Carl Johnson's Hardware Store is Robbed Saturday

Cutting a pane of glass out of a window in the rear of the store and taking two floors of their hinges to gain entrance, robbers ransacked the Carl Johnson hardware store on Ludington street late Saturday night or early Sunday morning, but failed to get much cash, which they were evidently seeking.

So far as was known they succeeded in getting a small amount of cash from the cash drawer and a few flashlight. Other than that, the stock was little touched.

That the robbery was well planned is indicated by the manner in which they arranged boxes in front of the cash drawer to serve as a screen from the street. Then they pried open the cash drawer and took out the little change. The paper box screen remained in its position when Mr. Johnson entered the store Sunday.

When he found the cash drawer empty and stock disarranged Mr. Johnson investigated and found the door leading to the rear near the office had been taken of its hinges. Still another door was removed farther back in the store. The window pane had been cut.

It is not improbable, thought authorities, that the robbers sought material

for further "jobs" and only wanted that material and cash, if there was any to be taken.

Shine Proprietor Fined.
Tony Chapek, who conducts the Escanaba shoe shining parlor at 608 Ludington street, was fined \$25 and costs on each of two charges preferred against him today in Judge Knoll Glanzer's court. Chapek was fined for committing assault and battery, Earl Beroun, being the complaining witness. The other charge was for conducting a place of gambling.

Held on Serious Charge He Agrees to "Foot Bills."
Arraigned in Judge C. D. McEwen's court this morning on a serious charge preferred by a young woman of this city, an Escanaba man confessed to wrong doing and agreed to make settlement of bills arising out of the case while his tear-stained wife listened on in humiliation.

The man was brought here from Sidway by county authorities. Publication of his name is withheld by reason of the delicate condition of his wife.

The young woman in the case lived with the family for a period, told the wife, and there was considerable strain existing. The family later moved to Sidway. On Dec. 12 the young woman gave birth to a child at St. Francis hospital.

The man in question agreed to pay

all bills incurred by the young woman and to pay a stipulated amount toward the support of the woman and child.

Considerable indignation was aroused among county officials when the man first denied any wrong doing and persisted by declaring his innocence. Faced by the girl, however, he changed his story and confessed to being guilty.

GOVERNMENT TO USE PRESSURE IN COAL CONTROVERSY

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN MINE OPERATORS AND MINE WORKERS TO BE TAKEN UP.

Pittsburgh, Kansas, Dec. 23.—Seventeen Kansas coal mines, where approximately 3,000 miners are employed, were idle this morning. The miners went on strike in protest against the action of Judge Anderson at Indianapolis yesterday, sending Alexander Howat, president of the Kansas district of the United Mine Workers of America, to jail.

Indianapolis, Dec. 23.—A. J. Howat, president of the Kansas district of the United Mine Workers of America, was released from the Marion county jail today by United States District Judge A. S. Anderson. Howat agreed to join the international officials of the mine workers in sending telegrams to the district executive board in Kansas in an endeavor to have all the strikes in the Kansas mines settled.

Howat was released on his previous bail and if the agreement is carried out in good faith the contempt hearing set for next Monday probably will be continued against Howat and in the cases of other international and district officials of the mine workers.

Washington, D. C.—The controversy between the operators and Attorney General Palmer regarding the coal strike settlement terms probably will go over until after the Christmas holidays.

The statement of Mr. Palmer that "the government will not assume that the operators will break faith, and indeed ways will be found to keep this vitally important tradition," was considered today by those directly concerned in the coal situation.

To what extent the statement could be taken as a cue to the attorney general's future action was today a subject of wide discussion. In some quarters it was regarded as an indication that Attorney General Palmer planned to bring the full pressure of the government to bear if necessary to carry out President Wilson's proposal for the settlement of the coal controversy.

The operators have maintained silence and the executive committee issued a statement Sunday declaring that the government's proposal as finally drafted was vitally different from the plan proposed by former fuel administrator Garfield and which they had agreed to accept.

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
