

Eight Plead Guilty Here In Circuit Court

Eight defendants in criminal cases entered pleas of guilty when they arraigned before Judge Bernard H. Davidson of Negaunee at the opening session of the December term of Marquette County Circuit Court here yesterday.

Sentencing for the eight defendants who pleaded guilty will be held at 9:30 a. m., Monday, Dec. 16.

Judge Davidson also passed seven cases until later in the circuit court term and continued two cases until the February term of court.

He appointed counsel for two other defendants and scheduled arguments on a motion from an attorney in another case.

Three of the pleas of guilty were taken yesterday from:

Robert Fosmoe, 27, Route 1, North Lake Location, Ishpeming, breaking and entering in the nighttime;

James Kurian, 29, Route 1, Negaunee, larceny;

William H. Beatty, 54, Route 1, Negaunee, larceny.

Fosmoe appeared in court with his attorney, E. Nickolas Bridges, Negaunee. His bond of \$200 was continued. He was arrested by state police and was arraigned before Marquette Township Justice George J. Pezzy Sept. 14 on the charge. He had pleaded guilty in August to breaking into the Ishpeming Steel Corp. plant, North Lake Location, Ishpeming, the

property of Maurice Warshawsky, North Lake.

Passes Second Court

In view of Fosmoe's plea, Judge Davidson passed a second charge against Fosmoe, indecent liberties, on the recommendation of Prosecuting Attorney Edward A. Quinnell of Marquette.

Kurian, free on \$200 bond, was arrested by state police and charged with a larceny writing a \$10 check Sept. 30 on the First National Bank and Trust Co. of Marquette, without sufficient funds in the bank. The check was made payable to the Hotel Northland.

Being Held In Jail

Beatty was arrested by state police Nov. 8 and bound over to circuit court by Judge Edward H. Dembowski of Marquette. He is charged with taking \$87 belonging to Mrs. Priscilla Matthews of Marquette at the Club 41 on U.S. 41, west of Ishpeming.

Beatty is being held in the county jail in lieu of posting bond, set at \$500.

Guilty pleas also were accepted yesterday from the following defendants, each charged with being drunk and disorderly — third offense; a circuit court misdemeanor:

Charles Linna, 49, Ishpeming; Eugene Kotel, 29, of 516 Baraga Ave., Marquette; Sulo V. Jarvi, 46, Dukes; Glen Gage, 75, Brunswick Hotel, Marquette, and Earl Bressette, 41, of 425 N. Fourth St., Marquette.

Prior Convictions Noted

Linna, who was remanded to the custody of the sheriff, was arrested by Ishpeming police for being drunk and disorderly Sept. 20 on Second St. in Ishpeming. Previous drunk and disorderly convictions in Ishpeming Municipal Court were Sept. 16 and Sept. 18.

Kotel was arrested by Marquette police and convicted by Judge Dembowski of being drunk and disorderly on April 1, July 29 and Sept. 23. He is being held in the county jail in default of \$100 bond.

Didn't Post Bond

Jarvi, being held in the county jail after failing to post \$100 bond, was last arrested for being drunk and disorderly Oct. 7 on Baraga Ave. by sheriff's officers.

He was bound over to circuit court by Dembowski. Previous drunk and disorderly convictions were Aug. 26 in Marquette Township Court and

April 19 in Negaunee Municipal Court.

Gage, who also was remanded to the custody of the sheriff, was bound over by Judge Dembowski. He was arrested for being drunk and disorderly by Marquette police Nov. 9, Sept. 9 and Oct. 14. He is being held in jail in default of \$100 bond.

Bressette, bound over by Judge Dembowski, is being held in the county jail after failing to post \$100 bond. Marquette police arrested him Nov. 25, July 19 and Sept. 13.

Bad Check Count

Judge Davidson named Aaron Lowenstein of Negaunee as court-appointed attorney for Paul Mendez, 30, New York City, charged with drawing a check without a bank account.

Mendez, being held in the county jail in default of \$500 bond, was arrested by Marquette police and charged with writing a \$10 check Sept. 30 on the First National Bank and Trust Co. of Marquette, without sufficient funds in the bank. The check was made payable to the Hotel Northland.

Mendez said he had written the check with the understanding that the hotel would hold the check a few days. He said that subsequently he became ill and the hospital authorities failed to inform the hotel.

Mendez had entered a plea of guilty but following his statement, Judge Davidson said: "Under these circumstances the court cannot accept a guilty plea until you consult with an attorney."

Judge Davidson agreed to hear arguments today at 1:30 from Lowenstein on his motion in a case being appealed from justice court.

Drunk Driving Appeal

Lowenstein is representing Carl O. Johnson, 42, of 200 Gold St., Negaunee, in the case, an appeal from Marquette Township Justice Court.

Johnson was arrested by state police July 27 for drunk driving. His attorney entered a plea of guilty and an automatic appeal Nov. 17 in justice court. Johnson has posted \$50 bond.

Attorney Appointed

Attorney Michael J. Khoury of Marquette was appointed as counsel for Fred W. Priebe, 52, Route 1, Green Garden, charged with drunk and disorderly — third offense.

Priebe, being held in the county jail in default of \$200 bond, was bound over to circuit court by Dembowski. He was arrested for being drunk and disorderly by Marquette police

Oct. 30, June 8 and Sept. 19.

Prison Cases

Judge Davidson continued cases involving two Marquette State Prison inmates.

The case against James Major Jr., 27, charged with breaking prison and felonious assault on April 22, was continued because Major is being held in the psychiatric unit at the Jackson State Prison, and a case involving David Everson was continued because Everson, who has filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus, is currently engaging an attorney.

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Ore Shipping From Marquette Slated To Close Tomorrow

Iron ore shipping over the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Co. dock is expected to close for the season tomorrow. LS&I Dock Agent Harry K. Nielsen said that Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co.'s Cliffs Victory is tentatively scheduled to be the last boat to load at the Upper Harbor dock. This year LS&I dock workers have loaded about one and a half million more tons of ore into over 100 more ore carriers than during the 1962 shipping season.

At the end of November, 4,919,766 tons of ore had been loaded into 365 boats at the LS&I dock. At the end of the season last year, 260 carriers had been loaded with 3,588,036 tons of ore. The LS&I has had a busy shipping season right up until the end. Last month 55 ships were loaded with 728,207 tons of ore at the LS&I dock. During the same month last year, 21 ships were loaded with 285,893 tons of ore. This year's closing date for

LS&I shipping will be the same date as in the previous two years. CCI carriers were the last to leave the LS&I dock both in 1962 and 1961. The Soo Line Railroad Co. ended its shipping season Nov. 22, with total tonnage for the year surpassing last year's total by 83,429 tons. Marquette's navigation season opened this spring April 25 when Inland Steel Co.'s L. E. Block arrived at the LS&I dock.

U.P. Prosecutors Discuss 'Court Of No Record' At Conference In Marquette

A "court of no record," a system in which court convictions of young first-offenders are not listed on their records, was discussed at a meeting here last weekend of the Upper Peninsula Prosecuting Attorneys' Association.

Prosecutor Edward A. Quinnell of Marquette was elected vice president of the association, at a business meeting held in the conference room of the Downtown Hotel.

Elected to succeed Iron County Prosecutor Oswald Casanova, Crystal Falls, as president of the association, was Delta County Prosecutor Nicholas Chapekis of Escanaba. Menominee County Prosecutor Russell Bradley, Menominee, was elected secretary-treasurer of the association.

Quinnell said that he intends to bring the "court of no records" system before the Marquette County Law Enforcement Association for its consideration.

Used In Pontiac Under the system, which has been used successfully in Pontiac for the past nine years, a convicted defendant is handled informally and placed on informal probation in a municipal or circuit court if he is young, has no previous court record and is not charged with a personal injury or sex violation. The system is used in many shoplifting cases.

On the recommendation of the arresting officer, and with the consent of the victim, the defendant is placed on informal probation with terms recommended by the prosecutor.

If the offender has not violated the probation terms, the matter is dropped at the end of the probationary period. The defendant is sentenced in court for probation violation.

Quinnell noted that the "no record" system eliminates the criminal record, which often prohibits a person from entering the service or college or obtaining or keeping a job.

Avoids Stigma The system has been used in Pontiac for 1,200 defendants, he said. Less than 10 per cent of the "court of no record" defendants in Pontiac have committed a second offense, Quinnell said.

"The remainder of the defendants have entered their adult lives without the stigma," Quinnell said. "The system seems to do more good to criminal offenders and less harm to society."

Beatty's automobile skidded into the rear end of another car, operated by Eldon Wilkerson Jr., 20, Sawyer Base, who was in front of him, also proceeding south.

ISHPEMING — Representatives of Ishpeming, Tilden and Ely Townships will present tomorrow night at 7:30 for a regular meeting of the Ishpeming City Council.

Township officials have indicated they will strongly object to proposals to increase fees and rates which will affect the townships.

Kenneth Walimaa, Ishpeming Township supervisor, said a water rate increase for Ishpeming and Tilden Townships "would be a terrific burden on the people of the townships."

Rates Adjusted In '60

Walimaa pointed out that water rates were adjusted in May of 1960, when they were raised from 12 cents to 20 cents, a 67 per cent increase. Now, he said, the proposed increase from 20 cents to 30 cents per 1000 gallons would be a 50 per cent increase.

Proposed fire rates affecting all three townships follow: The present rate of \$75 per call will jump to \$100 per call. The retainer fee is \$100 per month for guaranteed fire protection. This will be increased to \$125 per month if the proposal is approved.

Library Fee Proposal

The monthly retainer fees for Tilden and Ely Townships are now \$50 and it is proposed that they be boosted to \$75 per month.

The other proposed fee increase is for use of the Ishpeming Carnegie Public Library by Township residents. City Manager Thomas McNabb informed the townships that there are 4,800 library card holders, of whom 1,037 are non-residents.

His proposal would be that 22 per cent of the cost be billed to the townships based on the number of card holders in each township. The cost per cardholder will be set at a figure between \$5 and \$7 per year.

This would be billed directly to the townships concerned and not to the individual.

Mine Valuations Decline

The City of Ishpeming is seeking to increase its revenue because of declining mine property valuations. An increase in fees and rates is just one of the proposed means of obtaining funds.

The townships have said they are more or less in the same boat as the city as far as declining mining valuations are concerned.

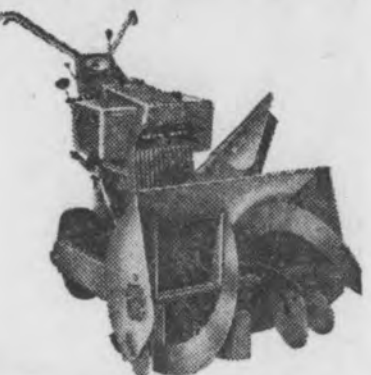

Reminder On Registration Given Voters

Officials of the Marquette County clerk's office today issued a reminder for township clerks and voters that the registration law recently was changed.

In previous years, one could vote once in four years and retain the voter registration right.

Recently, however, the period was reduced to two years, meaning that those who have not been to the polls within the past two years must re-register with their respective city or township clerk, if they want to remain duly qualified electors.

Cancellations for not voting in the two-year period are made during the December check-over time.

Given 30 Days

If a person has not voted within the past two years and has not reinstated his registration before the December check-over time, he or she is sent a notice of suspension.

These persons so notified will have 30 days in which to request a continuation of registration. If the card is not returned within this period the voter's registration is cancelled.

Anyone having questions concerning the new law may call their city or township clerk to check the matter, county clerk officials said.

Financial Scene: 2 Budgets Big Issues For Congress

By SAM DAWSON

NEW YORK (AP)—Next to the tax cut bill now before the Senate the most pressing matter before Washington authorities in the eyes of business are two budgets:

- The current one on large parts of which the Congress is still debating.
- The new one to start next July on which President Johnson and department heads are now laboring.

Both could see final economies from earlier estimates. But both could be affected, either for more or less spending, by the reaction, governmental and private, to President John F. Kennedy's death.

Many business firms and the economy in general—jobs, production schedules, sales, profits, personal income, the value of the dollar—will be affected whichever way the decision goes.

Thrift Pledged

Johnson has pledged thrift and care in spending. The new budget now being hammered out for submission to Congress in January will show how much spending can be held down, or how much it will be expected to increase from budget forces.

The current budget for the fiscal year that started last July 1, is still in flux.

The Congress has cut some of the appropriations that had been asked by Kennedy. The House so far has trimmed an apparent \$5.5 billion from presidential requests for \$92 billion. But many of these cuts in authorization don't really curtail actual spending under past authorizations.

May Restore Requests

And some see a chance that Kennedy's death may encourage the Congress to restore some of his requests for such projects as foreign aid and space exploration.

The big question business is asking is what priorities Johnson will give to these and other projects.

Space projects affect many business firms and whole communities. Expansion or curtailment of spending in this field would be top news for them—new orders, job security or payroll expansion.

Defense Spending

Defense spending in general and various forms of welfare programs will touch many corporations, many cities and regions.

In the over-all picture, the total of Washington spending—above or below \$100 billion?—will have a direct effect on the economy. The as yet unresolved questions: How much money will the government take out of the economy in taxes? How much will it pump into the economy in spending?

The size of the federal deficit will play a part in future inflationary pressures, in the size of interest rates, in the fight to cut the surplus of outflowing dollars over return flow in international payments.

The deficit in the current fiscal year is estimated at \$9 billion.

Lesinski May Seek Demo Bid

DETROIT (AP)—Lt. Gov. T. John Lesinski says he may shoot for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1964 if he decides to stay in partisan politics—and if the party decides he could win.

Lesinski, a wheelhorse of Democratic politics, a veteran of legislative battles and his party's top elected office-holder at present, says he is "looking into the idea—but not very seriously."

He said, however, he might seek the nomination for governor next year if he thought he could win back the office from the Republicans, and at the same time help President Lyndon Johnson carry Michigan.

'Balance' To Ticket

The 38-year-old, 300-pound Lesinski previously had indicated he might drop out of party politics, perhaps in favor of a court post, and has not been placed high on the list of Democratic contenders for the governorship nomination.

A decision to seek the governorship, Lesinski said, would not be a matter of his own wishes but how he could best serve his party and the state.

Another factor, he indicated, might be the fact that he is a Roman Catholic who could provide "balance" to the Democratic ticket in the absence of the assassinated President Kennedy, Johnson is a Protestant.

Lesinski said numerous Democrats have requested that he become a candidate.

thing like that carefully because your friends generally tell you what you want to hear," he added.

He said running for a third two-year term as lieutenant governor is still "an open question" but added that he considers the job as lacking in sufficient challenge.

The leading candidates at present for the Democratic nomination for governor are former Gov. John Swainson and U. S. Rep. Neil Staebler, D - Mich., the state's congressmen at large.

Neither has formally announced his candidacy but both have indicated they'll announce their intentions around the end of this year.

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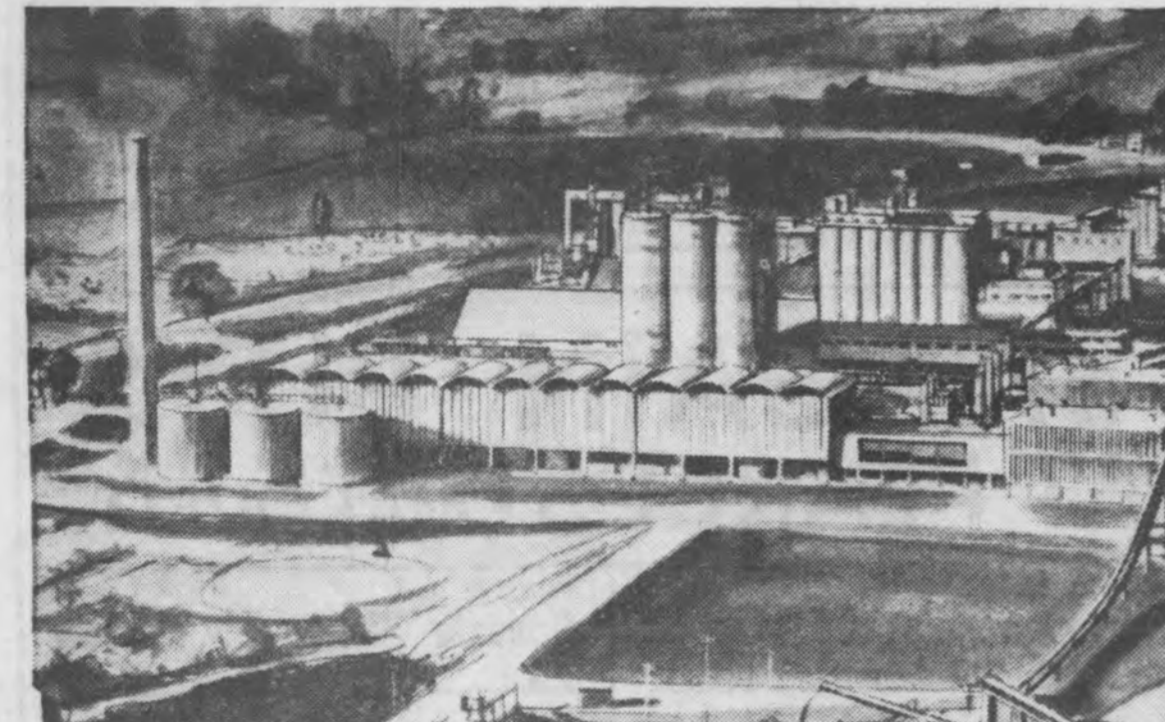

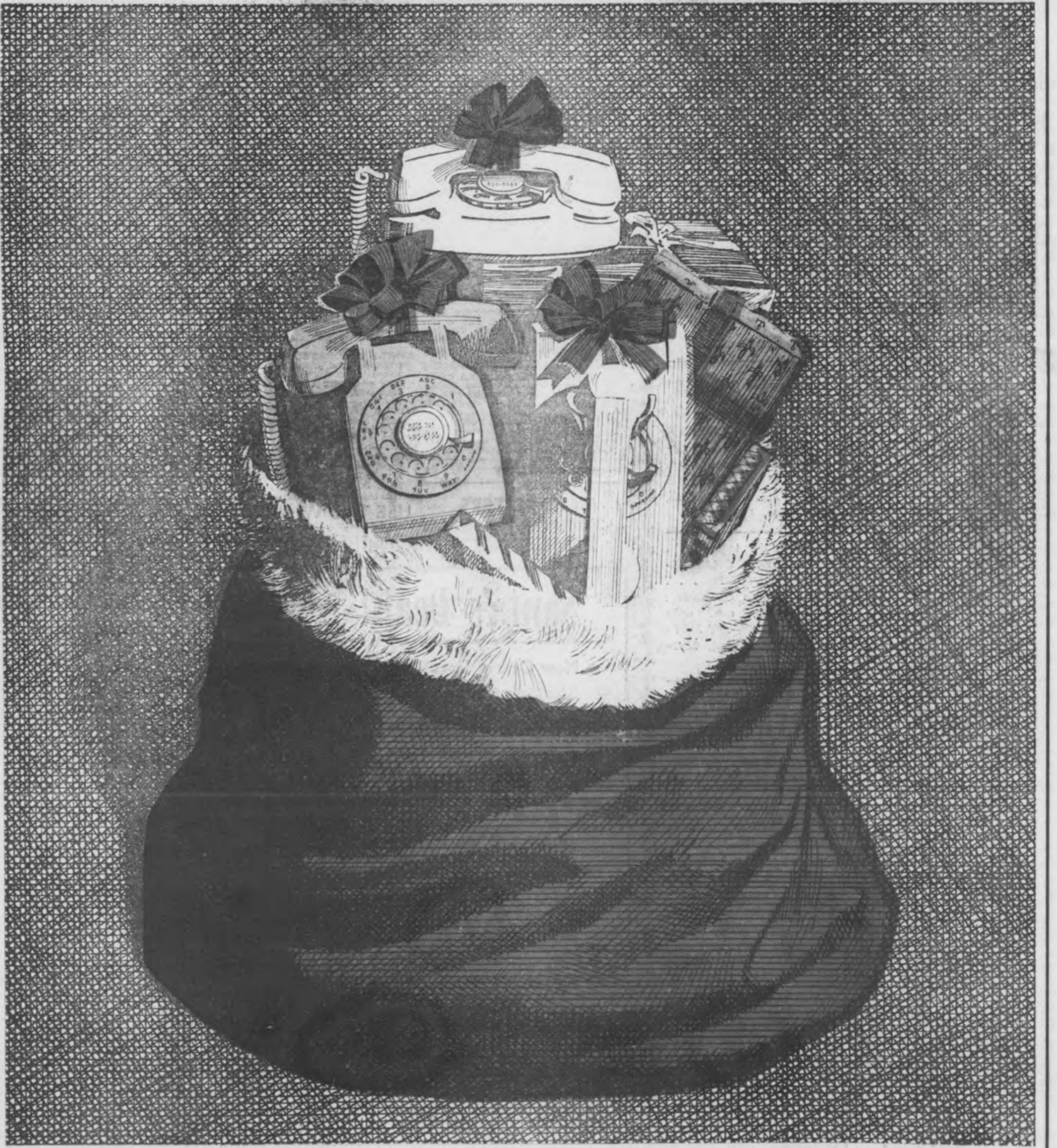
