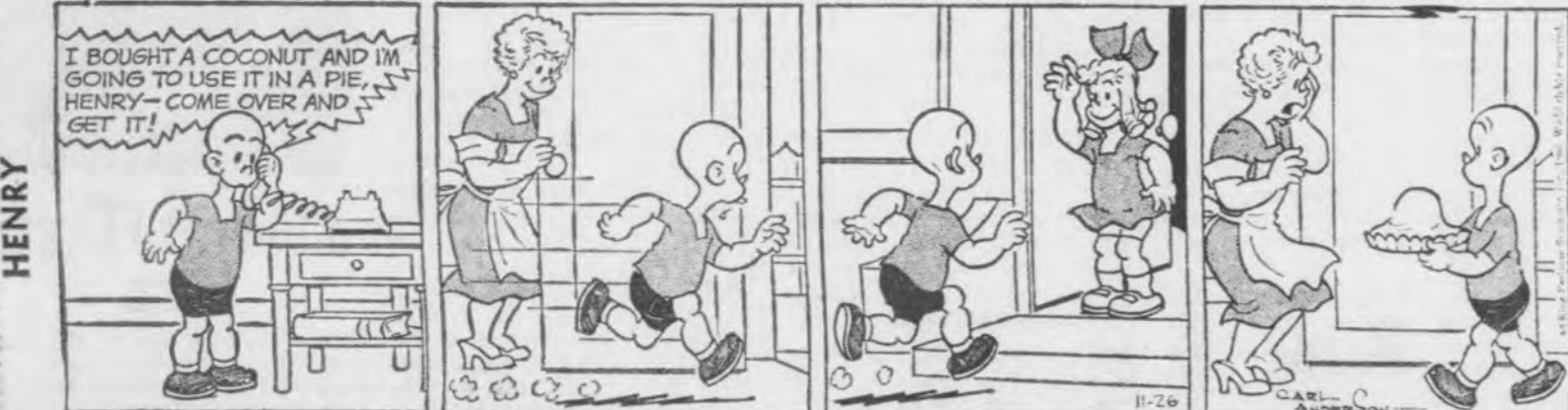

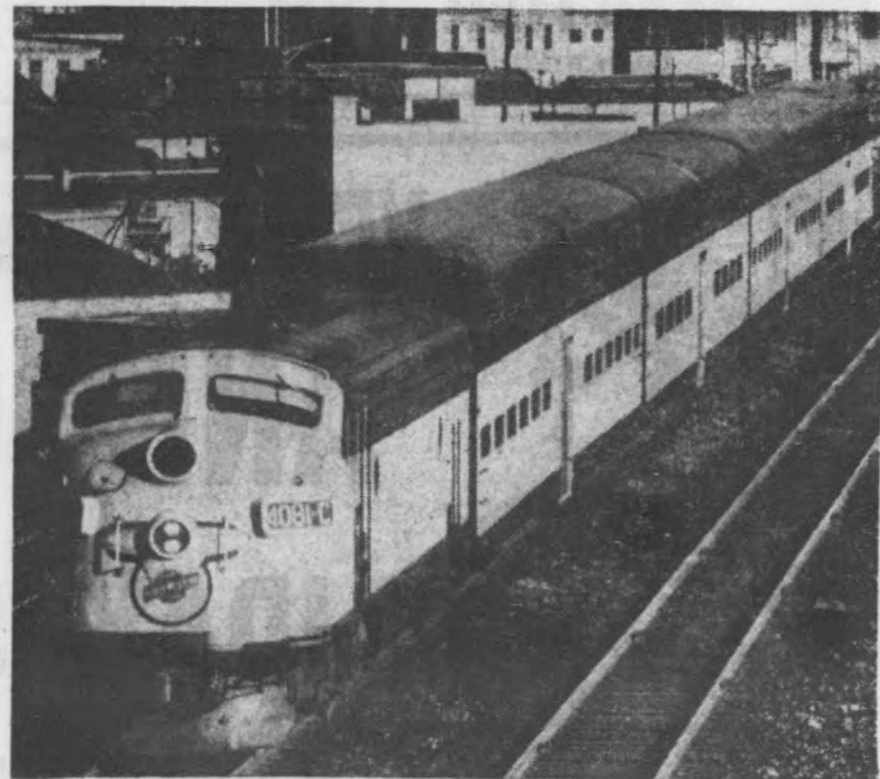

The pieces should be sold for \$1 to raise money for scholarships, assistance to the family of the Dallas policeman killed in capturing Kennedy's accused assassin and to aid the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, advertising man Al Toth proposed in a letter to the examiner.

Toth said he believes everyone would agree with the first two objectives.

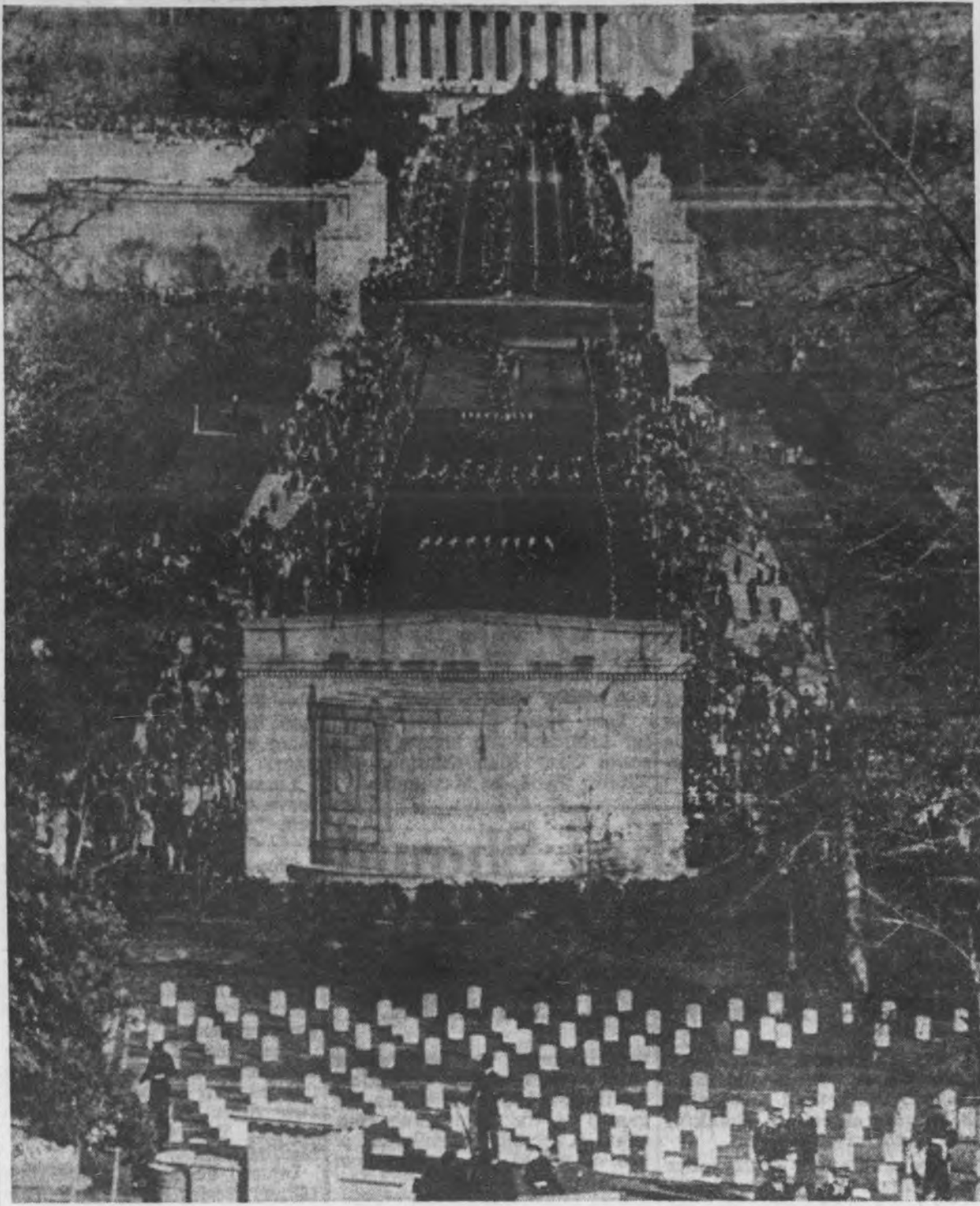
"As for the third, the Oswald widow and children knew nothing of the horrible plot concocted by Oswald...It would give notice to the world that we are a humane and compassionate people," Toth said.

# Oswald Sought Visa From Cuba To Go To Soviet

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — The Cuban government said Monday night that Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President John F. Kennedy, tried Sept. 27 to get a visa to go through Cuba on the way to the Soviet Union.

Oswald's request was turned down, the Cuban government said in a statement broadcast by Havana radio and monitored in Miami.

Foreign Minister Raul Roa said the request was not granted because Oswald did not have authorization from the Soviet Union.

# President Lies Beside Other Sleeping Heroes

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP)—The red glow of the saddest sunset faded over the hill's crest—and left President Kennedy and 126,000 other sleeping heroes to the privacy of night.

Gone were the crowds that had trailed the funeral procession across the nation's capital. Gone were the impressive and important of 54 governments. Gone were the close and dear. **Boom Of Cannon Heard**

Now, through the still woods and the open lawns sounded the melancholy boom of cannon—50 times for the 50 states. Even in darkness and mist, the tombstones—like small white scars on the earth—marked the resting place of his new company.

Down the slope and across the black Potomac, you could see the glittering lights of the capital and the towering Washington Monument, the graceful Capitol dome and the pillars of the Lincoln Memorial.

On this hill—gray green in the face of coming winter—the 35th president of the United States had joined a parliament of silent men.

By 5:05 p. m. the cannon had ended their soliloquy to dusk, and night came quickly.

**Passersby Search For Light**

At graveside, there was work to be finished, and when it was done the headlights of cars pointed the way through the winding cemetery roads.

There were still guards, of course. And down below along the rim of the cemetery, the curious and sympathetic passersby searched the darkness for the small glint of the eternal flame that burns at Kennedy's graveside.

Russia and had discharged him dishonorably. Angriily he wrote a letter to the secretary of the Navy.

**Passport** "I shall employ all means to right this gross mistake or injustice to a boni-fied (sic) U.S. citizen and ex-serviceman."

The secretary of the Navy who received that letter was John B. Connolly Jr., who, as governor of Texas, was wounded by the assassin's bullets last

Friday.

Finally, in May 1962, the State Department, explaining that Oswald had not expatriated himself, issued him a passport to come home. That June, Oswald, his wife and their baby daughter arrived in New York.

Oswald moved about — New Orleans, Dallas, Fort Worth — working at odd jobs, reading, keeping to himself.

**Fair Play For Cuba** Last July, Oswald got into a fracas because a man he had approached earlier about helping train Cuban guerrillas saw Oswald handing out pro-Castro literature. He claimed to be secretary of the New Orleans

chapter of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee. But that group said it didn't even have a chapter in Louisiana.

Last June, Oswald was granted a passport after he said he wanted to roam Russia, Poland and Western Europe as a photographer. But he never went.

Instead he sent his wife, pregnant again, to Irving, Tex., to live with a Quaker friend, Mrs. Michael R. Paine. Oswald sneaked out later, owing 15 days rent.

**3 Answers Known** Paine said Oswald talked Marxism, Marxism, Marxism. "Oswald refused to eschew violence as a method for achieving desired ends." Violence? But how? Against whom? For what ends?

The world knows now the answer to the first three questions. Not the fourth.

The how was a 6.5mm Italian carbine with scope which Oswald bought for \$19.95 from a Chicago sporting goods firm. Just when he chose the targets of his wrath is not known, but it was announced last September that Kennedy would be

coming to Dallas. Soon afterward, Oswald heard a friend of Mrs. Paine's talking about a job opening at the Texas School Book Depository Building in Dallas.

**\$50 A Week** It only paid \$50 a week but Oswald said he'd room in Dallas and visit his family weekends. (His wife had just had another daughter).

Then, last Thursday, Oswald changed his pattern. He went out to the Paine's to spend the night with his family.

The next morning he was off to work and Mrs. Paine paid scant attention a blanket in the garage. Mrs. Oswald didn't talk English. Maybe that's why she never told anyone she thought she'd seen a gun wrapped in the blanket.

But even if she had, were there sufficient danger signs in the life of Lee Harvey Oswald to have warned anyone astute enough to see enough of them? **No One Saw Enough** Maybe now, in hindsight, there were. But, last Friday morning, no one saw enough of them.
