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Chats with The Editor

THE kindly mother who advised her daughter to hang her clothes "on the hickory limb, but don't go near the water," as reported by our fairy tales is hardly less consistent than Michigan's fish laws, so it seems.

Not mentioning some misquoting in Saginaw county where we are told by the Michigan State Digest something was slipped over on Senator Chester Howell whereby hook and line fishing is prohibited until June 1, right up in this section we have a problem in common with the rest of the state.

This information, along with the names of the streams where spearing could be done with lights, was published by this paper a few issues back, and several comments were heard relative to its being incorrect.

As the information had been taken from the latest issue of the "Digest of Fishing Laws of Michigan," we took the matter up with the State Department of Conservation, receiving the following reply:

Department of Conservation Lansing, Michigan April 25, 1928

Referring to your letter of April 23rd, would advise that under the provisions of Act 246, P. A. 1927, suckers may be speared with artificial light until May 15th. Spearing is not permitted, however, in streams that are closed under the order of the Conservation Commission, prohibiting spearing in trout streams.

AGAIN Cleveland has held firm. The largest city government in operation in progressive administration of affairs has been an inspiration to cities elsewhere, yet during all that period, about six years, the officials have been constantly beset by the self-seekers trying to undermine the good work that is being done.

3 MAIL ARRIVALS UNDER SCHEDULE

PATRONS UPSET BY CHANGES BUT SERVICE WILL BE FOUND IMPROVED

The new train schedules on the Soo went into effect Monday and for a time at least will have passenger and mail patrons topsy-turvy. There is no direct train connection with Escanaba from this city. Train service to Gladstone allows for only one half hour in that city before returning. Passengers to or from Chicago must depend upon auto service with trains at Escanaba. The passenger service will be better to lower Michigan points as the local trains 85 and 87 will make connections at Trout Lake. It has been necessary to go to Gladstone and take No. 8 to make the connections at Trout Lake.

Mail service will be better for local patrons as soon as they become accustomed to the change. There will be three arrivals of mail daily and two dispatches. The first arrival of first class mail will be on train 8 at 6:10 A. M. and the postoffice will be open to patrons at 8 A. M. Train 97 at 2:17 P. M. will deliver mail received at Trout Lake from lower Michigan points and from offices between Sault Ste. Marie and this city. All parcel post must be dispatched to this train as will all letters and other mail received in the postoffice up to 1:45 P. M. All parcel post and other mail will be received on train 86 at 3:13 P. M. First class mail only will be dispatched on train 7 and mail must be in the office not later than 5:15 P. M.

COMMISSIONER ORDERS CLEAN-UP BEFORE MAY 15

Highways Commissioner Christiansen and crew have been giving the streets their annual spring cleaning and an inspection of alleys disclosed conditions that must be improved before May 15th, according to the commissioner's notices posted this week. Wood ashes, cans and other rubbish must be removed by the property owner from the alley shutting his property, and in the future all rubbish should be deposited in receptacle and not in the alleys.

The alleys are public property and should be kept good condition so that driving through them by autos, trucks and other vehicles will be possible at all times. The use of the alleys may be needed at times by the fire equipment and any delay because of obstructions may mean disastrous results. During the winter the alleys have been plowed for traffic and in places it was impossible to get through. So the order has gone out from Commissioner Christiansen to "Clean-up!"

FISHERMEN WAIT FOR MORE FAVORABLE WEATHER

The trout fishing season opened Tuesday, May 1, but local anglers are awaiting more favorable conditions to get the big ones. The rivers are too high yet and weather has been too cold. Plenty of snow is still in the woods. Pike and suckers are now running up the rivers. The Rapid River is an open stream for trout fishing this year after having been closed for several seasons. The east and west branches and the main stream of the Whitefish and the Haymeadow creek from the Burnt dam to the mouth is also open. The Tacahou river, Inman creek, Chippenay and other small streams of the township are closed. There is a license fee of \$1.00 to all adult male persons.

STATE FIRE WARDEN AND TOWER-MAN BEGIN DUTIES
