

Services held for 2 youths killed in wreck

Funeral services were held Tuesday for wo area teenagers killed in a head-on collision last weekend near Rock. Six persons, five of them teenagers, were killed in the accident late Saturday night when a car driven by Brenda Clabots, 18, of Rock, crossed the center line on M-35 and slammed into a vehicle driven by Thomas Andrzejewski. Clabots and a passenger, Richard Haves, 44, of Ishpeming were both killed. Killed in the second vehicle were

Thomas Andrzejewski, 17, of Livonia; William Cartwright, 16, of Livonia; Timothy Quick, 17, and Janet Quick, 16, both of Star Route, Manistique.

Michael Andrzejewski, 15, and Curt Cartwright, 18, passengers in the Andrzejewski car, were both injured in the collision. Andrzejewski was listed in serious condition at St. Francis Hospital in Escanaba Wednesday morning. Cartwright was reported to be in fair condition at Marguette General North and was possibly going to be transferred to the surgical floor later on Wednesday.

The accident happened around 9:15 p.m. Saturday about a mile north of Rock. Investigating troopers said the northbound Clabots vehicle apparently crossed the centerline and collided with the Andrzejewski car. State Police troopers in Gladstone say the pavement was wet but discounted its effect in the accident. Toopers say the accident was the worst in memory in Delta County.

County ranked 32nd for housing funds

A \$400,000 funding request made by Schoolcraft County under the Housing and Urban Development, Community Development Block Grant Program has been lurned down by HUD authorities for this year.

The request included \$282,500 for housing rehabilitation, \$11,000 for a local share recreation grant, and \$106,500 for road repair monies.

The denial of funds came in a letter to Ernest Hoholik, chairman of the Schoolcraft County Board of Commissioners from Michael T. Kastanke, HUD acting area director, and was released by Hoholik last Friday.

"The review of your preapplication for discretionary funds under the community development block grant program has been completed. Although your preapplication proposed eligible activities, we are unable to approve it nor invite a full application because the total amount of fund requested in Michigan exceeded the allocation," Kastenek wrote Hoholik. Over 80 preapplications requesting over \$25 million and representing 103 elgible projects were filed by Michigan localities. Only \$6,964,000 was available for funding

Petitions passed on school income tax

Several area residents are currently circulating petitions to stop a legislative proposal that would allow local school districts to levy an income tax on residents should millage votes fail at the polls.

According to Reg. B. Christensen, coordinator of the petition drive, the legislation would allow school districts to levy a 2 percent income tax on residents if millage requests fail more than twice.

"The proposal basically stipulates that if the millage elections fail than they, (the school district administrators) could levy this income tax without a vote of the people," says Christensen.

The petition states that signers show their complete disapproval of the proposal which was initiated by the Michigan State Board of Education. The petition claims that everything possible will be tried to stop the passing of the legislation. Fortyseven people have signed it thus far.

"We shall do everything legally possible, and possible under the Constitution of our great country to stop such an asinine proposal from becoming law..." the petition states.

It goes on to state "(the law)...appears to be a complete mockery of our election processes and a destroyer of freedom guaranteed under the constitutional rights of the US Constitution.


The Manistique Area Chamber of Commerce has purchased a full-page colored ad in the "finest attractions" brochure distributed by the Upper Peninsula Travel Association.





Consortium to receive grant from CETA

Shirley Niemi, program coordinator of the Six-County Consortium for Employment and training, accounced that the consortium will receive \$1,403,623 for Public Service Employment under Title VI Si the Constraints Entployment and Training Act (CETA).

These funds were made available by the **Emergency Jobs Programs Extension Act** of 1976 which became law on Oct. 1, 1976. Along with \$820,675 already available to the Consortium under Title II of CETA, the legislation authorizes the appropriation of funds to continue 212 current CETA positions through Sept. 30, 1977.

Total funds available to the member counties of the Consortium are as follows: Alger County, \$207,413; Delta County, \$527,154; Dickinson County, \$295,521; Marquette County, \$817,143; Menominee County, \$198,364; and Schoolcraft County, \$178,703.

The new Title VI program will take different approach to providing public service jobs than it has in the past. In each of the six counties, special public service projects employing several people will be developed, instead of providing individual job slots as before. These projects are designed to provide employment for low-income, long-term unemployed individuals.

HI folks.

March may have come in like a lamb. hut it turned into a raving lion. It's blizzard lastedover the weekend, giving us over an extra foot of snow out our way.

Weather sure is very unpredictable, as the past week April showers came in with thunder and lightning. This took the snow then quite a bit-and road 437 is gravel "again: Mong the roadsides and in parts of the forest patches of ground are visible. places where the snow remains in the forest the bare stumps look like chairs aroung a table. Scenes at this time of the year look rather forlorn, because the earth with all its sleeping plants covered with a blanket of white, is a much more beautiful scene.

Our winter has been rather unusual, so who knows. March winds may usher Spring in earlier, to be followed by April showers and May flowers.

With this we can expect the return of the robins. Some may be here already, busy looking for a place to rent and have their young. I have seen quite a few the evening grosbeaks around. Their call is short and cheery. The male is thick-set and heavybilled, with a black crown and forehead. black wings and tail, the inner wing quills are white. The female is brownish with vellow and the wings and tail are black with white markings. They feed on mainly buds and seeds of maples and box-elders. They build their nests of twings and roots and are often placed high in a willow or evergreen tree.

The evening grosbeak is found all over the western North America and it winters regulary as far east as Minnesota. The red and gray squirrels have been prancing

Out our way we soon had a huge landscape in a blanket of white. The trees were wearing a beautiful capes of soft velvet. Feed Supplies on Hand: tons of corn silage, tons of haylage, tons of hay, shelled Corn and small grain (tons or pounds), tons of cob
