VOELKER'S COMMENT ON HITHERTO
PUBLISHED MATERIAL IN "PROSECUTOR, U.S.A."

As I told you when I was in New York, all or part of several chapters in the book first appeared elsewhere as short stories. In the revision there are six.

Thus, the fishing story which concludes Chapter 9 first appeared in Story, the young Finn boy's story in Chapter 12 appeared in American Scene, the short inquest story in Chapter 15 appeared in Analytic, entire Chapter 17 in Story (except for the changed ending), entire Chapter 28 in Hinterland, and the story part of Chapter 29 in Literary America.

Story is the only magazine that has managed to survive publishing me, and I already have written permission from Whit Burnett to reprint "Confession." Since then, in the revision, I added the last half of "Fishermen at Night" (also in Story), for which I undoubtedly could also get permission to reprint.

All of the other mags have long since folded and their struggling editorial boards become famous or dead or something. It would be virtually impossible to get their permission to reprint, and yet I feel that some sort of bow ought to be given them. I thought that something like the attached acknowledgment might be appropriate, but will of course bow to your superior experience in these matters.
