October 13, 1904. Mr. C. D. Mason, Asst. Audt., Gladstone, Mich. Dear Sir: We are in receipt of your letter of October 7th returning schedules of the Census of Manufacturers. We find on looking over the reports carefully, and on reading the instructions that have been forwarded, that the information as we have now worked it out in some cases does not correspond with the requirements. We have had some experience with these census statisticians before and do not want to submit the statements to them until we are pretty sure that they are correct. We notice that you have included in your pig iron schedule under Sections 6, 7, 8 and 12, the labor of making charcoal at kilns, while under Section 10 you show the total cost of the charcoal as charged into the cost of the pig iron. This you will notice would not be correct as you are including the labor twice. Your report, as we understand it, would call for all items of labor under Sections 6 and 7, and all other items making up the operating costs under 9 and 10. 




