And what is the Reel-in fly?

That's easy. It is any trout fly you happen to have on, wet or dry, that the trout ~~see~~ ^{has seen} ^{but has} ^{not} ^{noticed} and ^{is} ^{totally} ^{ignorant} that you are ^{reeling} it in to change the damn

thing when-- wham! -- you get the best strike of the day.

Invariably, in your surprise you
