## Mile of Sewers to be Finished by Cold Weather

Nearly a mile of the new city sewer, which will complete the city's system and send all sewage to the disposal plant, will be completed before winter weather suspends operations, city Engineer Hodson announced yesterday.

Work on the first main, which will extend from the new pumping station at the foot of Madison street, to the corner of Tenth street and Second avenue south, has been started in Smith Court on the East side of the city. This branch of the new sewer is over 3,000 feet in length, and the Delta Contracting company, the contractors expect to complete it before the snow flies.

Men are scarce Mr. Hodson said, and the scarcity of labor may slow up operations somewhat, but he predicted that the delay would not be serious. The material already is on the ground. Work on the pumping station is progressing satisfactorily.

## Two Local Carner Pigeons Were Shot, Says Message Today

The two carrier pigeons that were released by a Hillsworth some time ago to fly to St. Louis, will never reach their home city. The birds left Escanaba full of life, well fed and happy to be able to return to their mates at St. Louis.

Watchmen were looking for them at the big loft maintained by the Rex, Inc., company of that city, but the birds were in vain.

Both birds were killed in Illinois, by a hunter, who happened to see them flying close together just as they left Escanaba. When the birds were picked up he noticed the wax bands and putting them in his pocket he intended to forward them as soon as he arrived home. He failed to do this, however, for two or three days later and it was not until this week that Mr. Hillsworth found out why the birds had never reached their destination. He says if he had an idea of what their fate was to be, he surely would never have allowed them to make their start.

**Low Water Hampers Paper Mill**  
Absence of the usual fall rains in this section has brought the stage of the water in the Escanaba river to a lower point than in many years. The low water stage is forcing the Escanaba Paper Company to operate but one of its two paper machines, because of the lack of power for grinding pulp. In addition to the absence of fall rains, weather records show there is a shortage in rainfall for this year in this section of nearly 5 inches.

**THE ELECTRIC BELT**

THE electric belt is a substitute for the mustard plaster and can be removed without taking any of the patient with it.

From the earliest days of this republic the mustard plaster has been relied upon to extract shooting pains from the interior of man's anatomy. It was always applied by some faithful wife who mixed the plaster with her own hands, in order that there might be posity of unassisted therapy, and all that a suffering husband had to do was allow the plaster to sit down on his stomach and draw the pain to the surface. It is an unobtrusive sensation to have a stout mustard plaster with long teeth grasp hold of a vital organ and mail it into a state of helpless submission, and many a patient has preferred to die with his cuticle intact rather than pass through such an ordeal.

The electric belt, however, has forever done away with the mustard plaster and its numerous incidents.



It is no more trouble to wear an electric belt than it is to make peppermint coffee when everything is going right. The belt is strung carefully about the waist of the patient and one end is attached to an electric meter, which keeps a careful record of the current consumed and turns it into the heat office at the end of the month. As soon as the meter begins to turn over and discharge kilowatts at the patient, a warm, restful feeling appears which increases in intensity until the patient glances at the meter.

When an electric belt is properly applied a sick person can turn over on his side and go to sleep without fear of having his backache reduced to ashes. This cannot be said of the mustard plaster, which never knows when to stop its triumphant progress and is liable to create a sleep patient right in the presence of his wife and children. The electric belt can be set so that it will operate at one mile per hour on high, but by a providential arrangement the speed of the meter is not affected.

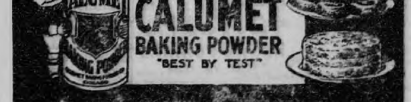

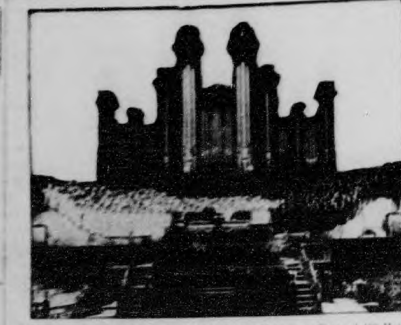

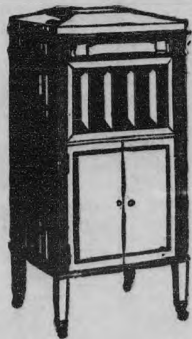

**SHORT OF TEACHERS THIRD OF  
SCHOOLS CAN NOT OPEN**

The teacher shortage remains a menace to the public schools according to preliminary reports made public by the National Education Association. Replies to questionnaires sent out by the association have come from all sections of the United States. These reports show that in places where teachers' salaries have been increased one hundred per cent or more the situation is nearly always satisfactory. But such places are comparatively few, and in localities where salaries have been increased fifty per cent or less the teacher shortage is commonly greater than a year ago. Rural communities are hardest hit. Signed reports from superintendents or many counties indicate that a third of their rural schools cannot open for want of the teachers. Tens of thousands of the schools will be in charge of teachers who have had no professional training and whose academic preparations barely exceeds that of the children they teach.

Relief from this serious situation, which imperils the stability of American rural life, will be sought from the next session of Congress. Renewed efforts will be made to obtain the passage of the Smith-Towner bill which creates a department of education with a secretary in the President's cabinet and provides federal aid of \$100,000,000 for education.

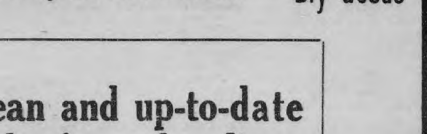

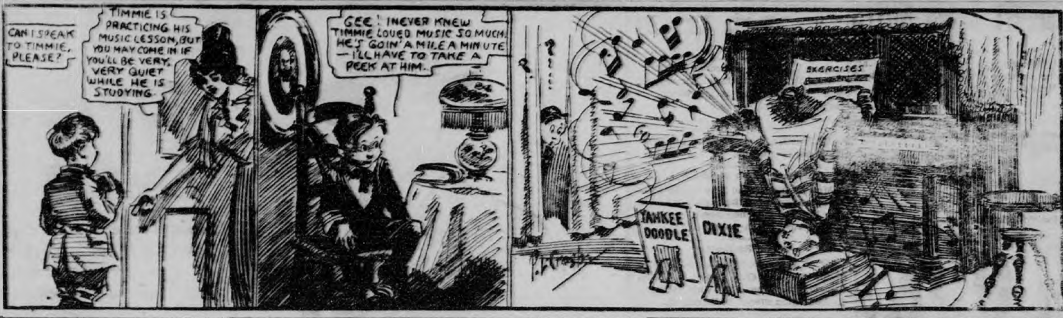

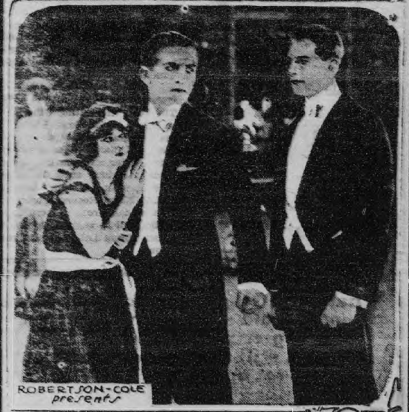

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION

(Continued From First Page). enact laws relative to the hours and conditions under which men may be employed. The proposed amendment to Article XIII of the Constitution is as follows: "Section 5. Subject to this Constitution the Legislature may authorize municipalities, subject to reasonable limitations, to condemn and to take the fee to more land and property than is needed in the acquiring, opening and widening of parks, boulevards, public

places, streets, alleys, or for any public use, and after so much of the land and property has been appropriated for any such needed public purpose, the remainder may be sold or leased with or without such restrictions as may be appropriate to the improvement made. Bonds may be issued to supply the funds to pay in whole or in part for the excess property so appropriated, but such bonds shall be a lien only on the property so acquired and they shall not be included in any limitation of the bonded indebtedness of such municipality." The proposed amendment, if adopted, will empower the legislature to authorize municipalities to condemn

more land than is necessary for parks, boulevards, etc., and to issue bonds therefor. The proposed amendment to Article XI of the Constitution to be submitted to the electors at the election held on Tuesday, November 2, 1920, is as follows: "Section 16. All residents of the State of Michigan, between the ages of five years and sixteen years, shall attend the public school in their respective districts until they have graduated from the eighth grade; Provided, That in districts where the grades do not reach the eighth, then all persons herein described in such district shall complete the course taught therein." "Section 17. The legislature shall enact all necessary legislation to render section sixteen effective." The effect of this proposed amendment, if adopted, will be to compel all residents of the State of Michigan between the ages of five years and sixteen years to attend the public schools in their respective districts until they have graduated from the eighth grade, and to require the legislature to enact legislation rendering effective the provisions contained in section sixteen.
